Conflicting Reports Regarding

o Anglo-Portuguese Agreement Sai factory—Austria's Menacing Posi-tion—News From the Argen-tine Republic.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 22.—The Novoe Vremya says that after the calming effect of the Imperial meeting the policy of Austria in the Balkans remains the only menace to peace. The sincere friends of peace, it says, ought to come to an agreement to remove this constant source of danger.

Berlin, Aug. 22.—The Post says that Russis ought to prove her desire for peace by consenting to an arrangement by which the three great powers shall simultaneously withdraw their troops massed on the frontier.

The Anglo-Portuguese Agreement,
Lisbon, Aug. 22.—According to the Portuguese version of the Angle-Portuguese agreement, England recognizes as Portuguese territory the portion of the angle from 11° south latitude to the northern boundary of the German sphere, Great Britain having free way between her northern and southern territories. All the country westward from Lake Nyassa will be British territory. The agreement also provides that any further boundary disputes shall be referred to arbitration. The transit dues in Portuguese territory are not to exceed 3 per cent. ad valorom. The comments of the Lisbon press are generally favorable to the treaty.

THE BIG TIE-UP.

Preparations for the Great Extended Strike.

New York, Aug. 21.—The General Executive Board of the Knights of Labor reported to-night that everything was very encouraging, and that they were in constant communication with the strikers all along the line. No strike has yet been ordered outside of District Assembly 246. Of the future orders Mr. Powderly could not tell. They will be very glad if the federation joins them; if not they will go on anyhow. This is the first time, said Mr. Wright, that Mr. Powderly had ever come into a strike himself, but he was here flatfooted and was going to stay. Mr. Powderly said he had never ordered a strike, and neither had the Executive Board, and they had not ordered this one. A tie-up of the surface roads and elevated roads throughout the city, Mr. Powderly said, had not been thought of.

NEW MEN WILL NOT WORK.

BUFFALO, Aug. 21.—Between 40 and 50 men who were brought to this city to work in the yards for the New York Central Railroad refused to work to-day when apprised of their duties, and put themselves in communication with the Switchmen's Mutual Aid Association. A meeting of that body was held in Stendi's Hall this afternoon. The strangers were hired by means of agents in Chicago. St. Louis and Philadelphia, who advertised for men to work for the Central road at Buffalo. The men state that they were brought here by representations that they were to go to work on a newly-built branch of the road, and not to take the place of strikers. The association will devise means to ship the men back to their homes.

NO TROUBLE EXPECTED WEST.
CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—John Hall, a member of the Executive Board of the Federation of Railway Employes, said to-day, in reference to the strike on the Vanderbilt roads, that he did not believe the Brotherhood men west of Buffalo would be involved, as he thought the action to be taken at Terre Haute on Saturday would be not yas to the New York Central Railway. The leading officials of the Vanderbilt lines in Chicago say they are not making preparations for a strike and do not expect one.

EDUCATION FOR FARMERS ew Plain Words About the Onta Agricultural College and Experi-mental Farm at Guelph.

mental Farm at Guelph.

To the Editor of the Adventusing:

During eleven years I have not, so far as I am aware, done or written anything with a view to bring or keep my own name before the public, nor have I said nuch in praise of the institution over which I have the honor to preside. I have no tam for booming things by means of new aper correspondence; and, having so free, observed that those who write most on agriculture and kindred topics are generally most deficient in their practice, I prefer, as a rule, to remain silent and let the work of our institution, as well as my own work, much or little, quietly peak for itself. This is my rule; and herein T reluctantly depart from it in order to remove certain misapprehensions which, I understand, exist in the minds of a large number of people regarding this institution.

MISTAKES.

A great many farmers and others in this Province seem to take it for granted that the main purpose of our college and farm is to teach boys how to perform ordinary farm operations, such as plowing, harrowing, hoeing, etc.; and that our college farm is worked mainly for the purpose of making money by stock-raising, grain-growing and dairying. These assumptions, I venture to say, are not correct.

PRIMARY AIM.

PRIMARY AIM.

Our main object is education, theoretical and practical—such an education as is needed for young men who intend to live on the farms of this Province. Our course of study gives special prominence to agriculture, live stock, dairying and veterinary science. It also embraces those branche. of matural science which are of use in farming, with as much of English and mathe matics as every farmer absolutely requires, to enable him to discharge with a tair degree of efficiency the daily duties of his occupation and of his position as a free, tarpaying citizen of this Dominion.

While our students are thus receiving education in the class-rooms of the colice, we require them to work a portion of their time in the outside departments (on the farm, in the garden, in the carpenter shop, among the hive stock, and in the experimental department), not so much to teach ordinary farm operations, as to keep them from acquiring a distaste to farm life, while they are being educated—such a distaste as is too frequently the fruit of education obtained by farmers' sons in high schools and arts colleges.

A REASONABLE DEMAND. This much, however, I admit that the farmers of this Province have a right to expect and demand: I. That when their sons are put to work in the outside departments of this institution, they shall be closely looked after and made to do their work well appearance both owntity and quality. as regards both quantity and quality, se that they may not acquire habits of idle ness, or learn to work in a slow or sloven! that they may not acquire habits of idleness, or learn to work in a slow or slovenly manner. 2. That their sons, while here, shall see nothing but the best methods of cultivating the soil; of sowing, planting, and harvesting crops; of handling and applying manure; of breeding, feeding, and managing cattle, sheep, hogs, and horses—in a word, nothing but the best system of management in all the details of farm work.

3. That they shall be taught by precept and example to give strict and constant attention to economy in everything and to follow such a system of farm management as is likely to secure good financial results.

SECONDARY AIM.

