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# TELEGRAPH NEWS.

**LONDON, April 1st.**  
The House of Commons to-night in Committee agreed to all the House of Lords amendments except one to the Irish force bill. Discontent in Ireland seems to be increasing. The evening papers publish a long list of outrages recently committed there. Emigration to the United States has increased to a remarkable extent within the past few days.

Three fourths of the stock of the Atlantic Cable Company have voted in favor of consolidation with the Anglo-American and French Cable Companies.

**FREDERICTON, April 1.**  
House in committee on School Bill.

Mr. Needham made a very feeling speech in favor of the bill. He took the broad ground that the state is bound to provide education for every child born within its boundaries, and he eloquently and fearlessly argued for the principle of direct taxation. When he had concluded Mr. King rose and said that it was now his duty to inform the House that the Government had decided to withdraw their School Bill. He thought this action might be open to many objections, but in it they were doing what they could with the light they had.

He was evidently much affected while speaking, and with good reason; for it was a hard thing for him to do. Mr. Moore followed, withdrawing his motion of postponement and complimenting Mr. King for his course in the matter. Several others followed in the same strain.

**April 2nd.**  
A Bill to give \$15,000 in aid of Carleton, St. John, Branch Railway: Report of Select Committee on Claim of Mr. Buchanan: Bill to continue and make perpetual Act for establishing and maintaining a police force in the Parish of Portland with amendments: Bill relating to Bastardy with amendments—agreed to in Committee.

A Bill to abolish the Provincial Board of Agriculture, after a short discussion, postponed three months.

The House will be prorogued on Wednesday next.

Carleton, St. John Railway Subsidy Bill read a third time.

**Their Real Object.**

Is there a man of sense in the Dominion so dull as to believe that the late move of Messrs. Huntington and Galt in behalf of a Customs Union and the separate treaty making power was intended to promote the trade and commerce of the Dominion? Is it not palpable that the sole aim of that movement was simply to set the Independence ball in motion? Shrewd as Mr. Mackenzie is, earnest and sincere as were his declarations of fealty to the Empire in his clever speech during the debate on the Huntington Zollverein scheme, and the Galt treaty making pretence, he was taken in, and done for, when he followed Galt and Huntington into the lobby in voting against Sir John A.'s amendment to Sir A. T. Galt's amendment to Huntington's bungling Customs Union resolutions. It is true, that Huntington pretended that his Zollverein nostrum was the very thing needed to render Independence impossible. It is equally true that Galt argued that the possession and exercise of the separate treaty making power was just what was requisite to render Independence unnecessary; and some fools from New Brunswick were silly enough to believe both of them. Well, there always have been fools in the world, and we suppose always will be. But it is a pity that they should occupy the place that ought to be filled by sensible people.—[News.]

**From our Frederiction Correspondent.**

**FREDERICTON, April 4th, 1870.**  
Dear Standard,  
The past week has been characterized in its history by some events that will be long remembered in New Brunswick, many of which reflect no great credit to the Province. Much disappointment was felt when Mr. Needham withdrew his Bill to abolish imprisonment for debt and provide for the attachment of property. Many members referred to this subject, and all evidently sincere—with regret that the Honorable member had felt it his duty in justice, as he claimed, to the principle of the Bill to adopt this course. Among these I may mention the Hon. Mr. King, Mr. Moore, Mr. Stevenson and Mr. White, who had all taken part in the progress of the Bill, with a view of making its provisions as perfect as possible. The Attorney General, when the Bill was a second and third time under consideration in committee, had offered considerable opposition. Yet the most of the Bill as submitted had been adopted, and carried through after very considerable discussion. It is unfortunate that New Brunswick is so slow to adopt a Bill of this character, when in many respects it is so far in advance of some other colonies of Great Britain. The House has done a great deal of business this week. Supply was got through or nearly so on Tuesday last. Many items were considerably reduced, yet I believe, it will not be found in many particulars to be satisfactory to the country. The position of the Government was pretty fully considered on the passing of the several items; the extravagance of the expenditure on Government House pretty clearly pointed out to the country, and from what was elicited, it was very apparent that the Governor has had his own way in this matter, evidently having been able to flatter the late, as well as the present, commissioner's vanity and egotism to such an extent, that they almost entirely forgot any interest but the gratification of His Excellency's wishes. There may be a few items of supplementary supply for consideration this afternoon. There was a Bill passed a few days ago to incorporate the New Brunswick & Quebec Railway Company, whose object is to build a Railway from St. Mary's, opposite Frederiction, to Edmundston, in Victoria County. There was some debate in the House on the propriety of granting this Charter as the Woodstock Railway Companies and the New Brunswick and Canada Railway and Land Company had already, as was contended, charters to build lines through the country from Woodstock towards Quebec.

