SCOTT ACT DEFEATED

Election Yesterday a Victory for Rumsellers

GOOD VOTE POLLED

Both Sides Put Up Good Fight—The Vote in town

For some two or three weeks the campaign for or against the adoption of the Scott Act has been pushed with all enthusiasm possible in the limited time between announcement of election and polling day. Both sides were fairly well organized on entering the contest with the ballot yesterday, and it may be said to the credit of all concerned that the polling in town took place very quietly and without any unusual disturbance.

Majority against Act 147

The most striking feature of the situation is the Belmont vote, where only a baker's dozen recorded their votes for the Act. That parish once more puts forth its claim for the pivotal turning point of all elections.

The Temperance people have reason to be proud of the vote in town, where a majority of 130 was gained for the Act. This is even better than was expected.

That the temperance workers are not discouraged is shown by the fact that immediately on receipt of the returns a meeting was called to discuss the next step in the temperance cause. After some discussion in which the dominant note seemed to be more aggressive work than ever, it was resolved that a committee of three from each denomination be appointed to take the proper steps for bringing into force the prohibitory clause of the Licence Act and also to deal with violations of the Canada Act and Liquor Licence Act in the manner provided by law.

BONAVENTURE NEWS

Revote for New Carlisle Wharf

OTHER IMPROVEMENTS

Mr Marcell Secures More Grants for His County

(Special to Events)

April 22—Considerable interest is manifested in the County of Bonaventure in the improvements which Mr. Marcell M. P. and now Deputy Speaker of the Commons has been able to secure for us.

The main estimates which are now before Parliament contain an item of \$10,000 which is a revote of the \$10,000 voted last session for an extension of New Carlisle wharf. In this connection I may state Mr. Marcell has been informed that tenders will be called this council week for an extension of 215 feet to New Carlisle wharf, said work to be completed within one year of the signing of the contract which will mean May 1906.

Considerable timber has already been cut for this work. The improvement will make the New Carlisle wharf among the finest in the Baie des Chaleurs.

It will be remembered that early last spring the "Str. Adurial" struck the New Carlisle wharf and was thought to have left some wreckage there. For this reason the "Str. Restigouche" did not stop at New Carlisle wharf and the citizens of that place were put to the inconvenience of having to go to Paspébiac.

Mr. Marcell is taking measures to have this state of affairs remedied and has asked the Marine Department to take such steps as are necessary to satisfy the Interprovincial Navigation Company that the "Lady Eileen" may go up to New Carlisle wharf in perfect safety. Certificates from the wharfing Mr. Chisholm and Billingsley have been handed in that the ground is clear of wreckage. Additional steps will be taken if necessary to have New Carlisle wharf included in the route of the new steamer.

Considerable interest is manifested in the county as to what the supplementary estimates will contain for Bonaventure. I think there will be found amounts for the completion of the wharves or breakwaters commenced at the following place—Gaspé, Port Daniel East, St. Godfrey, Paspébiac, Bonaventure East, New Richmond together with amounts to authorize the extension of the ferry wharves at Cross Point and Migashua. There may also be an amount for improvements for the benefit of fishermen at Caplin River. Several other minor improvements all along the coast may be authorized out of the general votes. A-

mong these will be some dredging at Cross Point, Maria and New Carlisle wharves and perhaps at New Richmond but this is contingent upon the government being able to spare a dredge during the coming season.

There may be a grand demonstration at Paspébiac on Dominion Day Saturday July 1st in honor of the laying of the first rail of the new Gaspé Railway, the new steamer service, and the new government wharf at that place. There will be an excursion from Campbellton to Paspébiac calling at all the intermediate places, by the "Str. Lady Eileen" which has been very generously tendered by the Directors to the Federal representatives of Gaspé, Restigouche and Bonaventure in recognition of their services to the new company in the public interest. 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QUEBEC FOREST LAW

Farmers Allowed to Burn Brush at Once

UNDER NEW LAND BILL.

Mr Kelly Member for Bonaventure Secures exception for his County

(Special to Events)

At the session of 1904 the Quebec Legislature brought in a new Land Bill which is now being enforced throughout the Province.

