REBELS WITH REPEATERS.

An Organized Uprising in An Argentine Town Entirely China.

Thewei Captured by 15,000 Insurgents-Serious Trouble Anticipated by European Officials.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The Chronicle's correspondent at Shanghai says the capture of Thewei near Foo Choo on Tuesday by 15,000

Thewei near Foo Choo on Tuesday by 15,000 rebels was a well organized rising. The rebels were armed with repeaters and led by capable men. The outbreak was directed mainly against the authorities, though anti-foreign cries were heard. The officials were powerless. European residents are apprehensive of a spread of the reyolt.

The British consul here says he believes the recent quietude is only temporary; spring and summer being the favorite periods for outrages in China. Light-draft gunboats are an absolute necessity to protect the lives of Europeans. In spite of the semi-official statement that two of the Tchang rebels have been beheaded and others bastinadoed, it is notorious that the real culprits are still free, being protected against arrest by exalted officials.

MOTIVELESS MURDER.

An English Lad Deliberately Throws His Companion Over a Cliff Seventy Feet Righ.

Seventy Feet High.

London, Nov. 17.—Weymouth has a sensation in the arrest of a youth named Wise, 17 years of age, on a charge of murder. Wise is one of the apprentices belonging to H. M. training si ip Bosewen at present anchored off Weymouth. On Sunday Wise and another boy obtained liberty to visit shore. They strolled along the cliff and flually reached a point when they were 70 feet above the narrow stretch of shore beneath. Here the boys stood talking in the most friendly manner, when stalking in the most friendly manner, when suddenly, and without provocation or warning, Wise placed his hands against his companion and, exerting all his strength, shoved him over the edge of the cliff. With a shriek of terror the doomed lad clutched at the air in an attempt to wave himself. at the air in an attempt to save himself, and then fell with frightful velocity upon

and then fell with frightful velocity upon the rocks below.

Unconcerned at the terrible crime he had committed, Wise wended his way back to the vessel. The officers made inquiries as to the whereabouts of his companion. Wise told him he had pushed him over the cliff. Search was made, and the body was tound at the place indicated by Wise. His skull had been fractured by striking on the rocks, and he had received other terrible injuries. He was alive, but died in a short time.

Wise takes the whole affair nonchalantly, and laughs and jokes as though he had no heinous crime upon his conscience. He discusses the question of being hanged with avidity, and appears overjoyed at the prospect of meeting his death by the rope on the gallows. Before he mutdered his friend he had often expressed a desire to be hanged. Some time ago Wise made a confession that he had murdered a boy, but no belief was placed in what he said, as there was no evidence to support his statement. The prisoner has hitherto borne a good character. The only possible reason that can be given for the murder is that Wise is affected with a morbid desire to obtain notoriety or that he is insane.

A Texas Man's Way of Squaring Ac-counts—Three Men Fatally Poisoned.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 17.—Four cattle drovers went to the house of Joe Reagan, in Henderson county, to collect money due them. Reagan claimed he could not spay and asked the men to give him more time. They refused, and told him if he did not pay at once they would levy on his cattle. New Haven, Conn., Nov. 16.—The much-talked-of injurious effect which tobacco has on athletes, and on mankind in general, has sgain received illustration, this time through the observation of Dr. Seaver, of Yale. He watched the class of 1891 closely, and figures which he has just produced as a result show that in lung capacity the tobacco abstainers have an average which is 66 per cent. greater than that of the tobacco users. We have landed this morning at Smyrnia, a city in Asiatic Turkey, said the preacher. One of the seven churches of Asia once stood here. It is a city that has often been shaken by earthquake, swept by conflagration, blasted by plagues, and butchered by war, and here! Bishop Polycarp stood in a crowded amphitheater when he was asked to give up the advocacy of the Christian religion and save himself from martyrdom, the pro-consul saying, "Swear and I release thee; reproach Christ," is wear and I release thee; reproach Christ, "Splied: "Eighty and six years have I sarved him, and he never did me wrong; how then can I revile my King and Saviour?" When he was brought to the fires into which he was about to be thrust, and the officials were about to fasten him to the stake he said; "Let me remain as I am, for he who giveth me strength to susticate the said; "Let me remain as I am, for he who giveth me strength to sustain the fire will enable me also without your securing me with nails to remain unnoved in the fire. The lion will make but a brief mouthful of him." All the sympathies of that crowd are with the lion. but a belef mouthful of him. All the sympathies of that crowd are with the lion, But you cannot tell by a man's size or looks how stont a blow he can strike or how keen a blade he can thrust. The coolest man in the Stadium is Paul. Even should his bedy tumble under the foot and tooth of

the wild beast, his soul will only the sooner find disenthrallment. But it is his duty, as far as possible, to preserve his life. Now, I hear the bolt of the wild beast's door shove back, and the whole audience rise to their feet as the fierce brute springs for the arena and toward its small occupant. I think the first plunge that was made by think the first plunge that was made by the wild heast at the apostle was made on the point of a sharp blade, and the snarling monster with a howl of pain and reeking with gore, turns buck. But now the little missionary, has his turn of making strack, and with a few well-directed thrusts the monster lies dead in the dust of the arena, and the apostle puts his right foot on the lion and shakes him, and then puts his left foot on him and shakes him, and then puts his left foot on him and shakes him—a scene which Paul afterwards uses for an illustration when he wants to know how Christ will triumph over death—"He must reign till he hath put all enemies under his feet; yes, under his feet. Paul told the literal truth when he said: "I have fought with beasts at Ephesus."