Mr. Stevenson called the attention of the House to this, and drew from the Provincial Secretary that it was the intention of the Government to grant land to the Company. It would seem that there was some provision for this, but it had been withdrawn.

Mr. Stevenson contended that if lands were to be granted to any company it should be to the New Brunswick and Canada Railway or to the Woodstock Railway, and that it was not just to these corporations that another Railway Company should be incorporated so as to be thrown into competition with these lines of Railway, in view of the fact that already there had been agitation with a view of extension by these last companies towards Riviere du Loup.

On Saturday, however, a Bill was introduced, as a government measure, which I understand makes provision for granting land to any Railway Company that will build this line of Railway. The grant of \$15,000 to the Carleton Branch Railway to assist in constructing a Branch from Fairville to Sand Point, on the west side of the Harbor of St. John, where a deep water terminus is furnished by the recent sinking of a portion of the Harbor, seemed a measure required by the position of Western Extension Railway, as they are at present, without any salt water terminus, and 2 miles and a half of Railway will furnish this. The Carleton side of the Harbor are to take \$40,000 stock in the constructing of this and furnish nearly all the right of way.

The matter was not as much discussed on the floor of the House as I expected to hear. Understand however that it has been very fully discussed outside and that the amount is only half what was a first asked for by the promoters of this Railway. Mr. Stevenson insisted that there ought to be more stringent conditions attached to the bonus granted, and that a duty should be cast on the company to keep the road in repair and run it. Mr. Coram and other St. John members thought there would be no danger of the road not being run, and that if the Company should at any time become amalgamated with the Western Extension that they would see to all these conditions being complied with.

The announcement by the Hon. Mr. King on Friday last that it was the intention of the Government to withdraw the School Bill did not surprise many; for, from the introduction of the Bill, it was never believed that it was determined by the Government to carry it through. Good however will be done to the country by the ventilation through the debates and newspapers of the principles of the Bill, and the presentation of the amount of taxation involved in it. The House was somewhat affected with sorrow and sympathy for the Hon. Mr. King, whose political heart and mind and soul, as Needham sometimes says, was centred in the measure and whose depth of feeling for the success of the Bill was evidenced by the faltering tones in which he announced the intention of the Government.

There has not been so far as can be learned any reference to Mr. Bosford's matter agreeably to the Resolution of the House, and it is generally believed there never will be, and that the Government are now pretty well satisfied they were wrong in removing Mr. Bosford in the way they did. Whether, however, any provision will be made for the pay of the Assistant Clerk in the Legislative Council is uncertain. But the supposition is that as only one engrossing clerk is employed by the Council, instead of two as formerly, there will be no great difficulty in the pay of the Assistant Clerk, he doing a part of the engrossing.

There was very considerable discussion during several stages, on a Bill requiring that candidates at elections should make oath that they had not nor would not in any respect violate the provisions of the Law passed last session for the prevention of Bribery and Corruption at Elections. The fate of the Bill in the Assembly was decided

by the Chairman, Mr. Bliss, who gave the casting vote in favor of the principle of the Bill. I understand however, the Bill has been thrown out in the Legislative Council.

The Government having announced the proposition for Wednesday next, I may not write you another letter this Session of the Legislature. I may however, and hence won't bid you good-bye.

**SAINT ANDREWS, APRIL 6, 1870.**  
Owing to the heavy travelling, the mail due here on Tuesday morning, did not arrive until this morning at half-past 8 o'clock. We are obliged to omit several articles to insert our Frederiction letter, only received this day.