Under this new land Bill, no settler or farmer is allowed to light a fire or clear his land from the 15th of June, and from the first of September to the 15th of November.

This law practically prevented the people of Bonaventure from clearing land at all, for no one would risk lighting a fire to burn the brush on his field in July and August when his crop would be growing and everything very dry.

At the request of Mr. Kelly, the minister of crown lands, the Hon. Adolard Turgeon, has made an exception for Bonaventure, and in that county, settlers will be allowed to set fire to their brush in clearing land up to the first of June, and to commence again on the first of October.

This will permit settlers to burn at once and be ready to crop their land this season, and will not run the risk of seeing their crops fences, and buildings placed in danger, as would be the case were they obliged to burn in the dry months of July and August.

This exception to the law applies only to Bonaventure and Mr. Kelly is to be congratulated on obtaining this change and privilege for his constituency.

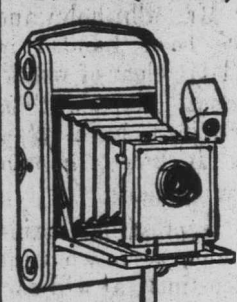

WHY EASTER DAY COMES SO LATE.

This year Easter Day (April 23rd) is very late. The feast, of course, falls on no regular date. It may be as early as March 22nd and as late as April 25th. In 1886 it fell on the latter day—the first time in many years. It will not be so late as April 25th again during the present generation, and it will not come on April 23rd again until 1916, 11 years hence. Last year April 3rd was Easter Day, so that there is a difference of 20 days, or nearly three weeks, between the Easter of 1904 and that of 1905.

Easter is the movable feast which regulate the dates of all other feasts, except of course, Christmas, which is stationary. As Christmas comes on the one day, the period of time between that feast and Easter varied. This period is filled up in the ecclesiastical calendar by Sundays after Epiphany, which are numerous or few as the situation requires. When Easter is early there are two, three or four Sundays after Epiphany, but when Easter is late there may be six. This year there were five.

At the end of the Epiphany season Lent begins, and this period is regulated by the date of Easter. Ash Wednesday, the first day in Lent, is seven Wednesday's back from the Wednesday before Easter. Sometimes this day comes in February, and sometimes in March. Why is Easter not kept on a fixed day, as is the case with Christmas? The explanation lies in the fact that Easter corresponds with the Passover of the Mosaic dispensation.

It will be remembered that the Crucifixion took place on "the day of the preparation for the passover." The Passover was on our Saturday. The day of preparation was Friday. It was on the day before the Passover then that the great event occurred. Now the Passover has been celebrated during the period of the first full moon in the spring. In order therefore to strike the exact date the date of the Passover should be observed. It happens, however, that notwithstanding the argument which makes for the observance of Easter contemporaneously with Passover, such observance is not followed. Easter and the Passover are commemorated at the same time only once or twice in a century. The phenomenon occurred in 1903 but it had not happened before for 80 years. The divergence arises out of an ancient controversy between the Eastern and Western churches. By the Eastern churches the date of the Passover was adopted for Easter. By the Western churches on the other hand, the Sunday following the Passover was kept.

A heated controversy arose on this question of the proper date, and in the year 325, at the Council of Nicea, the practise of the Western Churches was sustained. It is clear that as the Crucifixion took place on Friday, the day of the Passover, Saturday could not be the day of the Resurrection. The Nicæan Council, in addition to deciding that Sunday should be the day to be observed, laid down rules for finding that particular Sunday which should be known as Easter Day. The chief rules were these: The first after the full moon, which happens upon or after the 21st of March, is Easter. These rules show how it happens that the date of Easter varies so much in different years. If there is a full moon on Saturday, March

21st, Easter Day will be March 22. If, on the other hand, there is a full moon on Sunday, March 22, Easter Day falls on March 29. Should the full moon come on March 20th, the next moon, that of a month hence rules. This is why the Easter of one year is a month away from the date of the Easter of another year.

