PRONOUNCING HANDBOOK

—OF—

WORDS OFTEN MISPRONOUNCED,

—AND OF—

WORDS AS TO WHICH A CHOICE OF
PRONUNCIATION IS ALLOWED.

It is our purpose to report here the current usage of the best speakers with regard to such words as are the most liable to be mispronounced, and also to record such words as may be pronounced in either of two ways without any offence to good taste.

In the latter case, that mode which is supported by the greater weight of authority and is the more generally accepted is put first in order.

In the preparation of the list the latest editions of the Quarto Dictionaries of Webster and Worcester have been examined with care, and also the works of the eminent English orthoëpists, Smart, Cull, and Cooley, who make known the best usage of cultivated Englishmen of the present day. Still further research has been made whenever it seemed desirable.

The compilers have noted and carefully considered the cases in which these authorities differ, and have adopted that mode of pronunciation which seemed to them clearly preferable.

1. MARKED LETTERS.

THE following words will serve to indicate the sounds of the marked letters used in the Vocabulary:—

āle, zāt, īce, ōld, ūse, ōōse, gōōd, ānd, ēnd, ūl, ōn, ūp, ūrm, fārc. *ov* is sounded as in *owl*, *th* (italicized) as in *them*, *th* (unitalicized) as in *thin*, *ch* as in *chop*, *er* as in *her*. The vowel *a*, when unaccented, at the end of a word, has a brief sound of *ä* (as in *arm*). An unmarked vowel (except *a*), forming or ending a syllable, has its long or name sound. The vowel *a* unmarked, forming or ending an unaccented syllable, commonly has a slight sound of *a* as in *arm*. (But see clause 3^d, under cautions). An unmarked vowel, followed in the same syllable by any consonant except *r*, has its short sound. But *ar* is pronounced as in *arm*, *er* as in *her*, *or* as in *nor*, *ur* as in *fur*.

2. REMARKS ON CERTAIN SOUNDS.

It may be well to make the following brief remarks in relation to certain points of pronunciation not familiar to most speakers, or in regard to which there is a difference of opinion among orthoëpists.

1. Many cultivated speakers give to the vowel in words of this class the sound of *a* as in *and*. Another large class of speakers give in such words the sound of *a* as in *arm*. Those who prefer the first as the proper quality of the element should avoid the drawl or thin, prolonged sound which is sometimes given to it. Some eminent orthoëpists regard this vowel as of an intermediate quality between *a* as in *and* and *a* as in *arm*; and, as those speakers who hold this opinion would probably avoid the extremes of sound sometimes heard, there may be no practical objection to attempting such a pronunciation.

a as in fare, or e as in there.

2. The most eminent orthoëpists in this country and in England give to the vowel *a* or *e* in words of this class the sound of long *a* deprived of its vanishing element *e* (as heard in *pay, say, &c.*, in which words the *y* may be considered as representing this vanishing element). This practice is better observed by Englishmen than by Americans. In the United States a somewhat lengthened form of *a* as in *and*, although not sanctioned by the Dictionaries, is more commonly given to words of this class, and is not, perhaps, to be condemned. The sound occurs only before *r*, and should be closely blended with the slight sound of *u*, as in *urn*, which is heard before *r* in the pronunciation of such words.

3. The compound long vowel sound, generally indicated by *u*, as in *use*, begins with the consonant *y* and ends with *oo*,—*yoo*.

This is the sound heard in the words *unit* (*yoo'nit*), *cube* (*kyoob*), *mute* (*myoot*), *educate* (*ed'yookate*), &c. But when the compound vowel *u*, or its equivalent, in a monosyllable or an accented syllable, follows *t, d, l, n, s, th, or j* (commonly), the initial element is slighted so as to become a very brief and indistinct sound of *i* as in *ill*; as in *tune, duke, lunar, nude, suit, enthusiast, jewel*. In both cases the elements composing the sound of *u* must be drawn together and pronounced in the same syllable.

After *r, ch, and sh* the initial element is omitted and only the final element *oo* (long or short) is heard, as in *rule* (*rööd*), *true* (*tröö*), *truth* (*trööth*), *fruit* (*frööd*), *grew* (*gröö*), *chew* (*chöö*), *sure* (*shöö*), *sugar* (*shöö-gar*). In some words the same effect is produced by *j*, as *June* (*je-jöön*).

4. When a short sound of *o* occurs before *ss, st, th,* or the sound of *f*, as in *cross, cost, broth, soft, cough*, and in some cases before *ng*, as in *long, strong*, it is the practice of the best speakers to give to the *o* a medium sound between *o* as in *on* and *a* as in *fall*.

5. Many speakers in England give to *e, ea, i,* and *y*, in a few words (as *herd, earth, girl, myrtle*) whose vowel element is commonly pronounced as *u* in *urn*, a sound very nearly like that of *e* as in *end*; but as this distinction is very generally disregarded in this country, and not consistently preserved in England, the sound has received no distinctive mark in the Vocabulary.

3. CAUTIONS AGAINST SOME COMMON ERRORS IN PRONUNCIATION.

1. Do not pronounce *ing* like *in*; as *ev'e'nin* for *ev'e'ning*, *writ'in* for *writ'ing*.
2. Do not pronounce *ow* like *ur* or *uh*; as *hol'tur* or *hol'tuh* for *hol'tow*, *shad'ur* or *shad'uh* for *shad'ow*.
3. Do not pronounce *ed* like *id* or *ud*; as *unit'id* or *unit'ud* for *unit'ed*, *provid'id* or *provid'ud* for *provid'ed*.
4. Do not pronounce *ess* like *iss*; as *good'niss* for *good'ness*, *bold'niss* for *bold'ness*.

