Convention of Parnellites. London, Feb. 12. - Timothy Harrington has called a convention of Parnellites to be held in Dublin just before the second read-ing of the Home Rule Bill, to decide upon the acceptance or repudiation of the bill by Parnellite members of the House.

Italy's Finances.

Rome, Feb. 12.-Signor Grimaldi, Minister of the Treasury, reviewed the country's financial condition in the Chamber Deputies yesterday. He said that the budget for 1892-93 showed a surplus of \$2,000,000, and that the budget for 1893-94 showed a stimuted surplus of \$280,000. showed an estimated surplus of \$280,000. It was proposed to establish a petroleum monopoly which would realize \$2,600,000 yearly, and a monopoly in alcoholic liquors which would yield \$2,400,000 yearly.

"More Tory Than the Tories."

BERLIN, Feb. 12 .- The home rule conflict in Great Britain is casting its shadow in Germany. While Mr. Gladstone was speaking the Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour, Conservative leader and formerly chief secretary for Ireland, entered the House in company with the Rt. Hon. J. Morley, the present chief secretary for Ireland, and the two shook hands before taking their seats. People outside had been amazed at seeing the two political foes coming from Downing street in close conversation. Mr. Balfour's earnest manner indicated that the topic was one of importance. London, Feb. 13.—The Duke of York is at once to become a prominent figure in the social and semi-official life of a kingdom, having taken his first plunge on Tuesday svening. He made another speech on the following day to the merchant tailors, one of the oldest of the city companies which own and rule the city of London. He made a good impression there also. He is no orator, neither is he an innay or a prig. He spoke in plain, straightforward fashion, without a trace of embarrassment. He recalls in some respects his father, the Prince of Wales, at the same age. Many people see in him, however, signs of greater strength of character and solf-reliance. At all events, the people have a kindlier feeling toward him than they had toward the Duke of Clarence and Avondale, and it is quite probable that from the date of his marriage he will become a great popular favorite.

CANON FARRAR'S INCOME.

Various church papers have been indulging in a controversy in the worst of bad taste upon the subject of Canon Farrar's income. The surprising sequel is that the fanous archdeacon, without concealing his disgust over the matter, has seen fit to discuss the subject. It has been asserted that the offices which he holds yields \$13,000 per annum. Archdeacon Farrar will say in the next number of the Review of Churches that the amount of his income can "only concern a discassed and malevolent curiosity." The real figure, he will explain, is about \$8,500. This includes his salary as chaplain of the Hcuse of Commons. Inasmuch as Canon Farrar has a family of tenchildren to support and no private means, he thinks it hardly fair that it should be insuated that he is a monster of greed.

GLADSTONE'S GREAT EFFORT.

To-day's session of the House will be historical. Mr. Gladstone's speech may be expected to be the crowning glory of his life. He has smazed friends and foes the past week by his abounding vigor in debate. His utterances have been full of spontaneous fire, agile satire, and playful wit, which have supplemented his always maaterly logic. It is expected that he will speak from 5 to 7 o'clock, His address will, of course, describe and explain all the provisions of the Home Rule Bill, which will not itself be made public in the regular course for some days afterward.

The Complainants Say They Bought Liquor at Her House, but Mrs. Barnes Claims It Was Sent For-Eina Justice Sent to the Mercer.

Esther Barnes was charged at this morning's Police Court with illegally selling liquor. The charge was denied by the defendant, and the prosecution called the two detectives who laid the information.

Visit to a Dynamite Factory-Five Degrees Between Conseil and Eternity.

A dynamite factory consists of a number of large houses, widely separated from each other, and of a number of small huts away in the distance, half barried in the ground, and used for the purpose of storing the nitro-glycerine, the essential principle of dynamite. Each process in the scheme of manufacture has a house for itself, and each has a chief skilled in proportion to the danger which is encountered.

Let us enter the great house wherein the first process is going on. Here we find a workman felted, and standing before a tank in which are many tons—note the amount—of nitro-glycerine in the actual process of manufacture.

The great tank is full of glycerine, while the acid is dripping slowly into it from a pipe above. The mixture of pure glycerine, intric acid, and oil of vitriol produces nitro-glycerine, the most deadly explosive in the world, so deadly that an ounce of it compressed would blow you into atoms, and so liable to explode that the least detonation or jar will instantly fire it.

It is positively the most awful stuff to deal with that man has ever discovered. I could not resist the thought—what if this stuff, which often explodes by spontaneous combustion, should go off while I am here?