The rule works out for 1905 in this way. There is a full moon on March 20. That moon does not affect the question. It comes just a day too early. The next full moon is on April 19. The Sunday following that full moon is April 23. April 23 is therefore Easter Day. Our almanacs always figure out the seasons for us, and the average man as a result is not bothered with difficult calculations with respect to them. It was otherwise in olden times. In order to meet the needs of those days the church furnished a ready means whereby the faithful might circulate the date of Easter in any year. This method is to be found in the preliminary pages to the Book of Common Prayer. There "A table to find Easter," figure, There, too, we read of "Sunday Letters" and "Golden Numbers."

It is to be doubted that the average man, even the devoted churchman, to-day, concerns himself about "Sunday Letters" and "Golden Numbers" yet these have an interesting bearing upon the case and while highly useful in their day, were tributes to the ingenuity of our ancestors.

The main idea of the tabular system for the discovery of the date of Easter is somewhat similar to that which regulates a life insurance table. You find the "Golden Number" of the year on the left hand side of the table, and the table and the Sunday Letter" on top. Then you trace the one forward and the other downward until they meet, and there the date of Easter for that particular year is found. The "Golden Number" of a year is discovered by adding one to the year and divided by 19. Whatever remains is the number in question. The "Sunday Letter" is found by adding one-fourth of the year, to the year and then dividing by 7. If there is no remainder the "Sunday Letter" is A. If 1 remains the letter is G. If 2 remains the letter is F, and so on. It appears that the "Golden Number" for 1906 is 6, while the "Sunday Letter" is A. Thus, according to the table, Easter falls on April 23. The plan of calculation is very, very old, and bears testimony to the mathematical skill of its framers.

It must be said that the late Easter such as we are having this year, is the seasonable Easter. It speaks, at all events in this climate, more directly of the new life, the life of spring, than the early Easter does. The queen of seasons is more joyous in the warmth and brightness of the spring than in the dreary days of an unfinished winter.

A despatch from Fredericton says there is about 28,000,000 or 30,000,000 feet of lumber in the booms at Donnas and Lincoln and besides this there are bank logs and small operators cuts that can be brought out, but there is 105,750,000 to come in the St. John Log Driving Company's corporation drive, and if that lumber is all hung up the result will be most serious.

Chamberlain policeman, both at same salary as last year and that Jackson Miller be appointed special policeman to go on duty 1st June and continue on the force for a period of six months at salary of \$40 per month. Carried.

WHISKEY DRINKING

A Comparative Statement of Amount Consumed by the Nations

Washington, April 24th — As drinkers of whiskey and other hard liquors the people of the United States stand fifth on the list of the nations of the world. At the foot of the list is Italy, and at its head Austria. Almost in inverse ratio to the amount of distilled liquors consumed is the quantity of wine drunk. In this column France comes first, with an average annual per capita consumption of 34.73 gallons, while the United States is almost at the foot of the list, with an average consumption of only 0.53 gallons for each individual.

Reporting to the consumption of spirituous liquors, Austria consumes an average per capita of 3.09 gallons, Hungary, 2.19 gallons; Germany, 2.11 gallons; France, 1.85 gallons; the United States, 1.18 gallons; the United Kingdom, 1.38 gallons; and Russia, 1.35 gallons, while the Italians drink an average of only 0.34 gallon a year. Among the wine drinkers of the world the Frenchmen takes first place, with an average consumption of 34.73 gallons, while Great Britain consumes only 0.39 gallon to the individual. Other countries arranged in an ascending scale are: United States, 0.53 gallons; Germany, 2.08 gallons; Hungary, 3.75 gallons; Austria, 6.85 gallons; Portugal, 14.12 gallons; Spain, 17.82 gallons; and Italy, 28.06 gallons.

The statistics of beer consumption are available for only eight countries, with a total of \$5,753,000,000 gallons annually. Germany had a total consumption of 1,782,000,000; the United Kingdom, 1,501,000,000; the United

The presents were both beautiful and numerous and included a check from the bridegroom's father, John Scott, of York, of \$500. Mr and Mrs Scott left by the evening I. C. R. train on a trip to the upper provinces.

