Canada's New Govern-
ment.

As briefly stated in our last
issue, and as is now well known
Canada has a new Prime Minister.
The arrangements for the
change were concluded on Wed-
nesday evening of last week, July
7, when Sir Robert Borden pro-
ceeded to Rideau Hall and ten-
ded his resignation to his Excel-
lency, the Governor General, at
the same time introducing Hon.
Arthur Meighen as his successor
in the Premiership. His Excel-
lency accepted Sir Robert's resig-
nation, to take formal effect on
Saturday. This margin of a few
days was in order to afford Mr.
Meighen sufficient time to select
his colleagues and arrange for the
presentation of the new Cabinet.
Following is the official announce-
ment, issued from Government
House, on Wednesday evening:
"The formal resignation of Sir
Robert Borden will be tendered to
His Excellency the Governor Gen-
eral on Saturday next, the tenth
instant, and will be accepted by
His Excellency with great regret.
His Excellency has entrusted to
the Honorable Arthur Meighen,
Minister of the Interior, the for-
mation of a new administration,
and Mr. Meighen has undertaken
that duty."

Sir Robert Borden, who has
been obliged to relinquish the
office of Prime Minister of Can-
ada, in consequence of impaired
health, resulting from his devotion
to his country's cause, will go
down in history as one of Can-
ada's greatest sons. He has been
a member of the House of Com-
mons for twenty-four years, and
Prime Minister for nine years.
He safely and wisely piloted
Canada through, by far, the most
onerous, critical and dangerous
periods of her history, and ele-
vated her to heights among the
nations, undreamed of before his
time. In this tremendous ordeal
he sacrificed himself, and he is
now a casualty of the war, as
much as if he had been in the
trenches. Sir Robert Borden's
greatness and power spring from
his splendid attainments, his ab-
solute sincerity and his extraor-
dinary wisdom and moderation.
These are the qualities that gave
him such power and influence
over all who came in close touch
with him. Numerous tributes to
Sir Robert's greatness have been
published in the press, not only
of Canada, but of Great Britain
and the United States. We will
present here only two brief ex-
tracts. The first is from the Mon-
treal Gazette and is as follows:
"Sir Robert Borden will go
down in history as the great Can-
adian war minister. He proved
himself equal to an occasion that
called for courage, patience, con-
fidence and inflexible determina-
tion. Not for one instant did
Sir Robert waver. His sense of
duty dominated him, and from
the path he marked out there
was no turning. From the sincer-
ity of his motives, from his great
attainments, nothing can detract,
and in his quest for restoration of
health he will carry the admira-
tion, the gratitude, and the hopes
of the Canadian people that, un-
burdened of the strain of office
he will in many a coming year
find that which he seeks."

The following excerpt is from
an editorial in the Montreal
Gazette:
"Canada's greater for having
such a son as Sir Robert Borden.
He has led her to heights that
were not in sight when the con-
trol of her affairs passed into his
hands. As the illustrious men
who deserve to be remembered as
the fathers of confederation
wisely and boldly flung open the
doors of Canada's true course in
history, so, at another parting of
the ways at which she passed
forty-four years later, Sir Robert
Borden directed her on the right
course. His part in the war was
worthy of Canada and her heroic
defenders. He served Canada in
the decade of its history most
crowded with great events, and
he goes out of office with the
greatest reputation ever made by
a Canadian statesman."

