

# Hederation.

With the fifty-first year of her work Victoria University enters into more intimate relations to the public system of education for the Province of Ontario, under the Federation Act. As an indirect result of the movement embodied in that Act, a common provincial standard of University Matriculation has been adopted, and a University Matriculation and High School leaving Examination instituted. This renders the July Matriculation Examination unnecessary on our part. The September examination will be held concurrently in Cobourg and Toronto, conducted by a joint Board representing the two Universities. The curriculum and examinations in the other years will be unified as rapidly as possible, and it is expected that after two years we shall reach a common curriculum and a common degree. The advantage of this to all educational interests in the Province will be obvious. Not the least will be that degrees endorsed by the large, influential and learned faculties of the two Universities will command to the fullest extent the confidence of the public at home and abroad.

We expect, also, that the advantages which will be offered by the combined strength of these faculties will surpass anything that we have been able to offer in the past.

# Faculty of Arts.

#### ENTRANCE.

Candidates may enter this faculty by passing the Junior Matriculation Examination, or the Senior Matriculation Examination (first year), or at the Examination of the second year. (See pages 11, 12.)

Candidates for Junior Matriculation must have completed the fifteenth year of their age.

All candidates entering at the Junior Matriculation Examination must take the pass subjects in Latin, Mathematics, English, History and Geography, and in one of the following groups; (a) Greek; (b) French and German; (c) French, and either Physics or Chemistry; (d) German, and either Physics or Chemistry.

Candidates intending to take during their University Course any one of the following Honor Departments, viz; Political Science, Mathematics and Physics, Chemistry and Mineralogy, or Natural Sciences, are recommended to take French and German at Matriculation: since these languages must be taken in connection with the above-named Honor Departments. For a similiar reason, candidates intending to take during their University, Course either the Honor Department of Philosophy or that of Oriental Languages, are recommended to take Greek and German at Junior Matriculation.

All candidates entering at the Senior Matriculation Examination must take the pass subjects in Latin, English, History, Mathematics; any two of the following languages, Greek, French, German, and Hebrew, and Chemistry or Biology.

Candidates who propose to take the Honor Course in Philosophy are recommended to take German as well as Greek, in view of the course for second year prescribed on page 28.

Candidates for Senior Matriculation may present themselves either in April, and compete with the undergraduates for honors, or at a special examination in September, at which no honors are awarded.

An undergraduate in the Faculty of Arts, in any University in Hen Majesty's dominions, may enter by being admitted ad eundem statum on special application to the Senate.

If such application be for admission to the standing of the third or fourth year in this University, the Senate will, if it sees fit to grant the same, prescribe the subjects of examination in which such applicant shall be required to pass before proceeding to the Degree of B.A., having regard to the subjects in which he has already passed satisfactory examinations in his own University.

The University Matriculation and High School Leaving Examinations, conducted under the Regulations of the Education Department of Ontario, will be accepted by this University pro tanto for Junior or Senior Matriculation, as also the corresponding Diplomas of Albert College and other affiliated colleges. Candidates will be ranked in honors upon the standing obtained at such examinations, but competitors for scholarships must take the papers set at the September Examination for Matriculation in the Department in which they are competing.

Examinations for Junior Matriculation will be held in the middle of September, at which those who are rejected at the July Examination, as

well as new candidates, may present themselves.

The Special Examination for Senior Matriculation, previously referred to, will be held at the same time as these Supplemental Examinations. Candidates for entrance must produce satisfactory certificates of age and of good conduct.

The fee for Matriculation is five dollars, and it must be paid to the Registrar at the time the candidate gives notice of intention to present himself. Such notice (according to a form which will be furnished on application) must be sent to the Registrar before the fifth day of September.

Candidates who have passed the Departmental examinations in July will be enrolled on forwarding their application to the Registrar without further Matriculation fee.

Until the Senate by resolution otherwise determines, the standing of candidates who have passed, or may hereafter pass, the examinations of the Department of Education for First or Second Class Teacher's Certificates, is accepted protanto at any Junior Matriculation Examination.

First Class Teacher's Certificates are accepted pro tanto at the Senior Matriculation and First Year Examinations. Teachers holding Grades A or B are allowed the options granted to Honor men in the subjects in which these certificates have been granted; thus those having these grades in Mathematics, will be recognized as in the Honor Department of Mathematics; and those having these grades in English, will be recognized as in the Honor Department of Modern Languages on passing in Pass and Honor French and German, in addition to the other necessary subjects.

Certificates of having passed the first examination in the School of Practical Science are accepted pro tanto at the Senior Matriculation and First Year Examination, i.e., the examinations in Mathematics and Chemis-

try are not required from the holders of such certificates.