**THE SCHOOL BILL** brought in by Hon. Mr. King as a Government measure, we regret to learn was withdrawn by him. In making the announcement to the House, he is represented to have made a touching speech, exhibiting his regret that he had not received that support from his colleagues which he was led to believe he would have had. There is no doubt that Mr. King labored hard to perfect his School Bill, and that he fondly hoped that it would pass, and that every poor man's child in the Province would receive an education, without taxing the parents beyond an amount (not even so much) as is at present required to educate one. The principle of taxation for the support of Schools, is admitted by a majority of the people, and is gaining ground; by it, a superior class of Teachers would be obtained, and they would receive a suitable equivalent for their services; it is hardly to be expected, that any young man or woman, who has spent time and money in obtaining instruction to qualify them to impart a thorough English or Classical education, would accept the small sum now granted for their services—an amount not equal to that given to teamsters or laborers.

Instructors of youth hold one of the highest and most important offices in the State; they have to a great extent, the moulding of the minds, and qualifying the future rulers of the country; and the office should be filled by well educated and competent persons, whose social position should be equal to that of any other profession, and certainly quite as well remunerated. The question of taxation for the support of Free Schools, might be one of the test questions at the ensuing Election. The details of a Bill for the purpose, could be settled afterwards in the Legislature. A candidate who would be rejected because of his being an advocate for Free Schools, would retire, only to be placed at another time at the head of the polls.

**ACCIDENT ON THE RAILWAY.**—On Saturday night last a man named Wm. Cook was killed on the Line above the Junction, the extra Train for St. Stephen having run over him. The particulars as we heard them, are that Mr. Cook had returned from St. Stephen, and that he was at Mr. Drinkall's on business and hearing the train approaching, he ran out to push the Lorry off the track, while in the act, it is supposed the Engine struck the lorry and killed Cook, as his mangled remains were discovered next day lying on the track. No blame is attached to the driver or employees, as the night was dark, and the line should have been clear.

The International Steamers now make two trips a week between Boston and St. John, connecting with the "Queen" and "Belle Brown" at Eastport.

**ITEMS.**

—The articles of agreement for a four oared Boat Race between the "Tyne Crew" and the "Paris Crew" is published in the St. John "Globe." The race is to take place at Lachine, near Montreal, in September next.

—On Monday, the second day of May next, the Provincial Training School will be opened in Frederiction, in the building commonly known as the Stone Barracks. Forty Student Teachers will be admitted in the order of their application.

—The 45,000 rifles loaned by the imperial to the Dominion Government, and with which the Canadian Volunteers are armed, have been given as a present to Canada.

—It is said that Prince Arthur is going to cross the continent and spend a few days in California at the end of this month. On his return he will make a short stay in Montreal and return to England in a troop ship with his regiment.

—The bill to unite the cities of Boston and Charlestown passed a third reading in the Massachusetts Senate by a vote of 17 to 9.

—It is said the abducting Collector Bailey has been seen in Albany. He has written a letter, without date, to General Pleasanton, congratulating him on his accession to his place.

—It is stated information has been communicated to the President to the effect that the Virginia Legislature is preparing to abrogate its ratification of the fifteenth amendment by a coup de main, and that the members intend to rush the repeal through both House on the same day, without notice and debate.

—A quantity of arms which the Fenians had at Underhill, Vt., has recently been sent towards the frontier and a raid on Montreal is anticipated.—Bow wow.

—The Camanche Indians have just made an extensive raid in western Texas. Over forty families are reported massacred, several houses burned and several hundred horses captured. The news comes in a roundabout way and should be taken with a grain of salt.

—Lawrence Doyle died in the State Prison on Friday last, after an illness of about one week. His disease was the clotting of the blood of the heart and blood vessels. He was committed to prison May 18th 1864, under sentence of death for the murder of the Libby girl in the town of Strong. He has always asserted his entire innocence of the horrible crime of which he was convicted. He was born in Cape Breton and was 37 years of age when he died.

—The New York "World," speaking by its commercial editor, prophesies that if the Funding Bill becomes law, the violent contraction of the greenback currency will occasion disastrous commercial panic, and a financial crisis will be inevitable.

—The London correspondent of the Toronto "Globe" mentions Sir John Lubbock, the banker, and new member for Maidstone, as one of the most promising new M. P.'s. He is a man of great scientific attainments, a fine speaker, with a good voice, and a liberal, if not something more, in politics.