The foreman kindly told me that if such a thing did happen no man would find a hair of my head or a fraction of my limbs. He seemed perfectly unconcerned as he told the tale, and then he showed me a thermometer dipped in the mixture to register its temperature. "If the heat of this mass goes up six or seven degrees," he said, "the stuff would explode. I keep my eye constantly on that glass, and if a fast rise in temperature took place I should open the tap at the bottom of the tank and let the nitro-glycerine run through an aqueduc to a point. If I were in time enough, well and good; but if not—ah!" I echoed his exclamation, and suggested that a walk to the other sheds would be a change. Fancy five degrees Fahrenheit standing between eternity and yourself!

When in the open I asked my guide if there had ever been a case when that shed had been blown up, and he said "once," but he told me that the mass is often run off from the tank, and nearly always without the other than the controlle, as the record proves.

With all this I can imagine no more dreadful life than that of the man who stands daily before the cistern of death, and has but a few degrees of temperature between himself and utter annihilation.

The other sheds are bad enough, but this one is appalling, and I breathed quite freely when we entered the appartment where the nitro-glycerine is washed, and where they told me all about the elaborate process needed for its purification.—[Exchange,

and Mortally Mangled, Five Passengers and Six Seamen Swept Overboard and Drowned-Names of the Victims-Dotalls of the Dis-aster-The Vessel Puts Eack to Greenock.

London, Feb. 12.—It has been learned that the disaster to the Pomeranian occurred when the steamer was about 1,150 miles out. The Pomeranian encountered boisterous weather immediately after leaving port. It was thought that the wind would soon blow itself out, but instead of abating the gale increased in severity. The 4th of February dawned with a frightful gale raging and a tremendously high sea running. The hatches were battened down and covered with tarpaulins, ventilators were turned to leeward, and every precaution dictated by good seamanship had been taken to prevent water getting below. This appeared to the officers of the ship to be the greatest danger, as they had no doubt as to the steamer's ability to ride out the storm. Several seas had been shipped, but they did no damage. Suddenly a tremendous sea reared its crest a short distance ahead of the steamer as she plunged down a wave. Before she could into the stance of the stancer as she plunged down a wave. At first the full extent of the disaster was not known. The steamer began to pay off before the wind and sea and it was at once seen that the quartermasters had been carried away. Two sailors sprang to the wheel and soon put the steamer on her course. Then it was found that Captain Dalziel, the master of the steamer was missing. He had been last seen stauding on the lee side of the steamer and aft the saloon in conversation with a saloon passenger named John Stewart a resident of Glasgow. They had both been caught by the sea that came over the stern and dashed against the deckhouse. They were then carried aft with

terrific force and jammed beneath the after
steam winches. Capt. Dalziel's legs were
broken and he had sustained internal injuries. He was carefully moved to his room
and everything possible was done for him,
but he died the next morning. Mr. Stewart's legs were also broken and he sustained other injuries, from the effects of
which he died in a tew hours. At the time
of the accident the second officer, John
Cook, had the watch. He was on the
bridge with John Hamilton, the fourth
officer, and both of them were

In the saloon deckhouse, when the sea
broke over the steamer, were James Gibson
and Lillian Gibson, of Dalkeith, and Jane
Caffrey, of Londonderry, all first cabin
passengers. They were carried over the
side and not afterwad seen. David Forbes,
of Dundee, a second cabin passenger, Jas.
Pritchard and Fred Westbury, stewards,
were also lost in the same manner. It is
supposed that Pritchard and Westbury
were engaged in attending to the wants of
passengers in the saloon deckhouse when
the structure was washed away. This
made the number of those carried overboard ten, with the two others fatally injured. When the sea boarded the stemmer
every man about the deck who saw it jured. When the sea boarded the steamer every man about the deck who saw it coming grabbed hold of the stanchions or anything else convenient, and it was due to this that the loss of life was not much larger, For a time the utmost consternation prevailed, but this gave way to a feeling of sadness when it was found that so many lives had been lost. The disaster occurred so suddenly and the sea did its fatal work with such rapidity that the survivors did not at first realize the full extent of the misformand the sea will be and and first realize the full extent of the misfor-tune. Amid the howling of the wind and

the cries of those who were carried overboard could not have been heard, even had they had time to utter them. Without a word of warning they were swept to their doom, and not a person on the steamer knew what had happened to them until some little time after the accident. With Capt, Dalziel fatally injured and unconscious in his cabin, the command of the steamer devolved upon the first officer. The steamer was about in midocean, and the question arose in his mind what course to washe whether to hold the steamer on her steamer was about in midocean, and the question arose in his mind what course to pursue—whether to hold the steamer on her course or to put about and make for Greenock. When the chart room was carried away, the charts, sextants and quadrants, in fact, everything absolutely essential to the navigation of the ship, went with it. The binnacle box and its compass on the bridge had also gone overboard, and had it not been that the after compass remained it is doubtful if the steamer would have reached port for many days yet.