Candidates entering at the examination of the Second Year and Undergraduates of the First Year standing who desire to take the Second Year's Examination, must, in addition to the subjects required for it, pass examinations on the subjects of the First Year, according to the following scheme:—

For all who intend to pursue the Pass Course: Mathematics, History, English, and Chemistry or Biology.

For those who intend to enter any of the Honor Departments, as follows:—

- I. CLASSICS: Mathematics, English, History.
- II. MODERN LANGUAGES: Mathematics, Chemistry, or Biology.
- III. ORIENTAL LANGUAGES: Mathematics, Latin or Greek (according as Greek or Latin is taken in second year), French or German, English.
- IV. POLITICAL SCIENCE: Mathematics, History, Chemistry, or Biology, English.
- V. Philosophy: Mathematics, English, History, Chemistry, or Biology, Latin (if not taken in second year).
- VI. MATHEMATICS AND PHYSICS: English, French (if not taken in second year), German (if not taken in second year), Latin or Greek.
- VII. CHEMISTRY AND MINERALOGY: Mathematics, English, Latin or Greek.
  - VIII. NATURAL SCIENCES: Mathematics, English, Latin or Greek.

#### ENGLISH.

Composition:—Nothing but an essay will be required; this shall be dealt with rather as a test of the candidate's power of English composition than as a proof of his knowledge of the subject written upon. Legible writing and correct spelling and punctuation will be regarded as indispensable, and special attention will be paid to the structure of sentences and paragraphs. The examiner will allow a choice of subjects, some of which must be based on the following selections, with which the candidate is expected to familiarize himself by careful reading:—

#### HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY.

#### ELEMENTARY SCIENCE.

#### PHYSICS.

An Experimental course in (a) Dynamics, (b) Heat, (c) Electricity, including an acquaintance with the Metric System of Units. The courses are defined as follows:—

Dynamics: Definitions of velocity, acceleration, mass, momentum, force, moment, couple, energy, work, centre of inertia; statement of Newton's laws of motion; composition and resolution of forces; conditions for equilibrium of forces in one plane.

Definitions of a fluid, fluid pressure at a point, transmission of fluid pressure, resultant fluid pressure, specific gravity, Boyle's law, the barometer, air pump, water pump, siphon.

Heat: Effects of heat, temperature, diffusion of heat, specific heat, latent heat, law of Charles.

Electricity: Voltaic cells, chemical action in the cell, magnetic effect of the current, chemical effect of the current, galvanometer, voltameter, Ohm's law, heating effect of the current, electric light, current induction, dynamo and motor, electric bell, telegraph, telephone.

#### CHEMISTRY.

Definition of the object of the science, relation of the physical sciences to Biology, and of Chemistryto Physics. Chemical change, elementary composition of matter. Laws of combination of the elements, atomic theory, molecules, Avogadro's law. The determination of atomic weight, specific heat, atomic heat, nomenclature, classification. The preparation, characteristic properties, and principal compounds of the following elements: Hydrogen, chlorine, bromine, iodine, oxygen, sulphur, nitrogen, phosphorus, carbon, silicon.

#### REGULATIONS.

All Candidates for Examination must, on or before the first day of March, make application to the Registrar of the Senate, giving a detailed statement of Examinations desired, both in Pass and Honor work, and enclosing the required fees.

Candidates for Degrees must forward their application to the Regisartr, accompanied by the usual fees, on or-before the first day of May.

A Candidate pursuing the Honor Course, who fails to take honors in his Department, shall not be considered to have passed the Examination of the year excepting that in the Departments of Modern Languages, and Philosophy, and Political Science, and Natural Sciences, a candidate who has in any one branch failed to obtain the full percentage requisite for ranking in Honors, may, on the special recommendation of the Examiners, be allowed to proceed as an Honor man in the Department in the following year. A Candidate who has failed may, at his option, again present himself for the Examination in which he failed; or, upon application to the Senate, may be permitted to take the ordinary Supplemental Pass Examination in September, with such of the previous Pass subjects as may appear requisite in view of the extent and character of the examinations he has already passed.

A Candidate who competes for Honors at the Examination for B.A., and fails to obtain the requisite number of marks to entitle him to be classed in Honors, may, on the recommendation of the Examiners, be awarded a Degree without Honors; it being at the option of the Candidate to accept the award of such a Degree, or to wait until a subsequent examination and again compete for a Degree in Honors.

An Undergraduate who has obtained Honors in any one of these Departments may transfer himself to any other Department and proceed therein; but as a prerequisite to obtaining the Degree of B.A., he must, during his course, have passed the Examinations in Pass subjects annexed to the Honor Department to which he is transferred.

Application for Supplemental Examination must be made to the Registrar at least two weeks before the time set for the Examination, the fee in all cases to be enclosed with the application.

