# PROOBEDINGS

OF THE

#### ANNIVERSARY MEETING.

At the Ninth Anniversary Meeting of the Wesleyan Auxiliary Missionary Society, for the Nova-Scotia and New Brunswick District, held in the Methodist Chapel, Halifax, on Tuesday the 29th of May 1826,

REV. WILLIAM BLACK IN THE CHAIR ;

The Report of the District Committee having been read, the following Resolutions were passed unanimously:

I. On the motion of the Rev. S. Bamford, seconded by the Rev. S. Busby;

That the Report now read be adopted, and printed under the direction of the Committee.

II. On the motion of the Rev. J. B. Strong, seconded by the Rev. G. Miller;

That this Meeting, deeply conscious of the moral degradation, and spiritual destitution of the greater part of the human race, and encouraged by the comparatively easy access of christian missionaries to Pagan and Mahomedan countries, is impressed with a deep, and growing conviction of the importance of christian missions, and of the consequent obligations of christians to promote to the utmost of their means, the dissemination of the Gospel of the Son of God.

III. On the motion of the Rev. R. Williams, seconded by Mr. Desbrisay;

That recognising the grand gospel principle, that

the Holy Spirit is the only effectual Agent in accomplishing the great end of Missionary efforts; this Meeting carnestly recommends to all its Branch Societies, and Associations, and to all the lovers of Christ, to unite in devout and persevering prayer for a larger outpouring of the Spirit of God, upon a world lying in the arms of the wicked one, and upon all ministers and christian missionaries.

IV. On the motion of the Rev. G. Jackson, seconded by the Rev. J. Marshall;

That this Meeting acknowledges with undissembled gratitude, the success with which Almighty God has blessed the endeavours of various missionary societies; and especially does it acknowledge with adoration and thankfulness, the sanction which he has vouchsafed to the Wesleyan Missions generally, and to their efforts among the slaves of the West Indies particularly.

V. On the motion of the Rev. W. Burt, seconded by James Ratchford, Esq.

That as by a late arrangement of the general Committee in London, the provinces of Nova-Scotia and New Brunswick have been formed into two separate districts; the Missionary Branch Societies and Associations in this province, shall be denominated The Nova-Scotia Wesleyan Missionary Auxiliary Society.

VI. On the motion of the Rev. W. Bennett, seconded by the Rev. J. Snowball;

That the thanks of this Meeting are particularly due to John Starr, Esq. the Treasurer of this Society, and that he be respectfully requested to accept the office of Treasurer of "The Nova-Scotia Wesleyan Missionary Auxiliary Society."

VII. On the motion of the Rev. M. Ritchey, seconded by Mr. Thomas Davies;

That the thanks of this Meeting are due to the late Secretaries of the Society; and that the Rev. Robert 1. Lusher, and John Leander Starr, Esq. be requested to accept the office of Secretaries for the ensuing year.

# Report, &c.

To promote the extension and establishment of the kingdom of righteousness and peace, is the noblest employment in which mortals can be engaged. To a feeling mind, the moral degradation of the species, must necessarily be a fruitful source of pain; while the melioration of its wretchedness, cannot fail of communicating to the heart the liveliest emotions of joy. This melioration however, can only be effected by the extensive diffusion of gospel truth; and how much satisfaction and encouragement do we derive from knowing, that such is the mighty energy of its principles, that wherever they are permitted to exert their influence, and possess the heart, the base and irregular passions are banished from the human mind, and the character and happiness of man, as a rational and immortal being, are exalted and secured.

With these views of the design and tendencies of "the Gospel of the Grace of God" and with earnest desires for the happiness and salvation of the WORLD by its universal diffusion and influence, this Auxiliary Society was formed nine years since, and continues to

receive an encouraging degree of support.

The Committee in closing their labours, and in submitting to you their Report for the past year, would express their firm and growing conviction, that the cause of christian missions to the heathen world, is the

cause of God; and they are happy in being able to congratulate their friends, and the supporters of this holy cause in this province, on the success with which it has pleased Almighty God to crown the exertions of the Parent Institution, and the encouraging prospects which most of the stations at present exhibit.

An abstract of the information which has been received as to the state and prospects of our Missions in different parts, the Committee now beg leave to lay be-

fore the Society.

