Manila, July 1 .- General Chaffee has sent a letter to the board which is inquiring into the charges of cruelty brought by Major Cornelius Gardener, governor of the province of Tayabas, Luzon, against American officers and soldiers, saying that the abandonment by Major Gardener of the charge that higher officers in the army in the Philippines were was not the answer that Secretary of War Root expected from hims General Chaffee wrote also that Major Gardener was not a judge, of the effect of proving this charge, and that the action of Secretary Root in convening the present board was taken in order that Major Gardener should produce his witnesses.

The abandonment of the charge by the major led to the inference that it was false. But true or false, continued General Chaffee, it affected injuriously the characters of higher
