'Have Evidenty Made Good," Writes Lieut. Chester Butler From France Under Date of April 8—This Was Prior To Recent Heavy Engagement in Which He Was Wounded.

Mr. F. H. Butler today received a letter from his son, Lieut, Chester Butler, who was wounded in the heavy fighting last Friday and is now in an English hospital:

Under date of April 8 he writes: We are in now billeted and are very comfortably settled. I am in a house with two other officers and have a bedroom and a bed all to myself. I hardly know how to get in it. It is so long since I have slept between sheets. The people of the house are lovely to us, and they say it is an honor to entertain Cana-

We are about 16 miles north of our former billets, and the march here was simply glorlous. We came through the most beautiful country I have ever seen. I can easily understand how this country is described as "La belle France." Inspected by General.

Gen. Alderson inspected us today, and Gen. Smith-Dorrien is to inspect us in a few days. Our general complimented the Canadians today the splendid W trenches. He said that the English officers who relieved us told him that they were the best-kept trenches he had seen. We certainly did a lot of work fixing them up and putting them in good condition, such as draining out the water, building communicating and support trenches, fixing the parapets, etc. Altogether the Canadians used 150,000 sand bags alone, and that is only a small part of the material

In Fine Condition. To give you some idea of the physical condition of the men, that in the march here a few days ago, a distance of about 18 miles, and done in heavy marching order, there was not a single man fell out. Our battalion is going to have a field day tomorrow afternoon. I saw Herb Scandrett yesterday, and he is certainly looking fine. He is as fat as a pig. They are billeted about half a mile from here.

On the 12th, Lieut. Butler writes and says that the brigade was inspected by Gen. Smith-Dorrien. There was a splendid turnout, and the general expressed himself as highly pleased, and "they do not tell you this unless they are," he Canadians Made Good.

[Canadian Press.] London, April 27-5:22 p.m.-War Secretary Kitchener told the House of Lords today that British prisoners had been insulted, maltreated, and even shot down by their German captors. He made a statement to the House on this subject, in which he spoke in part as follows: "I have been forced with reluct-

ance to accept as indisputably true the maltreatment by the German army of British prisoners. The Hague convention has been flagrantly disregarded by German officers. Our prisoners have been stripped and maltreated in various ways, and in some cases the evidence goes to prove that they have been shot in cold blood. Our offi-cers, even when wounded, have wantonly insulted and frequently struck."

# LOSSES TRIVIAL AMONG THE **ARTILLERYMEN FROM LONDON**

Cable From London Indicates That Guns Were in Reserve During Latest Action--- Lieut. Ryerson Wounded As He Found Brother's Body.

Toronto, April 27.-In view of the anxiety caused by the German claim of having taken Canadian guns and the absence of reports concerning the Canadian Field Artillery Division of forty guns, which led to fear that they had met with disaster, the Toronto Star cabled to its London correspondent for information, and today he replied as follows: "My information indicates that the chief losses were among First, Third, Fourth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Sixteenth Battalions. The Canadian artillery losses are trivial, our artillery being in reserve, and the French artillery supporting our lines."



Wounded who came down to the base today, and there are many hundreds of them, were in high spirits though many of them will assuredly never fight again. They respect the German as a fighting machine, pure and simple, but over his humanity they just shrug their shoulders expressively. They tell how in the great Steenstraete fight they had to retire for a spell during the thick of the tumult, leaving their wounded there. Presently they returned, the Germans having been hurled back under a tornado of machine gun fire. They found all their wounded comrades bayoneted to death. Their revenge for this was swift and terrible at point of their own bayonets; they only took two German prisoners alive.

BROKE ALL CONVENTION.

The Canadians broke all the conventional rules of warfare in their amazing operations. They found the Germans wheeling all around them both behind and in front of their trench.