Among the new companies that have been incorporated is the Chatham Co-operative Co. Ltd. The incorporators are J. L. Stewart, R. A. Murdoch, George Watt, J. V. Messereau and others, of Chatham. The capital stock is \$5,000. Most of the machinery has been placed, a stock of wood has been secured, and the factory began running on Wednesday Mr. Chatham is in charge of the mill and W. H. McLachlan is secretary. The machinery in operation consists of a cut-off saw, a cylindrical saw, a bolt and an edger, driven by a 45 h. p. engine. Only barrel staves are sawed at present, but a machine for sawing barrel heads, shooks and shingles has been ordered. The machinery is running smoothly and the men are fast learning the work. An order for 25,000 staves has been received. The present force will turn out between 5000 and 6000 a day. The plant will be largely increased if the business proves to be profitable. There are nine persons engaged at the factory now.—World.

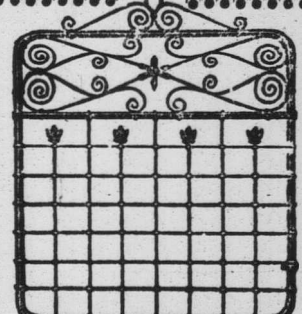

The Only Woman Who Does Diplomatic Work for the Government. There are very many women who render valuable services to the United States government in the various departments in Washington, but Miss Margaret M. Hanna is the only woman in Uncle Sam's employ who does diplomatic work. Her business is the handling at the department of state in Washington of correspondence which relates to diplomatic affairs. She is, in fact, the assistant of the second

assistant secretary of state. Though still in her twenties, she has occupied this position ever since 1896. Her salary is \$1,800 a year. Miss Hanna is pretty, with blond hair and graceful manners. Ann Arbor, Mich., claims her as her birthplace. She is an excellent linguist, understanding both French and Spanish, and when the arbitration party went from this country to The Hague a couple of years ago to settle the question of the disposition of the pious fund she went along as translator of Spanish, doing incidentally some stenographic reporting. On a more recent occasion Miss Hanna did the same kind of work in connection with the Venezuelan claims commission.

When You Have a Cold.

There are apt to be symptoms of "wheeziness" with a cold. The lids are red and sometimes swollen. Particularly in this so if the eyes are inclined to be at all weak. Under these conditions don't use them more than is necessary and bathe with a mixture of two ounces of camphor water and two grains of borax. For this use an eye cup. Half fill it with the wash, adding a little hot water to take off the chill. Fit the cup over the eye, throw the head back, opening the eye wide, letting the liquid bathe every portion of the eyeball. This will reduce any irritation, also remove any inflammation. Aching limbs and joints are more than often an accompaniment of a cold. A good general rubbing with alcohol or spirits of camphor will take away the stiffness. The fever accompanying a cold affects the hair as well as the body, so that daily massage will be necessary. This will prevent the hair falling and also aid in keeping up the general circulation.

Placental Headlines.

Many people must have been struck by the utter absence of interesting conversation that is so marked a feature of modern meetings. In the olden days all the wit and brightness of the time seemed to focus about the breakfast and dinner tables, and nearly all the celebrated stories of wit and repartee that have come down in history have been originated during mealtime. Nowadays people speak of their worries and troubles at the table, look up their time and read papers during breakfast, and if there is anything disagreeable to tell they prefer mealtime for such remarks. It has been suggested that children should be trained to speak well and cheerfully during meals, just as they are trained to do properly. Each habit will cling and make them much sought after in society. Worry is bad on the digestion, and so is the fashion of bolting the food. Both are hard on your neighbor and ruinous to one's digestion and intellect.

The Home to Come To.

The ideal home is one in which the inmates think more of their duties than of their rights and recognize that they are responsible for each other's happiness. To be admitted to such a hearth, warmed by the crimson flame of charity and household affection, bright with the sparkle of gaiety and rarer flash of wit, illumined by the glow of thought and clear light of sincerity, beautiful with courtesy, forbearance and refinement, its atmosphere vital with the oxygen of moral purity and open to currents of fresh ideas, adorned by culture and social amenity and securely built upon righteousness and faith, is moral regeneration as well as happiness and rest. Whether rich or poor, with many or few inmates or only one, any hearth may breathe this home spirit, while to come home to somebody in such a haven is the best and most lasting of earthly joys.—Max Gray, Author of "The Silence of Dean Maitland," in "Black and White."