Total number of missionaries and assistant missionaries, one hundred and seventy nine—of members in the Foreign stations, exclusive of those in Ireland, thirty two thousand, four hundred and nineteen, and of children in the mission schools, about fourteen thousand.

#### EUROPE.

In IRELAND the Missionaries occupy sixteen stations, where by preaching in the Irish language, the doctrines and blessings of the gospel are made known to the darkest and most degraded part of the numerous population of that country.

The French Mission comprising the stations of Calvados, L'Orne, La Manche, Mercharenton and south of France, continues to wear an encouraging aspect. Among the present fruits of the labours of the Brethren in that country, is the establishment of Bible, Missionary and Tract Societies, which, with the

GIBRALTER is the porch of Spain, through which are sent into that kingdom in its own language, many copies of the Holy Scriptures, and various religious Tracts. It may also be considered as the house of call for numerous vessels bound to different ports of the Mediterranean, whose crews may also be supplied with religious books for their own use, and for the benefit of others: and as the missionary there regularly preaches on the water, many persons who never land, have an opportunity of hearing the Gospel, of which they would otherwise be deprived during a long voyage: the mission therefore at this important fortress, has long been considered as one of great utility.

The importance of MALTA as a mission station is obvious, and from thence we trust devoted missionaries connected with all the Missionary Societies may ultimately obtain access to the interesting regions by which it is surrounded. "We have only" says Mr. Cook "to cast our eyes on a map of the Mediterranean, to be convinced of the immense importance of this island as a missionary station. See this little rock in the midst of a sea, whose shores uphold the thrones of the leaders of two of the most mighty divisions of the army of the Prince of Darkness. It faces France, Spain and Italy, who have particularly given their power to the beast, and its other opposing coasts have long been cursed by the iron rule of the false prophet. See this rock, with its crowded population speaking the languages of Rome and of Mecca, delivered into the hands of a nation. blessed with the light of divine truth, and the desire to communicate it; at a time too, when unusual political agitations seem to announce that the most important changes may be expected, where the Mahomedan power has seemed to be most firmly seated; and say, if such a providence does not address a loud call to the

christians of our native country to avail themselves of the facilities thus offered to their enterprize.

At this interesting station Mr. Keeling, our missionary is now labouring with an encouraging degree of success.

### ASIA.

PALESTINE presents an inviting field for missionary exertion. From the information furnished by Mr. Cook, who was deputed to visit Jerusalem and other places in the Holy Land, the Committee have concluded to embrace the earliest opportunity of sending two or three missionaries to that once most highly favoured, but now benighted and desolate country.—One missionary has already been appointed to Alexandria, which from its contiguity to Syria, and its being the key of Egypt, is to be considered as an important station.

The CEYLON MISSION comprises the stations of Colombo and Colpetty, Negombo and Chilaw, Kornegalle, Cultura and Bentotte, Galle and Atamgoddy, Matura and Belligam, Jaffna and Point Pedro,

Trincomalee and Batticaloa.

In taking a general view of the state of this mission, the general Committee express their gratitude to God, that the great objects of missionary exertion have during the year, been realized in Ceylon in a very encouraging degree; and judging from the increasing influence of the mission among the natives, and the efficiency of the plans which have been so judiciously and successfully adopted by the missionaries, as well as from the effects likely to result from that promising Native Ministry which God is now raising up in almost every station, they confidently look forward to results still more beneficial and satisfactory.

From the latest accounts it appears that in different parts of the Island the number of chapels and school houses, is rapidly increasing. At one station (Negombo) five commodious chapels have been erected, free of all expense to the fund at home; fifteen substantial school houses, which in their turn serve for places of

worship, have likewise been built, where there are not less than from fifteen to twenty small congregations to which the Brethren and their assistants are in the habit

of regularly preaching the Word of God.

The numerous well-regulated and well-conducted schools throughout the Island, which are devoted to the religious and moral instruction of the rising generation continue to produce the best effects, both as preventatives of idolatry, and as means of sending into hundreds of Heathen and Mahomedan families, that leaven of christian knowledge, which it is hoped will in many instances leaven the whole lump. The growing esteem of the natives for christianity is widened by their attention to the missionaries, and the ministry of the gospel: several hopeful members have been added to the Society during the past year.

