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

SENATE PASSES 4 AMENDMENTS

United States Lawmakers Get Down to Business On the Tariff Bill.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 4.—The Senate got down to business with the Fordney emergency tariff bill today and before the session, which convened at 11 o'clock, the bill had been amended. The amendments were adopted by a vote of 70 to 20. The bill had a majority of 70 to 20. The committee amendment to establish an import duty of 40¢ a bushel on wheat was twice adopted today. It was first taken up with only nine yeas and a dissenting voice. STEEL CELLS BEING BUILT FOR DESPERADOES

Jail Authorities Taking No More Chances On Crooks Escaping.

WOODSTOCK, Feb. 4.—Within the last year four or five prisoners have made their escape from the Oxford County Jail with comparative ease. In two days the jailer expects his guests the two Garfields, held in London as suspects in the Johnston murder case, and the jail committee decided that action be taken to prevent any more prisoners escaping. They have given orders that two steel cells be built for the accommodation of dangerous criminals. The county council concluded its January session this afternoon. A grant of \$22,000 was made to the Woodstock Hospital for maintenance of patients and \$600 to the Alexandra Hospital, Ingersoll. The request of the Oxford Stock Improvement Association was turned down. The House of Refuge reports showed the cost of maintenance at the refuge to be \$2,61 a day. A grant of \$50 was made to the Horticultural Society. The council decided to pass on the matter of education a resolution from the West Zorra council, which described the adolescent school attendance act as "arbitrary and unworkable" and declared that the board council was opposed to it.

NEW REGULATIONS ARE BEING RUSHED

Government Officials Hurrying Announcement On Petroleum Operations.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Feb. 4.—It is expected here that the new petroleum regulations affecting the Northwest Territories will be promulgated early next week. In view of the strong pressure being brought to bear upon the authorities, the government is rushing the new regulations with all possible speed, so that operations may not be seriously retarded, and spring preparations may be proceeded with. Some misunderstanding arose following the suspension of the existing regulations. It was represented in the West that thirty days notice was necessary before the suspension should become effective. As a consequence certain efforts were made to strike oil during the old regulations before the thirty-day period was up. There were even offers to carry passengers by aeroplane to Fort Norman. "You're more of a fool than I am," became effective the day the order-in-council was passed, and no striking of claims which has taken place thereafter will be recognized.

SAYS DAUGHTER TOOK OVERDOSE

Mrs. Sarah Tabor, 82 Years Old, Says Anaesthetic, Self-Administered, Was Cause.

[Lawton, Mich., Feb. 4.—Maud Tabor, Virgo, whose death here five years ago resulted in a manslaughter charge against her 22-year-old mother, died from an anaesthetic, self-administered, to relieve pain incident to childbirth. Mrs. Sarah Tabor, the mother, said in a statement from her sickbed here today. The aged woman, whose first trial nearly a year ago, resulted in a miscarriage, is believed to be dying following injuries in a fall three weeks ago. Had Premonition. Mrs. Tabor declared her daughter had a premonition of death and pleaded with her not to permit her body to be taken to a cemetery. She admitted she placed the body in Maud's hope chest and lowered it into the basement of the Tabor home here by means of ropes held around a door post. The body was found long afterward in the chest buried under a pile of shingles. "I left the body lying on the bed for about a day. I do not remember just how long. The more I reflected on it, the more I became convinced I ought to bury the body in my own home. I had a horror of the conventional funeral, the ostentation and all that. So I placed the body in the hope chest and lowered it into the basement myself."

COMMISSION REPORTS OVER HALF MILLION GRAVES REGISTERED

Vast Extent of Work in France and Belgium Indicated.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—(Canadian Associated Press).—The annual report of the Imperial war graves commission for 1920 states that the total number of graves registered up to September 30, 1920, was 582,426, and the number of burials registered was 187,705. The extent of the work of exhumation and concentration of scattered graves in France and Belgium up to March 22, 1920, is indicated by the following figures: In France, 125,777; already known, 55,593; identified for first time, 5,273; unknown, 65,791. The total number of graves in France and Belgium when the work has been completed would be probably over 500,000, and the number of cemeteries requiring architectural treatment in addition to the erection of headstones which is practically all that will be required for graves in French communal cemeteries will exceed 1,200. The chairman of the commission remarks that France and Belgium registered almost half a million graves and that the task of reinterment in the appointed cemeteries becomes the greatest task of the war graves commission. He stated that the work has been completed in almost every district and that the appeal to posterity. One difficulty that the commission has had to face has been the shortage of skilled labor for work on the headstones. The orders for these have been distributed throughout the United Kingdom, and it is significant of the way in which this patriotic undertaking has been approached that an attempt has been made to let every district see for itself examples of the chosen regimental designs. The task of the war graves commission is as great as it is significant, and its difficulties are many as the war graves commission, a dignified and encouraging work has been entrusted to the right hands. He had been missing since Wednesday night, and it is believed he met his death by drowning that evening. It was apparent from the condition of the body that it had been in the water for some time. The discovery was made by a young lad, Fred Hardy, who noticed the figure lying in the water when he stooped over a hole in the ice to get a drink. Steen had fallen into the river at a place where local ice companies have been cutting ice. The officials at the sanatorium are of the opinion that he attempted to cross the river in the dark, and not noticing the hole in the ice, slipped into the water. He was 45 years of age. SETS COURT RECORD. New York, Feb. 4.—A new record was set in men's night court recently, when Henry Roberts, 50, of no address in particular, was convicted for the 34th time. His fingerprints and police records revealed that Roberts had spent 1,610 days in jail in the last eight years.

