ation in 1898 of a postal note system equally available for business in Canada and the United States, the insurance of registered letters and the extension of the arrangement whereby Canadian newspapers and other periodicals can be sent to such portions of his majesty's dominions as may reciprocate at the same rates of postage as apply when the papers are sent from place to place in Canada. How postal progress has been made the fact that the revenue, despite the reduced postage rates, has gone up from \$3,202,938 in 1897, to \$4,652,304 in 1904, while the number of letters carried has increased, in round numbers, from 123,830,000 in 1896 to 259,190,000 in the past year. The intelligence of the one letter in every 364 was sent to the dead letter office because of some defect, whereas last year the proportion was only one letter in every 4,430. Canada has not 10,500 postoffices, in round numbers, in operation, and with he settlement of the Northwest new offices are being opened up every day.
This is certainly a very large number.

"The liquor interests as a whole voted against the Ross Government because of the attitude of Mr. Ross and his party. Navy To Be Divided Into Red and Blue Divisions, the Former Posing as Foreign Power.

London, Jan. 30.-The British admiralty has issued a "general idea" of the coming summer's naval maneuvers, which will be a prelude to those of 1906, and are an entirely new departure in the naval operations of marine war. The aim of the great oceanic tournament is to test the strategic efficiency of the new distribution of the fleets, which formed an essential part of the recent organization scheme. A state of war as wide in its area as the whole of the sta-tions of the British fleet will be developed after a preparatory period of strained relations, and it will rest with the main battle fleets and their affiliated cruiser squadrons to demonstrate how far they can maintain the eminion of the sea.
