Half of Canadian Force Raised in Past Twelve Months.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Jan. 3 .- During the year just passed there were recruited in Canada 178,537 men for overseas service. Despite the considerable falling off in recruiting during the past six months, the year 1916 provided almost half of the total of 383,955 recruited since the