In CONTINENTAL INDIA, the stations occupied by our missionaries are Madras, Bangalore, Seringapatam and Negapatam. There are in Madras four chapels and as many schools: there is also a native society of whose true conversion to God, and spirituality the most satisfactory accounts have been from time to time

At Negapatam, the services are in English, Portuguese and Tamul. A class of serious persons chiefly of Dutch and Portuguese descent, has been formed, and also three schools in which the principles of Christianity are explicitly taught. This station is comparatively recent, and has suffered much by the removal of successive brethren through sickness; but it now promises, both in itself, and from its connexion with a populous and interesting country, to become a station of growing importance.

The SOUTH SEA MISSIONS, are next in order.— These embrace several stations in New South Wales— Van Dieman's Land—New-Zealand and the Friendly Islands. In New South Wales and Van Dieman's Land, although the moral degradation and wretchedness of the greater part of the population is extreme and awfully affecting; yet it is pleasing to learn, that the plans of the mission are organized, and are carried into effect through various departments of usefulness. Religious Societies have been raised up, and encouraging congregations attend the services.—The Sunday school Institutions continue in activity, and are also produc-

ing very encouraging effects.

Of the Mission to New Zealand, the report is less favourable. Numerous difficulties and obstacles still present themselves in this Island, incidental to the early stages of missions commenced among a barbarous and unsettled people. But though the lives of our intrepid missionaries now labouring among the furious and revengeful cannibals of that distant region, have frequently been jeoparded, the committee have full confidence in the meliorating and subduing charities of the Gospel, and look forward with hope and without impatience to the ultimate triumphs of the Gospel in New Zealand over a race the most untractable and ferocious.

From the FRIENDLY ISLANDS, no very recent information has been received. The operations of the Mission there which were for a short time suspended, have been renewed under favourable circumstances.

#### AFRICA.

In Western Africa, it has pleased the Almighty in his inscrutable and holy Providence, frequently to suffer the good work to be interrupted, and the plans of the missions to be disarranged by the death of missionaries: the important stations however of Sierra Leone and St. Mary's on the Gambiar, are at present occupied, and we have the satisfaction of knowing, that with the exception of the unhealthiness of the climate, a more interesting and encouraging field of missionary labour is not to be found in any department of the widely extended work. Very many precious souls have been won to Christ in that inhospitable clime, and a goodly number of converted Africans, are now "walking in the fear of the Lord and in the comfort of the Holy Ghost."

In Southern Africa, the missionary stations comprise—Cape Town, Little Namacqua Land, Al-

bany and Caffre Land, the Boschuana Country, Delagoa Bay and Madagascar.

In these extensive and populous regions, new and inviting scenes of usefulness are constantly presenting themselves to the christian philanthropist, and many and effectual doors have been opened by the providence of God, and by the heathen themselves, for the preaching of the Gospel. Here, not invision like the man of Macedonia, but in reality, they have presented themselves before the astonished and delighted missionary, and in the most beseeching manner have said "Come over and help us." These entreaties of the rude inhabitants of the wilds of Africa have not been disregarded, the messengers of the churches have been sent forth to their aid and comfort, and Etheopia stretches forth her hands unto the Lord.

#### AMERICA.

The West Indian Missions are the most extensive and the longest established of any connected with our missionary institution; and it may be added have been the most extensively useful, especially to the slave The missionaries in those islands from the very commencement of their work have had to encounter difficulties of various kinds, and sometimes of a very formidable nature; arising from the peculiarities of the negro character, and his enslaved condition, the prejudices and jealousies of their master and ownersthe disregard to morality and religion which prevails among all ranks-intolerant proceedings of Legislative authorities, &c. But amidst all the difficulties and opposition which it has had to encounter, "The word of the Lord has run and been glorified." To thousands and tens of thousands of the poor slaves, "the Gospel of the blessed God', has come "not in word only, but" in power, in the Holy Ghost and much assurance."-The aspect of those missions at present, is brighter and more encouraging than it has been for some time.-Many of the planters are beginning to discover, and are constrained to acknowledge, the happy influence of Christian instruction upon their slaves in promoting

among them subordination, honesty, industry, and ge-

neral good behaviour.