A Student who fails at the Final Examination for Degrees will not be permitted to come up for Supplemental Examination before September, when, on his passing the Examination, the Senate may confer the Degree.

Undergraduates of any year who have been rejected or who have been prevented from attending the Annual Examinations in May, by sickness, domestic affliction, or other causes beyond their control, may present themselves for examination in September at the time of the Senior Matricula-

tion Examination. But Candidates who have failed to attend at the May Examinations must prove to the satisfaction of the Chancellor, before presenting themselves in September, the existence and sufficiency of the alleged cause of absence, and all such cases shall be subsequently reported to the Senate.

A Candidate for Examination in any year in the Pass course (except Junior Matriculation), who has failed in not more than two Sub-Departments of the Examination, may be allowed to present himself at the next ensuing Supplemental Examination in the Sub-Department or Departments only in which he has failed; and a Candidate for examination in any year, in any Honor Department (except Junior Matriculation), who has failed in not more than one of the Pass subjects attached to his Honor Department, may be allowed to present himself at the next ensuing Supplemental Examination in that subject only in which he has so failed.

#### PRIZES.

THE RYERSON PRIZE, founded by J. G. Hodgins, LL.D., is awarded to the Junior who is first in Scripture History.

THE WALLBRIDGE PRIZE, founded by A. F. Wallbridge, M.A., is awarded to the Student who obtains the highest standing in the Greek Testament. The papers are set on such books as are read in the Fourth Year in Arts, and the Competition is open to all University Students.

THE WEBSTER AND HODGINS PRIZES, established by J. G. Hodgins, LL.D., are open for competition to all Undergraduates of Second year's standing, and are awarded to the first and second in the Pass English of the first two years.

THE PUNSHON PRIZE, founded by William Kerr, M.A., LL.D., is awarded to the member of the Graduating Class who stands first in English. Composition and Elocution. To the winner of this Prize is granted the distinction of Valedictorian for the year. The subject for 1892 is Alfred the Great. The following is the Committee of Examiners:—Wm. Kerr, M.A., LL.D.; E. C. S. Huckye, M.A., LL.B; Rev. E. N. Baker, M.A., B.D.

THE WILSON MEMORIAL PRIZE, founded by Bishop Wilson, D.D., is awarded to the Student who obtains the highest standing in the Pass Mathematics of the Senior Year.

THE CLARKE PRIZE, established by S. Clarke, Esq., Mayor of Cobourg, is given for special excellence in Ethics, including both Pass and Honor work.

#### DEGREES.

#### BACHELOR OF ARTS.

In order to proceed regularly to this Degree Candidates are required—

- 1. To pass the Matriculation Examination.
- 2. To attend the daily instructions of the Lecture Room during the

whole Course, unless under special circumstances, when a dispensation for a limited time may be obtained from the Senate.

- 3. To pursue their University studies regularly for a period of, at least, four years. An Arts Student shall not be allowed to take examinations in concomitant reading in Law or Theology to a larger extent than would equal the extra work for Honors in his year in one Department.
- 4. To pass satisfactory examinations in all the subjects of the prescribed Course of Study.

#### MASTER OF ARTS.

Candidates for this Degree must be Bachelors of Arts of, at least, three years' standing. Their attainments and moral character must be satisfactory to the Senate of the University.

They must also make application in writing to the Registrar on or before the day specified in the Calendar.

AD EUNDEM.—Candidates for admission ad eundem gradum must furnish evidence of good moral character, and of graduation in Arts in an approved University.

# MASTER OF ARTS WITH HONORS.

Candidates may proceed to the degree of M.A. with Honors, in any one or more of the five Departments of the Arts Course in which they have not graduated with Honors, by taking the Final Examination for B.A., with Honors in such Department or Departments, without the Pass work in the additional Departments required of Candidates for B.A.

Such Candidates may present themselves for M.A. at the expiration of one year after having taken the B.A. Degree.

This Degree is also open to Graduates who have taken M.A. in Course.

#### COLLEGE HOODS.

The following materials and colors have been prescribed by the Senate for the Hoods to be worn by the Graduates in the various Faculties:—

B.A.—Black alpaca, lined with white silk, and trimmed with ermine.

M.A.—Black corded silk, lined with purple.

B.Sc.—Navy blue silk, lined with sky blue silk; hood and band trimmed with ermine.

Ph.D.—Scarlet cloth, lined with white silk, bordered with navy blue silk and a blue cord.

LL.B.—Blue silk, lined with white silk, and trimmed with ermine.

LL.D.—Scarlet cloth, lined with white silk, trimmed with ermine and a blue cord.

M.D. -Scarlet cloth, lined with blue silk.

B.D.—Same as M.A., with the addition of ermine trimming.

D.D.-Scarlet cloth, lined with purple silk.

