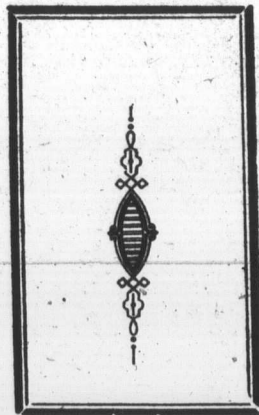

Under the auspices of the local branch of the Department of Agriculture, special meetings will be held as follows on the afternoon and evening: Thursday, Feb. 13th, at Lansdowne in the Town hall.

Friday, Feb. 14th, at Crosby in the Farmers' Club room.

Saturday, Feb. 15th, at Athens in the Town Hall.

Mr F. M. Marcellus, B.S.A., Poultry expert for the Provincial Government and W. A. Brown, B.S.A., Poultry expert for the Dominion Department of Agriculture, will give addresses on the following subjects:

1 80 to 2 45 p.m.—Rearing young chicks.

2 45 to 4 30 p.m.—Discussion of feed and winter egg production.

8 00 to 9 p.m.—Handling eggs for market with candling demonstration.

9 p.m.—Illustrated lecture on general care and management of poultry.

The meetings have been arranged by Mr W. H. Smith, B.S.A., District Representative of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, and the discussion of the very practical subjects on the programme should prove of great benefit to all concerned. As a rule, ladies have most to do with the poultry business, and they are particularly invited to these meetings.

DEATH OF WILLIAM KARLEY

With deep sorrow citizens of Athens learned on Tuesday morning that during the night the spirit of William Karley had taken its flight.

Mr Karley was subject to hemorrhages and several times during recent years he has been near to death's door. He suffered one of these attacks about two months ago and though he rallied at times he grew steadily weaker until death came. He was aged 62 years, 11 months.

No citizen of Athens was ever more highly esteemed in village and country than Mr Karley. His name was a synonym with all that is fair and honest in business and his social qualities were such as gained the friendship and esteem of all that knew him. A prominent member of the Conservative party, his course was always such as to retain the confidence and respect of his political opponents. A devoted member of the Anglican Church, he was a recognized leader in all that pertained to the welfare of the Church in this parish and at his death occupied the position of People's Warden.

Born in the Township of Rear Yonge and Escott, he has spent his whole life here, first engaging in the dairy business and for the last thirty years conducting a hardware business in Athens, latterly in company with Mr E. J. Purcell.

He is survived by his wife and two daughters, Mrs E. Pinkerton of Yorkton, Sask., who returned to her home from his bedside a few days ago, and Miss Jean who has been with him during his last illness. Mr John Karley, Montreal is his brother and he has three sisters, Mrs Wm Black of Brockville, Mrs Fred Pierce of Bassano and Mrs Albert Pennock.

The funeral is taking place this (Wednesday) afternoon service being conducted in Christ's Church by the Rector, Rev. W. G. Swayne.

Death At Addison

The death occurred at her residence in Addison, Saturday afternoon at 2.30, of Mrs Boyd Hall, an elderly and esteemed resident of the township. She had been in feeble health for several months, due to advanced years.

Deceased was 85 years of age and resided in the township all her life. She was Ellen, daughter of Eels Gilpin. Mr Hall died three years ago and her only surviving relative is one brother, Mr Wm Gilpin of Cobden. The late Mrs Hall was a woman of fine Christian character and affable disposition. She possessed the respect of all her acquaintances, and in passing a noble life has been taken. The remains were brought to Athens vault on Monday last.

What They Cost

Postmasters will be frequently asked concerning the annual cost of a rural mail box, therefore it might be well to understand that there is no annual fee to pay for a rural mail box. The first cost is \$3.00. This is the only charge, and boxes are served free of cost for all time, or at least as long as the present regulations are in force. The carrier is paid by the Government one dollar a year for each box he serves, in addition to the amount of his mail contract.

The final results have given no principles to invent future work. If experiments made at the New York agricultural experimental station are reliable...

Old meadows generally are lacking in nitrogen, which is most easily supplied by the application of nitrate of soda at the rate of 300 to 600 pounds per acre.

The only way to be sure of the kind of fertilizer to apply is to make trials of different mixtures and find out which gives the best results.

In 13 comparisons on the Minnesota station farm new seed, from outside sources, gave an average yield of 122 bushels of potatoes to the acre more than seed from varieties continuously grown on the farm for three to 12 years.

It is reported that red squirrels do this discovery was made at Brunswick, Me., and experts are investigating the matter.

The sow, like the dairy cow, should not be too thin at farrowing time. For some time prior to farrowing she should have some rich food in ash, or receive some bonemeal daily, and have access to wood ashes and lime, for the framework of the unborn youngsters.

No other crop will bring in better returns in the north for the time it occupies the ground than buckwheat. It is put in after the other crops have been planted and are growing.

Should maggots get in the animal's wounds, kill the pests by a light application of chloroform. After the wounds have been freed of maggots and made perfectly clean, apply freely a mixture of one dram of iodiform and six drams of boric acid, and repeat the application two or three times a day.

Quids of grass, finely chewed and rolled together, found lying about in the horse pasture, are the result of trouble with the teeth. No horse should be permitted to go until his teeth have become so uneven. Horse owners should make it a practice to have the teeth of all their horses, of which there is any question, examined and cared for by a capable person.

Dairymen sometimes debate whether to feed their cows silage or bran. A little of both is better than either alone, and in most circumstances more economical. Bran supplies protein, an element in which corn silage is rather deficient. The two makes a balanced ration.