5. Do not pronounce *el* like *il*, nor *et* like *it*, nor *est* like *ist*; as *cru'il* for *cru'el*, *bask'it* for *bask'et*, *for'ist* for *for'est*.
6. Do not pronounce *ent* like *unt*, nor *ence* like *unce*; as *si'lunt* for *si'lent*, *sen'tunce* for *sen'tence*.
7. Do not pronounce *ice* like *us*; as *serv'us* for *serv'ice*, *of'fus* for *of'fice*.
8. Do not insert the sound of short *u* before a final *m*; as *hel'um* for *helm*, *chas'um* for *chasm*.
9. Do not give the drawling sound *äö* for *ou* (i. e. *äö*); as *cäö* for *cow*, *häö* for *house*.
10. Do not sound *sh* before *r* like *s*; as *sru* for *shrub*, *sru* for *shrink*.
11. Do not sound *wh* like *w*; as *wen* for *when*, *wat* for *what*, *wip* for *whip*.
12. Do not omit to give the sound of *r* after a vowel in the same syllable as in *arm*, *form*, &c., not *ahm*, *favum*, &c.
13. Do not add the sound of *r* to a final vowel; as *sawr* for *saw*, *idear* for *idea*, *Em'mer* for *Em'ma*.
14. Do not shorten the sound of long *o* in certain words by leaving off its vanishing element *ö*. Pronounce *boat*, *bone*, *road*, *smoke*, *whole*.
15. Do not omit the sound of *d* when preceded by *n*; as *stan* for *stand*, *frenz* for *friends*.
16. Do not omit the sound of *d* in the terminal letters *lds*; as *wilz* for *wilds*, *fälz* for *fields*.
17. Do not omit the sound of *k* when preceded by *s* and followed by *ed*; as *ast* for *asked*.
18. Do not omit the sound of *t* when preceded by *chard* in the same syllable; as *aks* for *acts*, *exak'ly* for *exact'ly*.
19. Do not omit the sound of *t* in the terminal letters *sts*; as *fls's* for *flsts*, *pes's* for *pests*, *accos's* for *accosts*.
20. Do not improperly suppress the vowel sounds in unaccented syllables; as *ev'ry* for *ev'er-y*, *his'try* for *his'to-ry*, *bois'trus* for *bois'ter-ous*.
21. Do not suppress the sound of *e* or of *i* before *l* or *n* in those words in which it should be articulated; as *lev'l* for *lev'el*, *civ'l* for *civ'il*, *kitch'n* for *kitch'en*, *Lat'n* for *Lat'in*.
22. Do not sound *e* or *i* before *n* or *l* in those words in which it is properly silent; as *e'ven* for *e'vn*, *heav'en* for *heav'n*, *ba'sin* for *ba'sn*, *haz'el* for *haz'l*, *e'vil* for *e'vl*.
23. After *r*, *ch*, or *sh* do not give the sound of long *u* when the simple sound of *oo* (long or short) should be heard; as *rule* for *rool*, *fruit* for *froot*.
24. Do not substitute the sound *oo* for that of long *u*; as *toon* for *tune*, *doo'ty* for *duty*; neither add the sound of *ch* or *j* to long *u*; as *Chews'day* for *Tues'day*, *Jewk* for *duke*.
25. The vowel *a* when unaccented, at the end of a word has the sound of *a* (as in *far*) somewhat shortened; as *com'ma* not *com'mä* nor *com'mä*.
26. Give to the vowel *a* in the unaccented terminal syllables *al*, *ant*, *ance*, its short sound, but do not make it too prominent. Pronounce *na'tional*, *ig'norant*, *fra'grance*.
27. Do not give to the vowel *a* (as in *far*), when unaccented and made brief, the sound of short *u*; as *äbase'* for *abase'*, *ärouse'* for *arouse'*.
28. Do not give to long *e* when unaccented and slightly abridged, the sound of short *u*; as *ävent'* for *event'*, *soci'äty* for *soci'ety*.

9. Do not give to long *o* when unaccented and slightly abridged, the sound of short *u*; as *übey'* for *obey'*, *prüpose'* for *propose'*.
30. Do not sound short *o*, when unaccented, as short *u*; as *übscure'* for *obscure'*, *cümmíttee* for *committee*.
31. Do not lay too much stress on an unaccented syllable or a syllable having a secondary accent; as *prümäry* for *primary*, *ex'actly* for *exactly*.
32. In unaccented syllables do not bring out the quality of the vowel too distinctly. In many words "there would be pedantry in scrupulously avoiding the short and easier sounds which the organs are inclined to adopt." For instance, *cab'bage* in common conversation might be *cab'b'ij*, *pal'ace*, *pal'äce*, &c.
- (a) When *a* at the end of an unaccented syllable is followed in the next syllable by *n'* or *r*, it has nearly the sound of short *e*, as in *mis'cella-ny*, *custom-a-ry*.
- (b) In the unaccented final syllable *ate*, of adjectives and nouns, the vowel *a* generally has a sound verging toward short *e*, as in *deli'cate*, *con-sum'mate* (*adj.*).

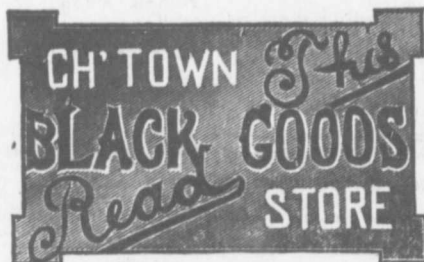
