MOUNTAIN PREACHERS' FOUGHT DUEL WITH FATAL RESULTS.

**Attacked One Another With Knives
and One is Dead, The Other
Arrested.**

A MURDER CHARGE.

Louisville, Ky., June 19.—An indictment was returned on Thursday, but not made public until today, charging Rev. Isaac Perry with the murder of Rev. Robert Vanover. The two ministers, both well known mountain preachers, had been holding revival meetings in Whiteley county, and quarrelled over some charges which had been laid against

Vanover. The trouble reached its height during a service in the Rock Creek Baptist Church a week ago, and Vanover and Perry, armed with knives fought a duel in the building while the people, in a panic, fled. Vanover's throat was cut from ear to ear and he died in a short time. Perry and his brother, Blaine, are in jail at Williamsburg.

DEATH OF ALBERTA PATRIOT.

One by one the pioneers of Alberta are passing away and in the death of Rev. Dr. Herdman, not only has the Presbyterian church, but the whole of Western Canada, lost another of its truly great men.

The work of the late Dr. Herdman and Dr. McKillop in southern Alberta and Dr. McQueen in northern Alberta will be as lasting as eternity. The first two "rest from their labors and their works do follow them."

Rev. Dr. Herdman came to Calgary in 1885, when this city was a little village and when Presbyterianism was represented by a very weak congregation with no church, services being held in a small wooden building on Seventh Avenue. With that firm faith in the future which characterized his whole life, he set to work and before two years had passed the congregation had a fine stone place of worship. From this small beginning Presbyterianism has since gone steadily ahead until the present, when it is represented by eight large congregations. Dr. Herdman's life and influence were not confined to his own denomination but to his own people. He was the friend of all and many a life has been made better and many a dependent one who was not of his own faith, but who was encouraged by his kindly words and broad sympathy. As a citizen, he was esteemed by every one with whom he came in contact, and his influence on the civic life of Calgary in its formation period was great and always on the side of truth and right.

As a pastor he was beloved by his congregation and honored by the ministers, not only of his own denomination, but of every other denomination, for his sterling character and great ability. When called upon to fill the position of superintendent of missions for Alberta and eastern British Columbia, he felt reluctant to leave his beloved Knox church, but saw that it would open for him a wider field of usefulness. Everyone felt that no worthier selection could have been made to carry on the great work of the foundations of which had been so nobly laid. Following the example of his predecessor he travelled up and down the large district entrusted to his charge, encouraging lonely young missionaries, visiting the settlers in their homes on the prairies, the lumber and mining camp of the moun-

tains; wherever he felt there was need of his services. Like the Master whom he served "He went about doing good." Dr. Herdman died at the comparatively early age of 54 years, a martyr to duty, but who will say that his life work was not accomplished?

The above is from the Calgary Alberta, and tells of the work of the late Dr. Herdman, who was formerly a resident of Campbellton.

MOST MODERN CATTLE ACCOMMODATIONS AT DOMINION EXHIBITION

The most modern of live stock accommodations will be afforded exhibitors at the Dominion Exhibition. St. John, N. B., September 15th to 15th, indeed the new facilities embody the latest and most approved idea and will be appreciated by both exhibitor and visitor. The cattle barn proper, 500 head will be housed within easy exchange. In connection with each stall there will be running water and other modern improvements. A patient litter carrier suspended from a rail-truck in the ceiling will be utilized to remove all accumulations, while the drainage will be perfect. Show pens will be accommodated in keeping with most modern ideas. From central elevated walks spectators will be afforded an excellent view of the animals as they wander around their six foot pens. The carpentry work will be open or picketed assuring constant circulation of air. The fignery will follow this same plan of erection, especial attention to ventilation, freedom from overcrowding, lighting and light-seeing. Heretofore exhibits of horses have been made in long rows of box stalls only, but this year special provision is being made for harness horses in new barns arranged with broad aisles. Poultry and Pig Stock are to be shown in what was formerly known as Agricultural Hall where much more space is available and a comprehensive display is possible.