PREVENTS FORGERY.

Washington, Feb. 4.—To prevent the forgery of liquor prescriptions, prohibition enforcement officials have issued physicians with new forms on special water-marked paper. The water-mark read: "Internal Revenue—Prohibition."

FOUND CHECK UNDER DOORSTEP

Peculiar Development in Connection With Recent Glen-colin Hold-Up.

ST. THOMAS, Feb. 4.—The Glen-colin mystery hold-up, in which Mrs. James Stacey, a farmer's wife, at her home a few weeks ago was forced to hand over a check for \$23.87 and \$16 in cash at the end of a gun by a rural bandit, has again come to life by the finding of the check under the doorstep of her home in a pocketbook. The report there that the wires were

cut by the robber is now denied. The whereabouts of the bandit is still an open secret, and a story comes from the township that no special action of the constabulary was made to capture him.

USING MODERN KNOWLEDGE. We in London eat up about 60,000,000 pounds of food a year. 30,000 tons. Yet we are far from strikingly well nourished. Should we use 80,000,000 pounds to catch up our 30 per cent deficit; can we get along with what we have, using more skillfully? If science cannot answer a practical question like that's what good is science!

Well, we can answer it—not more food, but much more skill in feeding is required; and that "much more" does not mean any very suddenly intricate changes either. Previous articles have already outlined the results of recent investigations and experiments showing that as a rule we eat enough and the right things, but with the wrong accent on the combinations. We eat milk products, meat, tubers (like potatoes), roots (like turnips), seeds (like beans), cereals (like wheat flour), fruits (like apples and bananas) and leaves (like lettuce and spinach), but we eat too much and too monotonously of the staples, roasts, chops, bread, cereals, vegetables; not enough of milk and milk products, liver, kidney, leaves, fruits. Probably we eat too much at the conventional three meals a day—less at a time, and the deficit made up at an extra meal would probably help, especially in children.

SPEND IT DIFFERENTLY. How should the emphasis be laid? One of the best ways to get at it is to figure what you now spend for all these things and then spend that same amount in a slightly different way, buying more of the less of that, so coming out even or possibly a little better in the total amount spent, but very, very much better in the actual returns to you—returns in good nourishment, vigor, well-being, loss of "that tired feeling" and gain of general happiness and enjoyment of life.

Here is the magic formula. It means keeping careful accounts of your cash—we'll you ought to keep those anyway! It means thinking of real values and what you are getting for your money—another thing you ought to do anyway.

HOW TO DO IT? Find out what you spend in a week for food—and then take that amount, whether it be \$10 or \$100, and next week spend it like this:

1. Milk25 to 30
2. Vegetables and fruits (especially cabbage, lettuce, spinach, etc.)15
3. Bread, cereals, cakes, etc.12 to 15
4. Poultry, fish, steaks10
5. Butter, lard, suet, etc.5 to 7
6. Eggs3 to 5
7. Sugar, syrup, molasses3
8. Cheese2 to 3

According to this, you would spend about one-eighth of your food money on meat; another eighth on butter; another one-eighth on cheese; and eggs (rather more than an eighth on vegetables and fruits), and the rest on milk.

Of course, one must not be too hide-bound about it. It depends on the kind of family you have and also on how "refined" they are. The youngsters need more particularly the eggs, milk, meat, fish, poultry, starchy, cheese, liver, kidney, tubers, more particularly the bread, butter, sugar, tubers and roots (potatoes, turnips, etc.) Both need some of everything, of course, especially the vegetables and fruits.

REVERSING THE ORDINARY IDEAS. "Why this is all wrong! Feed the children meat and fish and the grown-up bread and butter!" But it seems to be the right way after all. Children have to add substance to their bodies—they have to grow—and to grow in meat, not fat.

