VERY LATE FROM EUROPE.

The packet-ship Burgundy, from Havre furnishes files of Paris papers to the evening of October 1st, inclusive. These papers con-tain London dates of the evening of September 29th.

The London Herald announces that drafts to all the regiments in Jamaica and the Wind-yard and Leeward Islands, amounting to 50 officers and 800 rank and file, have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness, and embark as soon as conveyance can be provided. It is supposed that these additions to the West

India force are prospective toward Canada.

The seconds in the Wimbledon duel had been sentenced to twelve months imprisonment

-the last month in solitude. The report of the death of Dr. Francia, the Dictator of Paraguay, has been contradicted by a letter from M. de Bonplan to M. de Hom-boldt, written in July, at which time the Dic-tator was in good health.

The sanguine anticipations to which the appointment of Your Excellency as Governor General of British North America gave rise, were, we may be permitted to say, fully borne out by the arts of your Excellency, and by the measures which were known to be in contemplation—measures which promised to the loyal and well-disposed inhabitants of this distant portion of the British Empire, a career of unprecedented prosperity.
