

"The Germans are daily becoming more and more convinced that England as the real originator of this war that has been conjured up in such an infamous manner, must be utterly vanquished at whatever cost.

"Here in Hamburg, merchants, shippers and workmen employed in the port and on the docks feel that England's intention is to throttle German trade and commerce. Every resident of Hamburg knows that world trade and free dom of the seas are as necessary to the modern German as breathing. We therefore beg your excellency to adopt all measures necessary for the requisition of a fleet that shall gradually equal the naval strength of our opponents so that we may vanquish the English, our deadly enemy, and his accomplices. The German people are resolved to make any sacrifices to attain this

## GERMAN RIGHT WING FORCED TO REEL BACK

AT THE BATTLE FRONT (via Paris), Sept. 25-6:16 p.m.-French and British troops, intermingled with Turcos and Moors, not only held their own, but caused the strongly reinforced German western wing to reel backward near St. Quentin yesterday and today, and imperilled the German line of communication towards the frontier of Belgium. The German centre had been weakened by the rush of troops from that position to meet the threatening movement of the Allies, and two strong forces were engaged at close quarters today between St. Quen-

tin and Tergnier. BATTLE NOW RAGING OF PRIME IMPORTANCE. The military authorities naturally refuse to permit the disclosure of the exact position of the fighting, but it is generally known that the battle now progressing is of prime importance

Meanwhile at other parts of the battle line, which is about 120 miles long, fighting continued today in dogged fashion. The allied troops followed the example set by the German and dug themselves deeply in The artillery of both armies kept up an incessant fire, while French and German aviators reconnoitred from above. SPY IN LINES DIRECTED GERMAN SHOTS.

The commanders of the allied forces have found reason for the wonderful precision of the German fire in a spy discovered in their lines who signalled directions. He was caught and immediately shot. All the troops appear to have become thoroughly hardened and accustomed to conditions. The commissariat and the ammunition supply departments are working perfectly. While the soldiers are occupying the advanced firing lines, they are scarcely ever without one hot meal a day, which is brought to them in camp kettles from the field kitchens. The British artillery officers praise highly the gunnery of their opponents. They declare that the German shells almost burst at accurate range, but often too high to do damage.

SOLDIERS SMOKE WITH SHELLS SCREECHING. The soldiers take occasional spells of repose, when in deep trenches, smoking pipes and cigarettes, for a ration of tobacco is served regularly. Meanwhile shells tear by overhead, with a sound like the ripping of parchment. British officers relate an incident which they say occurred during

twilight last evening. MORE TREACHEROUS SUBTERFUGE. A large force of German infantry, when charged by a British batalion, held up their hands in token of surrender. The British approached to take them prisoners, when it is reported the Germans opened fire. The British officers ordered their men to lie down, which they did. ## London Girl Writes of Her Adventures in Berlin During Stirring Times of Great War's Outbreak

Miss Eggleston Hears Kaiser Address the People Following Declaration of Hostilities --- Present When the Russian Ambassador's PartyW as Attacked--Woman W ho Wanted To Be a Soldier's Widow --- A Graphic Account of Travels in the Enemy's Country.

(Written for The Advertiser by Miss Florence Eggleston.)

We left Montreal on 27th of June by the steamer Assania, which has since then been made into an armed cruiser by the admiralty. It was with a feeling of great curiosity that I watched the passengers come on board the ship—a miscellaneous collection of Americans, English, Canadian and Scotch people-most of them tourists, and whom we gradually became acquainted with. We left Berlin, which is really a very beautiful city, on the 12th of September, on a special train arranged for Americans. It took us only fourteen hours to get to Amsterdam, where we stopped, as Rotterdam was so crowded that we could get no accommodation there. All the way along we saw soldiers guarding bridges, and as several places saw many wounded being carried from trains on stretchers. It is terrible to think of two or three men having the power of life of death over millions of men. We found in Holland that the feeling was against Germany and for England.

Hollanders Incensed. They were terribly incensed at Germany for what she had done to Belgium. We were also told that if Holland was forced into the war, she would open the dykes and flood the country. It had already been tried in certain parts of Holland. We stayed in Holland, at Amsterdam two days and on Friday went on to Rotterdam, where we found every hotel overcrowded. Our ship, the Niew Amsterdam, which had been captured by the French on its last trip from New York to Rotterdam. and had German conscripts taken off it, instead of having eight days in port only had four, and in those four days auxiliary cabins were built down in the hold, for they had no freight except our baggage to bring over, and used the room for human freight instead. On this steamer there were 2,300 souls, so many people that they could not be managed. Some people in first-class paid \$140.00 for a cabin with three other people in it, down in the hold of the ship. Many of us were poisoned brough breathing the new paint that these cabins had been painted with, and not only that but there were vermin and rats continually until life became almost unbearable. I, with some more friends, slept on deck in teamer chairs three nights. In thirdlass three hundred men were sleeping n straw mattresses on the floor. Two omen on board died one was buried sea, the other embalmed, and anther poor woman lost her mind and ad to be guarded day and night.

The Horror of Mines. The trip over was a horrible one. 

### PERILS OF THE BLOCKADE.

HE Washington Times declares that up to date the Germans have had much the better of the war at sea. This hardly agrees with the facts. The loss of their three cruisers and a number of destroyers and submarines the battle off Heligoland have pernaps been more than offset by the spectacular torpedoing of the British cruisers, but the complete crippling of the German merchant marine service, the destruction of two great auxiliary cruisers and the driving into a neutral port of the German ships in the Mediterrannean, throw the balance greatly in favor of the British.

Mustquiez, Carranza's consular agent here, who was asked to transmit it to General Villa, at Chihuahua. "We appeal to your patriotism and good will, inviting you to assist us in the pacification of the republic,' said the appeal to Villa, and his generals. "We take for a basis the fact," the communication continued. "that there are no fundamental reasons for

The appeal was signed by Lucio Blanco, the Coahuila leader, who was first to join Carranza in the anti-Huerta revolt; Eduard Hay, who was one of the first to join Francisco Madero in his revolution against Porfirio Diaz; Rae-fael Buelnax the "boy chief" of the west coast, who, a youth of less than 21 years, has fought with Carranza, and I. L. Pesqueira, former governor of Sonora, which state was the first to rebel against the Carranza Govern-


