Pr said he cautioned CR three times against quarrelling with the 21 M, and that in consequence of his lifting his hand to him, he shot him. Pr asked Ws to send him up a change of clothes. We told him that as he was to be taken in the steamboat to St Andrews they might be put on board as he passed the Ledge and asked for a list of what he wanted, this the Pr readily made out; they shook hands and parted. We saw the body at the inquest, the jaws were shattered and saw a great part carried away.

David Mearns Esq (sworn) held an inquest on the body of CR on the 18th of Oct., the face was lacerated thro' and thro', the upper jaw carried away; evidence of the cause of death so direct, it was not deemed necessary to have a surgical examination of the deceased. Samuel A. Esq (sworn) Examination of the Pr's eyes were taken before him. Hanson's evidence was taken down and shown to Pr; he asked Hanson if CR had not attempted to strike him at the moment he took his life, he also asked "did I or did I not caution CR not to do so?"
