Copenhagen, Jan. 2.—Dr. Karl Lieb-knecht was given a sharp defeat in the Spartacan Congress in Berlin today, according to advices received here.

Dr. Liebknecht advocated participation by the Spartacus element in the election of members of the national assembly on the ground that the party might be able to influence the composition of the assembly. Rosa Luxembourg, one of the Spartacan leaders, replied in a violent speech declaring, amid thunderous applause, that "the meeting of the national assembly be prevented at all costs." Dr. Liebknecht's proposal was rejected by a vote of 63 to 23.

Special C. P. R. Trains Conveying Soldiers From

Quebec, Jan. 2.—With every possible care and attention to alleviate their sufferings, the forty odd soldiers from Toronto and vicinity who were injured late Tu-sday evening when a Transcontinental troop train jumped the track some distance east of Edmundston, were brought to this city, arriving about 4 a.m. today. The men who escaped injury on the train when it was derailed, were also brought here, and all are now at the Quebec discharge depot. All these men will leave for Toronto this afternoon and evening. So far, not one of the men, either injured or not, has left the Quebec discharge depot. All will be taken to Toronto over the Canadian Pacific Railway. The colonel said he had discussed the organization of the peace conference with the British delegate.

Berlin, Jan. I.—Three thousand members of the newly-organized Christian people's party, which succeeds the formar Centrists, marched to the ministry of religion and education in Unter-den-Linden at noon today and made a vehement protest against the administration of Adoiph Hoffmann, Independent Socialist, who has become unpopular in church circles because of his attempted legislation opposing religious liberty in parochial schools. The demonstration was under the leadership of Secretary Pfeiffer of the Christian people's party, who is a candidate for the national assembly.

The Germans are re-arming demobilized troops, and fighting is expected, although some of the demobilized soldiers are refusing to serve.

patch to the Mail. The Poles admit that the immensity of the numerous problems absorbing the Allies, but complain that they do not receive the

least sign of attention or a word of guidance. After dealing with the Bolshevist menace to Lemberg, Vilna and other places, the correspondent says the situation is made worse by internal disorder in Poland. Factories in all the industrial towns have been destroyed by the Germans, and thousands of Poles who were sent to Germany during the war are returning to find there is no employment for them. They are taking the law in their own hands, it is said, and are terrorizing their former

employers, compelling them to give them money Lodz is in the hands of the Red Guard, which has shot some of the officers of the regular troops. The Government, headed by Joseph Pilsudski, is weak, the correspondent says.

"It is trying to conciliate everybody," he declares The correspondent concludes by urging the immediate return Gen. Haller's Polish army from France.

POLES ORDERED TO MOBILIZE