COW TESTING FACTS FOR DAIRY FARMERS

**What These Lists Have
Shown in Instances on
Other Farms**

COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

Every little while facts come to light which speak in far-reaching tones of the value of cow testing to the dairy farmers. For instance, a letter is just received at the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, from Mr. George Wise, of Shelburne, Man., which reads as follows: "I am pleased, that I was led to see what my cows are doing, though now only just entering my second year of recording each cow's doings, see there is a great difference in the returns from the creamery and of course it is there we should find the change. Note the remarkable gain for the first four months of 1910. In 1909 from January the 1st to April the 30th we were milking 3 cows and received 1129.59 for cream sold. In 1910, during the same period, we milked only eight cows and received for 125.03. Further, we made butter this year for a household of nine persons, last year we bought our butter. These are actual facts. The only difference is a few extra all winter, but I have sold cows that were poor ones, though one of them made a good showing the first six months of the year. The cows picked up wonderfully on a selling crop in September. The returns show it and every animal went into winter quarters fat."

It will be noted that Mr. Wise, besides the butter used at home, made an extra hundred dollars in four months with a smaller herd. The cows are being selected. The records show which cows to keep and the fact that records are kept induces the owner to have his herd better in every way. Cow testing pays.

REV. DR. HERDMAN CALLED TO REWARD

**One of Albertas Really
Great Citizens Sum-
moned
A PIONEER**

At a meeting of the session of Knox church, held last night a resolution of condolence was passed in Mrs. Herdman and family's death.

The funeral will take place at Knox on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. In the beautiful cemetery, amid the murmuring pines, in the place which he lived so much, in life and in which he took such a great interest, all that was mortal of Rev. Dr. Herdman will be laid to rest until the resurrection morn.

The funeral services will be conducted by Rev. Mr. Miller of Bangor, and it is likely that memorial services will be arranged for in Calgary.

Mrs. Herdman received yesterday a very sympathetic message of condolence from the moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church of Canada, now in session in Halifax. The message expressed the appreciation of the members of the assembly of the Christian character and the noble work of Dr. Herdman, and regret at his death.

The late Dr. Herdman was a native of Pictou county, N. S., a country that has produced a great many of the best men of the province. At a young man of 25 years of age he came to Alberta, which was his home up to the time of his death at the comparatively early age of 54 years. He survived by a sorrowing widow and a family of two sons and one daughter the sympathy for whom will be expressed by the people of the coast where Dr. Herdman was loved and esteemed—Albertan Calgary.

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FIELDING'S WONDERFUL RECORD AS MINISTER OF FINANCE.

**Has Shown
but On
Continue Passes Hund-
red Million Mark.**

CANADA'S GROWING TIME.

William Surplus Fielding would be no had name for a Minister of Finance who has had an unbroken record of annual surpluses, save in one case, ever since assuming the said portfolio. The one exception was a deficit the first year of his occupancy of the office, and was the last grasp of Fosterian finance. Since then, almost every successive year has made a new record. The figures are now out for the fiscal year ending March 31st 1901, and they tell a tale of wonder. The total revenue from all sources was \$101,591,084, a gain of not less than sixteen and one-half millions over that of last year, and is memorable for the fact that for the first time we have reached and passed the hundred million mark; and this vast growth of Federal income has been the result of always speaking of revenue as taxation because the Liberal tariff schedule has saved the taxpayer one hundred million dollars in twelve years.

The ordinary expenditures of the consolidated expenditure on Consolidated Fund Account, during the fiscal year just closed came to \$72,409,849, a decrease of four and a half millions compared with the previous year.

The expenditure on Capital Account, that is the amount spent by the Government in permanent investments, bound to yield revenue in a short time, came to \$4,114,994. According to the estimate of government book-keeping which has obtained since—confederacy, and of which Hon. Geo. E. Foster was always a vigorous defender

CONSERVATION OF NATURAL RESOURCES.