In addition to our clucational work, we devote some attention to experiments, endeavoring to solve problems, the solution of which will, it is hoped, be a benefit to farmers throughout the Province—experiments with grain, live stock, and fertilizers; also in butter-making, tree-growing, and other things which pertain to successful farming.

GRAIN EXPERIMENTS.

An account of our experiments with the stock has already been published; and, in passing I may add that during the account of our experiments with the stock has already been published; and, in

GBAIN EXPERIMENTS.

An account of Our experiments with he stock has already been published; and, in passing, I may add that, during the present year we are testing over 360 varieties of grain—57 of fall wheat, 63 of spring wheat, 60 of barley, 20 of peas, 96 of oats, and 65 of corn; also 33 varieties of potatoes, 11 of carrots, 30 of mangels, and 50 of turnips. We have likewise a number of plots of barley, wheat and cats to show the effect of sowing at different dates, and others to determine the results which may be expected from using different quantities of seed per acre. These and other experiments (over 600 plots in all) occupy about 50 acres of the farm, and should ultimately result in some benefit to the farmers of this Province.

COURSE OF STUDY Regarding our course of study, I venture to say that it is eminently adapted to the wants of those who intend to be farmers. It embraces only such branches as farmers require; and I think I may add that, apart from our college, there is no other place in this Province where young men can get full courses of lectures on agriculture and dairying, and the different breeds of farm animals (with suitable specimens); and on veterinary science, chemistry and other practical branches, with as much English veterinary science, chemist practical branches, with as and mathematics as the

In conclusion, I may say that, in order to remove the last obstacle from the way of young farmers who desire to get an education suitable to their calling and position in the state, the Government offers the advantages of this institution at the least possible cose. To a young man who understands farm work and makes a right use of his time, the entire cost for board, washing and tuition need not exceed \$50 to \$65 a year. Some get through with much less. The Prison Commission reassembled at the Tecumseh House in the evening to take the evidence of Chief Williams. None of the commissioners could boast of the possession of one, and as a copy of Bellamy's "Looking Backward" was lying on the parlor table. Commissioner Jury, the labor representative, proposed that the oath be taken on it. The other commissioners did not see the point of the argument, and after a diligent search the required book was found and the investigation proceeded with. Thursday Evening.

Chief Williams estified that there were two corridors and six cells at the Police Station. He did not think the accommodation was sufficient for the needs of the force and the ventilation was not as good as it should be, but was as good as could be had in the building. 

EMPLOYMENT OF PRISONERS.

It seems to be generally admitted that employment is one of the chief moral needs of the prisoner. Were it employment with the element of hope added, giving the prisoner on leaving a moiety of what his labor had earned, either for the use of himself or for his wife and children, the result might be the upspringing of aspirations of a wholesome character.

Society owes it to those who have fallen by the way to do what it can to uplift them again, and one way not to do it is to allow them to fester in prison in idleness of

mind and body.

There are difficulties in the way, of course, and care should be taken to interfere as little as possible with the labor market of the average manual worker.

Not that there is much to fear from dem agogic cries on such a question. The mechanics of Canada are able to do their own thinking, and when appealed to, as is own thinking, and when appealed to, as is sometimes the case, by those who are them-selves opponents to the rightful claims of labor, they smile and pass on.

We happen to know that thoughtful men

among the manual workers recognize the moral right and the moral need of the prisoner in the matter of labor of some in teresting and if possible not wholly un profitable character; and they have no high aion of those who so underrate alike their intelligence and their humanity as to appeal to them with specious cries.

THE GREAT RAILWAY STRIKE. strike on the New York Central Railway and the probability of its extension to a portions of the Vanderbilt lines, in Canada as well as over the border, has stirred up renewed interest in the conflict. It is not whether or not a common carrier, receiving its charter and many privileges from the State, shall have the right to do whatsoever it chooses with its employes, even to the extent of causing serious injury to the

At first sight, it seemed as if it would have been easy to settle the dispute be-tween the railway managers and the employes. But the arrogant, overbearing attitude of Vice-President Webb barred that. Webb is a man who was born with a golder spoon in his mouth. He has not that sympathy with active workers that railway managers who have risen from the ranks know how to turn to account in critical moments, and under no circumstances would be consent to a resort to arbi-trate the troubles between his road and its employes. The workmen, on their part, assert they were dismissed because before a mittee of the Legislature they had given evidence against a class law in the continuance of which the company was

All this is very interesting and suggest ive to outsiders; but surely it is about time that the Yankee railway magnates were made to get off their high horses, and were asked to understand that the public interests shall not be made to suffer because they prefer to regard workingmen as mere machines, instead of human as mere machines, instead of mana-beings. Railway employes are sometime unjust and unreasonable in their demands, but we believe that the large majority of workingmen simply ask justice. Is it not advisable, therefore, for the railway magnates, instead of treating the representative men in the ranks of the workers as beneath contempt, to look for as speedy a settlement of all troubles between them and their employers as fair play may suggest. They will be all the readier to do this if they bear in reprance that the railway is only in a

membrance that the railway is only in a limited sense private property.

In New York they have a State Board of Arbitration, but it is powerless to settle the present dispute, as the law does not make arbitration compulsory. There should be no necessity for compulsion in the fair settlement of disputes between in the fair settlement of disputes between the fair se the employers and employes in great public soncerns like the railways; but if one party to a dispute chooses to be unreasonable and by its unreason to give ground for injury to the public, and as in this case by the employment of a host of armed Pinkerton employment of a host of armed Pinkerton detectives, to cause bloodshed, society will detectives, to cause bloodsned, society will have to step in and compel a remedy. In any case, it is a very unsafe and unconsti-tutional thing to allow any corporation to employ and handle an armed force of its own, thereby usurping the functions of the




