





When You Have a Cold. There are apt to be symptoms of weepiness" with a cold. The lids are red and sometimes swollen. Particularly is this so if the eyes are inclined to be at all weak. Under these conditions don't use them more than is necessary and bathe with a mixture of two ounces of camphor water and two grains of borax For this use an eye cup. Half fill it with the wash, adding a little hot water to take off the chill. Fit the cup over the eye, throw the head back, opening the eye wide, letting the liquid bathe every portion of the eyeball. This will reduce any irritation, also remove any inflammation. Aching limbs and joints are more than often an accompaniment of a cold. A good general rubbing with alcohol or spirits of camphor will take away the stiffness. The fever accompanying a cold affects the hair as well as the body, so that daily massage will be necessary. This will prevent the hair falling and also aid in keeping up the general circulation.