The proceedings of a late Missionary Meeting in Tortola are peculiarly gratifying. The Rev. William Chaderton Rector of St. George's, who so eloquently addressed the meeting last year, again came forward, and in moving the third resolution declared that "a deeply rooted and increasing assurance, that the Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Society is a chosen instrument in the hand of God for extending the knowledge and practice of our holy religion in the world impelled him to embrace that opportunity of again appearing to promote as far as his abilities could avail, the interests of that truly Christian association, and rejoiced on a review of the sentiments which in the fulness, fervour, and integrity of his heart he then expressed, adding, I do therefore with all that warmth and devotedness of affection which genuine friendship alone could inspire, repeat the substance of that solemn avowal, which must be in the memory of the majority of persons in the present meeting, and say, that I continue without the slightest change, 'an ardent admirer and zealous advocate of Methodism as taught and practised by the venerable Wesley."

Such an expression of unqualified approbation of the objects of our missions, and the general tendency of our system as a religious body, by a Clergyman of so much respectability, will we trust have the happy effect of weakening and destroying the prejudices of some who are opposed to missionary exertions.

Your Committee however cannot pass from these interesting missions in the American Archipelago, without adverting to the most mysterious and deeply afflictive providence that has ever taken place in the history of Methodism or its missions, (namely) the lamented loss of five of the Brethren belonging to those missions, with two of their wives, five children and two servants; who in returning from the district meeting, were wrecked near Antigua on the night of the 28th of last February. The particulars of this distressing and mournful event, having been so widely circulated

of 1-1y throughout the province, need not here be repeated.—Who that seriously considers all the circumstances connected with this afflictive providence, but must feel the force, and acknowledge the truth of those expressive lines

"God moves in a mysterious way,

"His wonders to perform,
"He plants his footsteps in the sea,

"And rides upon the storm,"

We doubt not but our beloved and lamented brethren, and their families, were borne by the deathful storm to the haven of eternal repose, and to the blissful reward of their mortal labours; but they have left surviving friends and the Church to lament their sudden and painful removal.

The Society in Harti, though denied by the government the liberty of public worship, and though still exposed occasionally to the insults of the rabble, continues steadfast. M. St. Dennis has been in England under the care of the committee, and is probably by this time returned to his persecuted Brethren, to take the pastoral oversight of the society, and to share their sufferings.

In Newfoundland there are twelve stations—thirteen missionaries—and upwards of a thousand members in society: there are also about a thousand children in the mission schools. The benefits which have resulted to the destitute population of that island from the Wesleyan missions, and the prospects of usefulness which

are still exhibited, are encouraging.

The mission to the Esquimaux Indians on the coast of Labrador is a recent enterprize, and has led to some important discoveries of the moral condition and wretchedness of the aboriginal inhabitants of that frozen coast, and of the facilities which exist for the dissemination of the Gospel among them. They were visited during the summers of 1824 and 1825, by two of the Brethren from Newfoundland, who agree in their report of the expediency and practicability of establishing a mission among them. And we are persuaded that the

Committee will embrace the earliest opportunity of carrying it into effect.

In CANADA, there are eleven stations, occupied by nine missionaries, whose labours in general are devoted to a destitute and scattered population. The societies

and schools are in an improving state.

In Nova-Scotia, New-Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, the number of stations amounts to twenty, and of missionaries to an equal number. This is one of our oldest missions, and under the fostering care of the Great Head of the Church, has acquired a degree of stability and importance, which encourage hopes of its continued and increasing usefulness, even to thousands yet unborn. There are in the Societies of this District, as already stated, 2219 members, and about 800 children in our Mission Schools.

In closing this rapid view of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, the Committee have great pleasure in stating to the friends of the Institution, that the amount of receipts for the year ending December 31, 1825, is Forty-five thousand seven hundred and fifty points, seventeen shillings, and one penny; being an increase above the amount of the preceding year, of L7,713 7 6. The expenditure however of the year 1825, has exceeded that of 1824, by L9,720 8 5.

For this increase in the fund, through the benevolence and zeal of the friends of missions, at home and abroad, the Committee offer their thanks to Almighty God, by whose good and "free spirit," it has been put into the hearts of the people to offer "so willingly" for the extension of his kingdom of truth and mercy upon earth.

The Committee have also the pleasure of announcing the formation during the past year, of a Missionary Branch Society for the Shelburne and Barrington Circuit.

Wherever we turn, our work enlarges before us,—the blessed work of declaring the glory and salvation of our Redeemer. Success calls for renewed exertion, and every labourer sent forth pressed by the very ripeness and richness of the field, beckons others to follow him. A state of things exists which, a very few years ago, no one could have anticipated; so that far from finding it difficult to bestow