—Another cheque fraud in New York.—This time upon the lady brokers, Messdames Woodhull, Claflin & Co. The swindler purchased \$5,800 in gold, and gave a cheque for the money, which the bank certified. The next day, it was discovered to have been originally for \$58, and to have been "added to" the bank, having certified the draft, will suffer for the loss.

—In a despatch dated 17th February, 1869, April 6, 1870.

addressed to Sir John Young, Lord-Granville directed the Governor General to bring before the notice of the Government for amendment "An Act respecting Perjury." The Act affixes a criminal character to acts committed beyond the limits of the Dominion of Canada. Such a provision is declared to be beyond the legislative power of the Dominion.

**OTTAWA, April 2.**  
Gov. Smith arrived from Fort Garry, states that Scott was tried by six of His Majesty's Council as being a troublesome and unsafe man, and sentenced to be shot at 12 next day. Execution delayed one hour, while Smith interceded with His Majesty, but failing to kill him, he was despatched by one placing a revolver at his head. Reported Bishop Tache would be there next day. Smith wished delay until his arrival, but could not succeed, fearing his influence might prevent murder.

**DIED.**  
On the 31st March, after a short illness, Mr. Toliver James, aged 63 years, formerly of Philadelphia, Penna.

At Carleton St. John, on Monday last, 4 h inst., at the residence of his brother, Samuel R. Clinch, Esq., aged 30 years, regrettably by a large circle of friends and acquaintances. His remains will be brought to-day, to St. George for interment. Funeral to-morrow, Thursday, 7th inst.

**INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.**

The Commissioners appointed to construct the Intercolonial Railway give public Notice that having annulled the Contracts for Sections Nos. 5, 6 and 7, they are prepared to receive Tenders for re-letting the same.

Section No. 5 is in the Province of Quebec and extends from the Eastern end of Section No. 2 forty miles east of Riviere du Loup, to the sixteenth mile post, near Rimouski, a distance of about 26 miles.

Section No. 6 is in the Province of New Brunswick, and extends from the Eastern end of Section No. 3, opposite Dalhousie, to the West side of the main Post Road, near the forty-eighth mile post, Easterly from Jacques River, a distance of about 21 miles.

Section No. 7 is in the Province of Nova Scotia, and extends from the Scutery end of Section 4, near River Philip, to Station O, (formerly Station Fifty), at Folly Lake, a distance of about 24 miles.

The Contracts for the above Sections to be completely finished and ready for laying the track by the 1st of July, 1871.

The Commissioners also give Public Notice that they are prepared to receive Tenders for four further sections of the line.

Section No. 17 will be in the Province of Quebec, and will extend from the Eastern end of the Metapedia Valley, to station No. 645, about one mile above the boundary line between the Counties of Rimouski and Bonaventure, a distance of about 20 miles.

Section No. 18 will be in the Province of Quebec, and will extend from the Eastern end of Section No. 17, down Metapedia Valley to Station No. 380, near Clara's Brook, a distance of about 20 miles.

Section No. 19 will extend from the Eastern end of Section No. 18, in the Province of Quebec, Metapedia Valley to its mouth, and thence across the River Restigouche to Station No. 370, at the Western end of Section No. 3, in the Province of New Brunswick, a distance of about 94 miles, including the bridge over the River Restigouche.

Section No. 20, will be in the Province of New Brunswick, and will extend from the Eastern end of Section No. 10, in the town of Newcastle, on the Chaplin Island road, thence crossing the North West and South West branches of the River Miramichi, and terminating at Station No. 320, about one mile and three quarters South of the 8th West branch, a distance of about six miles including the bridges over the branches of the River Miramichi.

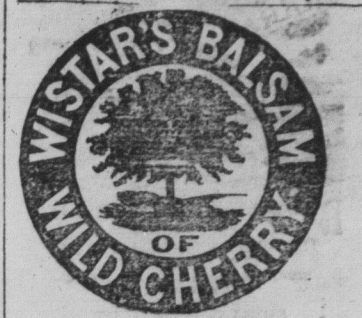

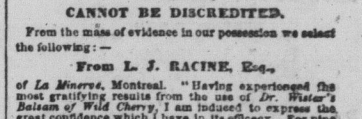