## DISCIPLINE.

Students connected with the College are expected to conduct themselves with propriety, and to observe all regulations imposed by the President and Faculty.

Students whose conduct or progress in study is unsatisfactory will not be allowed to remain in the University.



# REGULATIONS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS.

#### DEGREE OF M.D.

- 1. Candidates for this degree must pass a Matriculation Examination as follows, viz.:—Either (1) Matriculation in Arts of this University; or (2) the non-professional examination of the Education Department for second-class teachers, with the Latin option; or (3) Matriculation in Medicine of this University, which is the same as that of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons, Ontario. The corresponding diplomas of the Province of Quebec are also accepted.
- 2. They must pass the Primary and Final Examinations prescribed by the curriculum of this University.
- They must spend four years in professional study before admission to Final Examination. Graduates in Arts will be admitted after three years' professional study.
- 4. They must furnish evidence of attendance upon Medical Lectures for three sessions of six months each at the Medical Faculty of the University of Toronto, or l'Ecole de Médicine et de Chirurgie de Montreal, or Trinity Medical College, Toronto, or some School of standing recognized by the Senate. The Lectures required are as follows:—



#### DEGREE OF LL.B.

To obtain the Degree of LL.B. it is necessary to pass the Examination for Matriculation and the four subsequent Annual Examinations.

A Graduate in the Faculty of Arts is exempt from subjects on which he has passed in the Arts Course.

A Graduate in Arts of three years' standing, who has also been admitted a Barrister by any Law Society of the Dominion of Canada, is admitted to the Degree of LLB. on a Final Examination on the following works:—

- 3. Story's Conflict of Laws.

# REGULATIONS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS.

#### DEGREE OF B.D.

Candidates for this Degree must be Graduates in Arts of, at least, two years' standing, and Ministers or Candidates for the Ministry in good standing in some branch of the Christian Church. They are required to give evidence of satisfactory acquaintance with the following preliminary subjects, for which provision is made in the Arts Course of this University:—

New Testament Greek.

Hebrew.

Ethics and Apologetics.

The following *Theological Options* are allowed in the Arts Course:— In the first and second years, Hebrew for French or German; in the third and fourth years, Hebrew, Theology, or Biblical Greek for the Language Options.

Candidates must pass all the Annual Examinations of the Curriculum in Divinity, except on subjects which they have already taken as Theological options in the Arts Course.

These examinations will be based essentially on the subjects. The text-books named are to be used as aids to the mastery of the subjects.

#### HONORS.

The Sanford Gold Medal in Divinity is awarded to the Candidate who takes the highest standing in a Final Review Examination on three prescribed Departments of the Divinity Curriculum. The Departments for 1891 are Theology, Old Testament Exegesis, and Practical Theology; and for 1892, Theology, New Testament Exegesis, and Old Testament Exegesis. Each competitor, in addition to the ordinary statutory requirements for medals, must have attained an average standing of, at least, sixty per cent. on the ordinary Examinations for B.D.

The Geo. A. Cox Bursary of \$25 is awarded each year to the Undergraduate in Theology who stands first in the work of the third year of the B.D. Course in New Testament Exegesis.

#### CONFERENCE COURSE.

Probationers for the Ministry of the Methodist Church, who have been appointed to the College, and who are not proceeding to a degree, will pursue the following Course of Study prescribed in the Discipline of the Methodist Church, on which they will be examined at the close of each College Year by the Examiners appointed by the Senate in the respective subjects:—

- 1. Systematic Theology.
- 2. New Testament Exegesis.
- 3. Rhetoric and the English Language.

- 1. Historical Theology (History of Doctrine, and Comparative Theology).
- 2. New Testament Exegesis.
- 3. Practical Theology (Church Polity).
- 4. Ethics and Christian Evidences.
- 5. Old Testament Exegesis, or Natural Science, or Patristics.

#### PRELIMINARY COURSE.

Candidates for Reception on Trial for the Ministry will find provision for instruction in the following subjects of the Conference Preliminary Course:—

Biblical History.

Wesley's Sermons.

The Methodist Catechism.

The Literary Examination for such entrants may be prepared at the same time, or the Candidate may prepare for full University Matriculation, at the Cobourg Collegiate Institute. Similar provision for both Literary and Theological work for entrants is made in Albert College.

The Certificate of the College is accepted by the Conference, in lieu of an examination before the Conference Examiners in any subject of the Conference Course of Study.

All Candidates for Reception on Trial must be recommended to their own District Meeting by the Quarterly Meeting of the Circuit from which they come.

The John Macdonald Bursary of \$25, established by the late Hon. John Macdonald, Toronto, is awarded each year to the Probationer for the Methodist Ministry who stands first in Elocution.

The Wallbridge Prize, for New Testament Greek, is open to all Theological Students.


