expanded for fish-breeding the sum of \$24,000. Of this Ontario and Quebec got not less than \$18,844, while Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and P. E. Island got but \$5,151. Will some of the organs of the Press of these provinces please to us why these things are thus;—will they enlighten us as to the fairness of devoting three-fourths of this whole sum to Ontario and Quebec, while the rivers of the Maritime Provinces are fast becoming depleted because the present partizan head of the Department will not allow his officers to enforce the fishery laws for four or five years of the "Independent Electors," as was shown by the letter of over-seer Fairbanks in our last issue. There are now even fish-breeding establishments supported by special vote of the House of Commons five of these are in Ontario and Quebec, and but two in the Maritime Provinces. Out of the whole sum of \$24,000, Nova Scotia got but \$3,803, while our Province got but \$1,883. For a supplementary vote, hurried through the House just at the end of the Session, \$5,000 was granted for fish-breeding establishments in Cape Breton and P. E. Island. The object of this is too plain to be mistaken—these are just the places where the money would do the most good, but not the places where fish-breeding houses are most wanted. At page 214 of this Report, under the head of "Fish Culture," the Inspector of Fisheries calls attention to the wants of the St. John River in the following words:

"In my last annual report I called attention to the great fall in the fisheries of the St. John River, owing to several causes inseparable from advancing civilization. Among these the most important are the clearing up of the wilderness, the extension of lumbering operations, the multiplication of mills, and increasing fishing. All these causes combined are so altering the conditions of the river that it is not surprising that the fish supply yearly diminishes. The only remedy for this natural result is the extension of the fishery to the St. John River, whence its several tributaries could be reached, and the most effective accession to the natural increase, would tend greatly to restore this fishery by counteracting the causes above specified. You will perceive by the reports of the several officers of the fishery that the fish supply of the St. John River has been kept up in the seven counties through which it flows. There is no river in the Maritime Provinces where an extensive fishery would so well repay the expense of its establishment and support, and I beg to commend the matter to your favourable consideration."

Will the representatives of the five River Counties, who have had influence with the Government, explain to their constituents how it happens that they have, for ten years, allowed nearly this whole fund to be absorbed by Ontario and Quebec, while the rivers on which seven Counties depend for their supply of fish has been utterly neglected and made the receptacle of the saw-dust and refuse from every mill on its banks, to the almost utter ruin of its fish supply? Will Isaac and Uncle Chas. Big John and Little John and the Fluke explain these little matters when they ask their constituents for a renewal of that money which they have so basely betrayed?

Free Coal to Canada.
The Montreal "Journal of Commerce" gives the following figures of the coal trades of the Canadas, and the effect of its being admitted free.—The figures are for year ending June 30, 1877.
Anthracite coal, 420,011 tons; value \$1,708,467—all, except 4,111 tons, from the States.
Bituminous coal, from Great Britain 160,173 tons; value \$401,644. From the United States, 353,795 tons; value \$1,305,510.
Other coal and coke, 45,712 tons; value \$161,367.
For coal and coke, therefore, we paid \$5,669,728. That is to say, the importers paid that sum, that adding costs and charges and a reasonable profit, we may safely place the cost to the people of Canada at five millions of dollars in gold.

At the same time we had in Canada abundance of every description of coal (except Anthracite), but our mines were idle, and millions of capital invested in them unemployed, and miners in some parts of Nova Scotia actually starving and only saved from death by starvation through supplies of food furnished them at the expense of the Local Government of that Province!!

The Richest Commoner in Scotland.
Mr. John Gordon of Cluny Castle, the reputed richest commoner in Scotland, died in London on the 31st ult. He owned large estates in different counties. He was a lively, energetic, and successful man, and held in his own hands the home farm of Cluny which in every sense of the term is a model farm. A large and valuable herd of short-horned cattle had been kept there for several years, the herd and farm as well as the whole estate, yielding about \$25,000 rental, being under management of a Mr. Ronald Macdonald. Two years ago he began unaided, the construction of a harbor at Cluny, which will cost about \$50,000, while on the west coast properties he some time ago made arrangements for expending about \$4,000 in harbors. He also had in hand rather an elaborate scheme for ameliorating the condition of the crofters on his West Highland estates by means of compensations for improvements and other encouragements. He was a kind and considerate landlord, and warmly respected and esteemed by all who came into contact with him. On the various improvements on his estates he had expended since coming into possession over \$200,000. He was about 58 years of age, and was a Deputy-Lieutenant.

The Hon. Mr. Jones, Minister of Militia, is it quite evident, a man possessing vast military knowledge, and his loyalty and consequent fitness for his present position may be judged from his sentiments when he declared at a public meeting at Halifax that he would throw up his hat and cheer when the British flag was hoisted down from the flag-staff on Citadel Hill. Hearing that the Fenian army had been terminated to make an attack upon Toronto, our enterprising Minister of Militia deemed it prudent to put forth an appearance of loyalty, and he despatched seven men to protect the garrison of Toronto, which contains 10,000 stand of rifles and 100 tons of gunpowder. It is supposed that he sent this general guard on the same principle, that "one shall chase a thousand and two put ten thousand to flight."—Exchange.