Thousands of instances are known where men have been left, or have come into large sums of money, that was speedily spent—squandered, with want and destitution as the result. The man doubtless felt that there could be no end of his money but it came, Canada—the several provinces have been acting too largely upon this foolish idea. We, to a far too great degree, have squandered, wasted, our timber resources, and with that, involving the destruction of our forest areas—has come other forms of loss. The removal of our forest has removed the natural reservoir of our rains. The water coming from melting snows in spring-time rushes off in a few days, and after that our streams are reduced to a dribble. Hill slopes, left bare of trees are gutted with miniature ravines from rainfalls, which the naked hill sides permit of running away as rapidly as it falls. With a covering of trees the moisture would be retained to a large extent by the fallen leaves, and would ooze out gently to refresh the adjacent cleared soil; it would then be a blessing instead of an injury. This is only a type of the waste that justifies the present zeal in conservation of natural resources. Our water power sources, our mineral resources, our fishing and game resources are in need of conservation—we must not live upon our capital. If proper conservation methods had been adopted years ago in regard to our timber supply, more would have been left, than exists now, and would be of greater value. We must provide against our forest, mineral and other resources being wasted by reckless and unskillful exploitation and from being allowed to be tied up by speculative private ownership.

Canada, in taking action in the direction of conservation at an early period, compared with other countries that have wasted their resources to a much more serious extent than we have done. Last September the Canadian Conservation Commission was constituted, and has entered upon its truly important national work, with promise of immensely important national benefit.

Besides a wife, he leaves one daughter, Maggie, and five sons, Alexander, James, Henry, Charles and John, one brother, James at Mann's Settlement, and five sisters, Mrs. Porter Miles, at Riverside, Mrs. Hamilton, at Campbellton, Mrs. George Elvir, of Flatlands, Mrs. Cassy, Jacques River, and Miss Annie at home. Mr. Lyons was 83½ years of age.

THE JERUSALEM TEMPLE

Moriah is regarded as having seen the first of the Masonic rites, and though the site of that temple is occupied, and hence unavailable for the new temple, a suitable site is to be obtained at reasonable cost, in Jerusalem. The plan for the temple has received commendation from Masons, as it is logically should. It is an interesting undertaking.

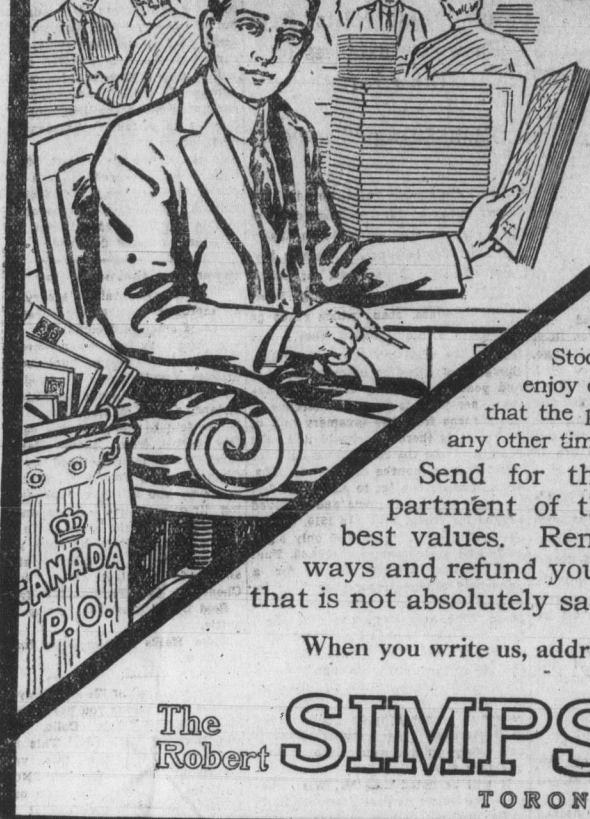

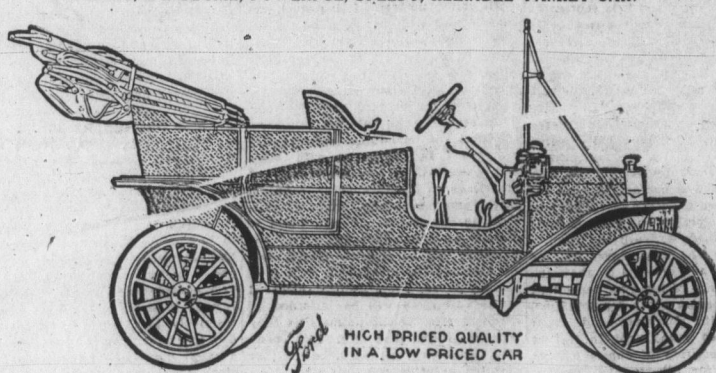

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry, (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
