



Speaking at Berlin, Mr. C. C. James, the Ontario deputy minister of agriculture, made a timely appeal for the stimulation of the farming and horticultural industries. Those who have had wide experience of many lands and climes will generally agree with Mr. James that this Province may be made the greatest agricultural country in the world. But at present the production of our fields is stagnant, or certainly not keeping pace with the growth of next election will probably teach him other kinds of wealth.

What is the matter with rural Ontario? It is not only that the west draws off the men. Mr. James insists that there is a want of due interest in agriculture, and urges towns and cities to see to it that farm lands in their immediate neighborhood are adequately and properly cultivated. It is becoming a crying need of cities that the adjacent region should yield abundantly. Individually, citizens will be well advised to invest their wealth in rural estates and look after them.

The school system must bear a great deal of responsibility for present conditions, Mr. James spoke matters as scientific drainof seed and selection stock, and up-to-date fruit culture. All this is a matter of education, and by education also the farmer's sons should be interested in the oil, in life on the soil, and in the



QUEBEC CAN'T DROP MANUFACTURERS' TAX

Premier Gouin Tells Delegation That It Is Necessary.

Montreal, Nov. 4.— "From this gathering you gentlemen can realize," Sir Lomer Gouin remarked on rising to respond to a memorial presented to him yesterday morning by the various bodies in the province who are interested in securing the abolition or reduction of the tax on commercial corporations, "some of the pleasure that a minister enjoys. "How can we increase our expenditures and still reduce our sources of revenue? Is it not the best argument to say that the treatment of corporations in Quebec is different to Ontario, for there are many taxes imposed in Ontario that are not enforced here. We have done much to establish technical education in the province, and are prepared to do more. We spent \$400,000 on good roads this year, and expect to spend double that amount next year. But all this takes money, and if the tax complained of, which yields us a revenue of \$600,000, is abolished there will be a certain deficit next year.

"We all know that the manufacturers are very powerful—it is not so very long ago since they gave a proof of it—but they must not abuse that power. It is possible to discuss the reduction of the tax, but for my own part I do not think that its total abolition is possible."





WHAT GERMANS GOT FROM THE FRENCH

Big Slice of Northern French Congo Ceded to the Kaiser.

Paris, Nov. 3. — France, as com-pensation for German recognition of her protectorate in Morocco, cedes to Germany about 250,000 square kilome-ters in Northern French Congo, touch-ing the German Kameruns.

The territory ceded is inhabited by about 1,000,000 negroes, and has a commerce valued at \$2,400,000 annually. The new German frontier starts at Monda Bay and extends to the Sanga River, thence to Kandeko, thence through the Congo, finally attaining Lake Tchad by way of the Ubanga and Logone Rivers.

France retains the right to run railroad lines across German territory so
as to connect the different parts of
French Central Africa.

The accord does not affect Togoland,
but Germany cedes her "ducks bill,"
extending from Charl River to the Logone River. France and Germany agree
to submit to The Hague tribunal all
difficulties arising from the operation
of the accord.

In reference to Morocco, France
agrees to safeguard the economic
equality and commercial liberty, for
which provision is made in existing
treaties. The only references to commercial rights in the ceded territory
is the mutual agreement to take over
the rights and obligations in connection with the companies holding concessions there.
