





LONDON, Feb. 24-The question of providing for the landing and marketing of Canadian cattle when the new importation of animals' bill, which supercedes the long standing embargo on importations of cattle from Canada, comes into operation, arose in the House of Commons yesterday, when Minister of Agriculture, Sir Robert Sanders was asked if arrangements had been made in connection therewith.

The minister said the landing of Canadian cattle probably become possible a few weeks hence when the act was brought into operation. It was expected that Dundee and Glasgow would be ready to receive Canadian cattle when the act came into force, he said, but he was prepared to consider the matter of approving other ports for the purpose upon receipt of proposals from port

are given in the report, which can be obtained free of charge from the Publications branch, Ottawa. Agriculturally they include investigational work with soils, fer-