of affairs on the Pomeranian, it is almost needless to say, was terrible. The first officer called the remaining efficers of the steamer to a consultation, and it was decided to put about and return to Greenock. This was at once done, and without any instruments with which to take observations, the voyage had to be made entirely by dead reckoning, and was therefore necessarily slow. The first officer is highly commended for his skillful seamanship in navigating the Pomeranian under such adverse circumstances, and it is highly probable that his ability will be recognized in a substantial manner by the owners of the steamer, and the underwriters. The waves swept over the deck from stem to stern and flooded the passengers' quarters. There was no panic and the crew had everything snug before dark. The gale continued to rage with fury until Wednesday last, when it abated somewhat. On Tursday the weather again became stormy and gradually rose to a hurricane. Innistrabull light, of the most northerly part of the Irish coast, was sighted on Thursday evening and the position of the vessel ascertained. Owing to the terrific weather it was necessary to lie to until Friday morning, when the Pomeranian was steered for Greenock.

How Queen Liliuckalani Happened to Marry a Sanier's Son.

When Queen Liliuckalani, about whom, so much is being written, was married in 1862 to John Owen Dominis, she was plain Miss Lydia K. Paki. Kamehameha IV, was then King. He was succeeded by Kamebameha. V. Dominis was the private secretary of both these monarchs. When Kalakaua succeeded to the throne in 1874, his sister, Mrs. Dominis, became a princess, Dominis was born in Schenectady, N. Y., in 1832. His father was an Italian ship in 1832. His father was an Italian ship master, and his mother was a Boston woman of considerable culture and refinement. Young Dominis was taken by his parents on board the schooner Swallow to Honolalu when he was very young. Captain Dominis traded about the islands for several years, and when his son was a lad of 16 soid the Swallow, salled as a passenger for China, and his family never heard of him afterwards. In the following year John went to San Francisco, where he became a bookkeeper. He is also said to have made an unsuccessful experiment as a gold miner during the prevalence of the "fever."

John Owen Deminis found nothing congenial in the hurly burly, rough and ready California life of 1850, and he returned to Honolulu in search of a position. He became a bookkeeper again, but soon attracted the attention of King Kamehameha IV., who made him his private secretary. The young man possessed excellent judgment and soon became one of the most trusted advisers of the King. He was very handsome, and Miss Paki fell desperately in love with him, but he was so retiring in his manner that he did not declare his passion until 1852, when he was promptly acception which he filled with great credit to king Kamehameha V. until that monarch appointed him Governor of Oahu, a position which he filled with great credit to himself. Upon Kalakaua's death and Mrs. Dominis' accession to the throne in 1891 she proclaimed her husband a prince of the raim. John Owen Deminis found nothing con-

The Queen was devotedly attached to her foreign husband, and it was said that she was influenced to a greater extent by his judgment than some of her subjects wished. Prince Dominis died a few months after his wife became Queen, and she was almost inconsolable at his lors. Persons who have visited her recently say that the mere mention of the name of her late spouse is sufficient to bring tears to the eyes of Liliuckalani.

The News has run against a question involving much more than the statistics of murders and suicides, and we would be glad to hear its own views as to cause and cure.

CRUSHED!

Disaster in a Vermont Quarry-Seven Men Killed and Many Injured.

Disaater in a Vermont Quarry—Seven Mon Killed and Many Injured.

RUTLAND, Vt., Feb. 12.—One of the worst disasters in the history of marble quarrying occurred at West Rutland a little after I o'clock yesterday afternoon in a quarry operated by the Vermon Marble Company. A great mass of stone fell into the quarry and seven men were instantly killed and a number of others injured. The killed are Win. Lukas, Frank Sulig, Edward Powers, Alexander Blumquest and three unrecognized men. The quarry was opened in 1868. Depth and surface considered, it is the largest quarry in the world. Its perpendicular depth in over 250 feet, and from this the quarry runs east ward and downward under the hill 300 feet mort. The accident was near the extreme end of the quarry, far under the hill. The killed and some of the injured were buried under tone of rock. The mass of stone which covered the men as near as can be estimated was 60 feet in length and twenty feet wide. 