WATCH THEIR WEIGHT. If all get all the children in a school weighed and their heights measured. Those who are 7 per cent or more underweight are the ones that need attention. These underweight children should be carefully gone over by a physician to see if they have any obstruction of their breathing passages, particularly of any disease such as tuberculosis that tends to lose weight. Any such children found should have the proper medical or surgical treatment.

NUTRITIONAL CLASSES. The underweight children, however, don't need anything but proper nutrition. Generally the feeding at home is all right, but the child is underweight because of some other thing to have, or in other ways using up more energy than even proper feeding will supply. In about three months of the nutritional class will put them up to weight or beyond. Once a week the parent and child go to the nutritional class where the dietitian is taken to see what progress is being made; the child's food is considered and corrected by the dietitian; the hours of sleep, exercise and so on are reported.

Both parent and child become immensely interested and they learn a great deal about taking proper care of themselves as well as about improving their nutrition. Who, the child or the parent? Both, for very often the parent's feeding is just as poor as the child's and needs fixing just as much.

A class of teachers here in London have been studying these things all winter, and we may hope for some very definite results soon. The Y. M. C. A. is interested also, and the class will be held and measure for the discovery of underweights in that city. Let us be busy and see that Canada is put on a good individual nutrition basis at home here as well.

RATION FOR COWS

It is possible to use the information for educational purposes by passing it on to the instructor.

In the province of New Brunswick during the past two years practically all the cheese manufactured has been graded for the local market by an official of the provincial department of agriculture. The dealers agreed to purchase only graded cheese and to scale the price as between first, second and third grades. The quality of New Brunswick cheese has shown marked improvement under this stimulus and relatively a much better price has been obtained for it. During the years 1917 and 1918, when the cheese was handled by the cheese commission and the dairy produce commission, every box exported was to all intents and purposes classified in No. 1, No. 2, or "off" grades.

A system of scientific dairy produce, if adopted, would have in this country a three-fold object. First, it would be educational; second, it would facilitate trading and promote confidence in our produce; third, it would give the maker of the high-grade article full recognition and reward.

Education because the grader's reports or certificates on low grade produce would show the maker where his produce was defective. Without such information he must rely on the opinions and reports of the buyer, and with all due respect to these gentlemen, I do not hesitate to say that very frequently opinions expressed by them are misleading, because in some cases they have not the necessary practical knowledge, and it is not always in the interest of the buyer to find fault with the quality of his purchase. I repeat that, generally speaking, there are few complaints to quality and no reduction in price when the market rises, and thus the maker is misled and repeats his errors. When complaints are made on a falling market, the maker does not believe in the fairness of the claim and attributes it wholly to a question of market conditions. A grading system would eliminate these misunderstandings and disputes over quality. The maker's high-grade butter or cheese, not under the present system, receive his just reward. There is a tendency to fix the price on the average quality, as the buyer does not care to incur the cost of criticizing or rejecting. He would rather pay one price, and then clear himself by taking losses on part of it, if necessary and making a larger profit on the goods of higher quality. No fault can be found with any of this score because it is the natural outcome of our present method of doing business.

DO NOT WANT WOMEN JURORS.
Salem, Ore., Feb. 4.—Extension of jury service to women in Oregon, as proposed in a bill introduced by Representative Mrs. W. S. Kinney, the only woman member of the Oregon Legislature, was defeated yesterday in the House by a vote of 34 to 22.

NUTRITIONAL CLASSES. The matter of feeding children properly is very serious one indeed. In the last few years we have had actual figures collected from immense numbers of children showing in set terms what many of us meant by the saying that "children of all sorts and kinds frequently suffer from poor nourishment—not poor children or city children especially—but children in general. How many? Well, in one school in a poor district 16 per cent, or about one child in every six, that is had "underweight." But examining children in another school attended by children of the same per cent were found undernourished—or one in every two, in general. However, it runs about one in three—all over the country—from kindergarten to high school, inclusive.

HOW TO FIX IT. Since this point came definitely to the attention of people, much has been done to correct it. The best way is to get the children themselves to understand that they are not getting enough. They want to have their children strong and healthy, but they often don't realize that there is anything wrong with them, or else they imagine it is because they are "growing too fast" or "they take after their grandfathers" or some such reason.

The children want to be strong and fat, too, but they don't know what is the matter—think it is a wrong—then it is.

The plan is to get children and parents together and find out what is wrong—then it is.

WATCH THEIR WEIGHT. If all get all the children in a school weighed and their heights measured. Those who are 7 per cent or more underweight are the ones that need attention. These underweight children should be carefully gone over by a physician to see if they have any obstruction of their breathing passages, particularly of any disease such as tuberculosis that tends to lose weight. Any such children found should have the proper medical or surgical treatment.