In the midst of this city of Ephesus once floated an artificial lake, brilliant with painted boats, and through the River Cayster it was connected with the sea, and ships from all parts of the known earth floated in and out, carrying on a commerce which made Ephesus the envy of the world. Great was Ephesus! Its gymnasia, its hippodrome, its odeon, its athenœum, its forum, its aqueducts, its towers, its castle of Hadrian, its monument of Androcles, its quarries, which were the granite cradle of the cities and its temples!

But I have to unveil the chief wonder of But I have to unveil the chief wonder of this chiefest of cities. In 1863, under the patronage of the English Government, Mr. Wood, the explorer, began at Ephesus to feel along under the ground at great depths for roads, for wails, for towers, and here it is—that for which Ephesus was more celebrated than all elso beside—the temple of the goddess Diana, called the sixth wonder of the world. There have been seven temples of Diana, the ruins of each contributing something for the splendor of all its architectural successors. Two hundred and twenty years was this last temple in construction. It was nearly twice as large as St. Paul's Cathedral, London. Lest it should be disturbed by earthquakes, which have always been fond of making those regions their playground, the temple was built on a marsh, which was made firm by layers of charcoal covered by fleeces of wool. The stone came from the quarry near by and was discovered accidentally by a shepherd. The temple of Diana was 425 feet long by 225 feet wide. All Asia was taxed to pay for it. Now you see the meaning of that passage in Revelations, just as a king presenting one of these pillars to the temple of Diana had his own name chiselled on it and the name of his cwn country, so says Christ: "Him that overcometh will I make a pillar in the temple of my Grd, and I will write upon

the city of my God, which is New Jerusalem, and I will write upon him my new name."

I saw eight of those piliars at Constantinople, to which city they had been removed, and are now a pant of the Mosque of St. Sophia. The are all green jasper, but some of those which stood in Diana's Temple at Ephesus were fairly drenched with brilliant colors. Costly metals stood up in various parts of the temple where they could eatch the fullest flush of the sun. A flight of stairs was carved out of one grape vine. Doors of eyprus wood, which had been kept in glue for years, and bordered in bronze in bas-relief, swung against pillars of brass. In that building stood an image of Diana, the goddess. The impression was abroad as the Bible records, that that image nad dropped out of heaven into that temple, and the sculptors who really made the statute or image were put to death, so that they could not testify of its human manufacture and so deny its celestial original.

In this city the mother of Jesus was said to have been buried. Here dwelt Aquilla and Priscilla of Bible mention, who were professors in an extemperized theological seminary, and they taught the eloquent Apollos how to be elequent for Christ, Here John preached, and from here because of his fidelity he was exiled at Patmos. Here Paul warred against the magical arts for which Ephesus was famous. The soreerers of this city pretended that they could cure diseases, and perform almost any miracle, by pronouncing these senseless words: "Aski Cataski Lix Tetrax Damnameneus Asion." Paul having performed a miracle in the name of Jesus, there was a lying family of seven brothers who imitated the Apostle, and instead of their usual words of incantation used the word Jesus over a man who was nossessed of a devil, and the man possessed flew at them in great fierceness and nearly tore these frauds to pieces, and in consequence all up and down the streets of Ephesus there was indignation excited against the magical arts, and a great honfire of magical books was kindded in the Ephesus there was marganest bar against the magical arts, and a great bonagical books was kindled in the

to negotiate an unrestricted trade treaty. In Canada, the high tax policy was made to suit different localities. To gain British Columbia support, reciprocity in coal was promised; to win votes in Nova Scotia, 'no reciprocity in coal" was the cry. Down n Quebec, the high tax canvassers said they and no objection to reciprocity in petroleum; in the Lambton oil regions, under no condition would reciprocity in oil be allowed, said the combine orators and fote hunters.

people. ARMED PEACE IN EUROPE

Last week, an Emperor and two Prime Ministers assured Europe that there is nothing in the international situation at present to threaten the maintenance of peace. The Emperor of Austria, however, in receiving the Polish Deputy Jaworski, said that the famine in Russia was rather dangerous now. It was true, he added, that Russia had not finished her armaments; but, he reminded the deputy, the ecent loan has furnished Russia with the neans of action. After Francis Joseph nade this declaration, alarming because of what he purported to expect rather than what might be looked for in the immediate future, the bourses took alarm, and war-like reports circulated from every capital. This shows on how slender a foundation the pedestal of peace stands in Europe, armed as the nations are to the teeth As the cable puts it, with a strain of humor, that Germany, Austria and France are preparing still further to increase their ermies, that England and Italy intend to spend more money on war ships, that Turkey is negotiating with benevolent Mr. Krupp for more artillery, and that British troops in India are to be reinforced, must of course be accepted as signs of peace. So also must the forthcoming visit of the Imperial Russian Chancellor to Paris. Monsieur de Giers is going to the French capital on purely private business. Of course, he has a dear little 10-year-old granddaughter there whom he yearns to see. They ascertained at 10c, and immediately the word was given to buy 40,000 boxes of the best lots a sight, and the transaction was com-When the news got abroad among the other buyers there was consternation, and in many cases they offered 10 1-16c in order that they might get a share. Probably not more than 15,000 boxes in all is unmarketed of the 100,000 boxes in hands last week. Hon. Thos. Ballentyne says that the move was doubtless prompted by the advance of 1 cent in the New York markets. The price paid was purely speculative, and may or may not prove emunerative. A very large quantity of July, August and September cheese must e placed on the market before the late cheese will be inquired for, and perhaps the products; we will have the treaty of 1854 heavy buyers now may live to repent their haste. 