And well do women know this, yet it is experience alone that teaches them that the only way to hold the love and interest of a man is to keep him guessing what chameleon trick she will next spring upon him. Once realizing and acting upon this knowledge, she holds the key of the citadel, his heart, and may defy the world.—Exchange.

The Tailor Made Gown.

Women take a lot better care of their evening gowns than those in which they are seen daily. Isn't it strange how many women will wear a tailor made day after day every time they go out, yet never think of having it pressed? Yet a man always has the suit he isn't wearing in the hands of his tailor, being cleaned and pressed. Women's tailor makes are a good deal like men's clothes nowadays—that is, in the cloths of which they are made. They are almost as liable to being knosed or wrinkled, and there's nothing fresher a gown like a good brushing and pressing.

Stuffed Eggs.

Stuffed eggs for luncheon or supper are always good. Boil the eggs hard and after they have cooled cut in two crosswise. Mash the yolks and mix with lobster or anchovy paste, minced parsley, salt and pepper. Minced ham or chicken may be substituted for the fish paste, and chopped gardenias are sometimes liked. A little lemon juice is a necessity when fish is used. Fill the white cups neatly and place on ice to chill. If the dish is to present an appearance, serve the eggs in aspic with lettuce leaves underneath. Mayonnaise accompanies the eggs.

Bedsteads.

"Among all the useless things that afflict society," said the housekeeper, "it would perhaps be impossible to find anything more entirely absurd than the high headboards and footboards with which beds are furnished. A bed needs only a footboard and headboard high enough to support the pillows and keep the coverings where they belong, and the superfluous material now put into such projections not only make the bed clumsy and hard to move, but necessitate its being placed near the wall, but with the high headboard against the wall."

The Sewing Machine.

The sewing machine still bothered me by running hard even after I had thoroughly oiled and cleaned it, says one woman. But at last I found one place that I had neglected—the throat plate. All that was necessary was to remove the screw and lift that little cover where the needle runs in and out. There was such an accumulation of dust and dirt that the trouble was easily accounted for.

Cheese Souffle.

Four two cups of hot milk over two cups of cream. Add a cupful of grated cheese, three beaten eggs. Bake as an omelet (this will make two), and when one side is done set it in the oven until brown. A much longer time is required in the cooking than for the ordinary omelet. It should puff to a thickness of at least two inches and be of a uniform golden brown.

Woman's Work.

To woman it is given to add many folds to the enjoyment which the wealth products of industry are able to secure. It is the present duty of the economist to magnify the office of the wealth expenditure. There is no economic function higher than that of determining how wealth shall be used. More discriminating choice necessitates more discriminating production.—Exchange.

For the Kitchen.

Little medicine cups, with teaspoonful, tablespoonful and wineglassful indicated in raised letters, are valuable to have in the kitchen. The usual method of guessing at the right quantity of salt, still masquerading as other cooking material is not to be recommended. Teaspoons are not made in any uniform size. Medicine glasses are.

Canned Fruit For Dessert.

Canned fruit may be used for desserts in many ways. The juice in the can should be heavily sweetened and boiled down to a sirup. This makes the fruit richer. Common canned peaches heated in a thick sirup and served with cream are very good indeed. Canned raspberries make a delicious Bavarian cream or charlotte russe.

Charm of Good Humor.

Women who ask how to make themselves charming can be given no better advice than to cultivate good humor, which is more than anything else the chief cornerstone of adaptability.—Chicago Tribune.

Turkish towels may be cut into

squares and finished round the edge with buttonhole stitch in bright colored cotton, the result being cheap but useful mats for the washstand.

Do not wash the wooden bread plate

in hot water, and it will not turn black. Wash with soap and warm water and rinse in clean cold water.

A ham is greatly improved if after

being boiled it is wrapped in buttered paper and baked for an hour.

Borax and water make a good wash

for a sore mouth.