Canada To Be Congra-
tulated

Toronto, July 9.—Sir Thomas
White said in an interview today
that he had nothing to add to the
statement which he gave to the
press on Tuesday evening. He is
well satisfied with the political
situation at Ottawa, and expresses
an affectionate personal regard for
Hon. Mr. Meighen, as well as high
admiration for his talent and
character. "He is," he said, "an
exceptionally brilliant public man,
with an absolutely clean record,
sincere, honorable and straight-
forward. Canada is to be con-
gratulated that such a leader is
available. He is also a most ca-
pable administrator. No one bet-
ter knows the outstanding prob-
lems confronting Canada at this
time; or has reflected more deeply
upon them. His integrity of char-
acter is well known, and no one
is personally more popular among
his associates in the House, where
his skill in debate has always in-
cited the highest admiration."
Sir Thomas has always been a
warm admirer of the "baby" of
the old Conservative cabinet; and
is sure that his administration
will be greatly to the advantage
of the public. He states that the
situation in the present cabinet is
entirely harmonious, and he looks
with confidence for a continuation
of stable government at Ottawa.

Platform of New National
Liberal and Conser-
vative Party.

At the caucus of the Govern-
ment held on July 1st, the min-
isters and their supporters ap-
proved the following platform as
setting forth the principles of the
new National Liberal and Con-
servative party, with such ad-
ditions as may be found necessary
from time to time:
"CONSTITUTIONAL
The firm adherence to British
connection, in full confidence that
Canada will find its amplest
scope for development, usefulness
and influence as a member of the
British Commonwealth with the
status of a self-governing
nation equal to that of the other
members. The maintenance of
the autonomy of Canada and its
existing rights and powers of
self-government, the approval of
the principle that no treaty,
understanding or commitment
which may involve the Empire
ought to be undertaken except
after consultation and by com-
mon consent. Approval of Can-
ada's membership in the League of
Nations, and a firm determina-
tion to maintain our recognized
status as a member of the league.
The upholding by every means
within the federal power of con-
stituted authority throughout the
Dominion; the maintenance of
Parliamentary control over all
legislation; respect for the rights
and powers of the provinces.

CITIZENSHIP.

The adoption of such measures
as are necessary to maintain and
protect the ideals of Canadian
citizenship and co-operation with
the provinces in their efforts to
Canadianize alien immigrants; the
fostering of a Canadian as op-
posed to any class or sectional
spirit and the elimination of all
prejudices that tend to retard or
destroy national unity and de-
velopment."

NATIONAL POLICIES.

Practical application of the
principles that Parliament and
Government exist to make and
administer laws for all the people
and not for any particular class
or section to the detriment of the
nation as a whole; the carrying
out of policies that are nation-
wide in their application or effect
and that look toward the growth
and development of the whole of
Canada and the prosperity and
happiness of all its people.

THE TARIFF.

A thorough revision of the
tariff with a view to the adop-
tion of such reasonable measures
as are necessary: (a) to assist in
providing adequate revenues, (b)
to stabilize legitimate industries,
(c) to encourage the establishment
of new industries essential to the
economic development of the
nation, (d) to develop to the
fullest extent our natural re-
sources, (e) to prevent the abuse
of the tariff for the exploitation
of the consumer and, (f) to safe-
guard the interests of the Cana-

Canadian People in the ex-
porting duplication and offsetting
economics in construction and
administration. Efficient, expert
management and operation of
the entire National Railway
system, unfettered by partisan
political interference. The fixing
of a proper capitalization for the
National Railway system.

NATIONAL DEFENCE; AIR
SERVICE.

The reorganization, upon a
moderate scale, of the Canadian
militia system, and the restriction
of the permanent forces to such
establishment as will constitute a
nucleus for defence, maintain
respect for constituted authority
and ensure the public safety. The
establishment and maintenance of
an efficient nucleus of a Canadian
air service, so constituted and
administered as to be available
for either military or civil duties.

EX-MEMBERS OF THE
FORCE.

Continuation of the policy of
aiding ex-members of the forces
to become satisfactorily estab-
lished in the civil life of the com-
munity. Should experience show
the necessity of further special
consideration of claims made
upon behalf of the disabled, or
the dependents of those who
have fallen, in order that the
nation may discharge its full
obligations to those who have
thus suffered.

LABOR.

The enactment of such laws
as will carry into effect the
ideals and principles embodied in
the Treaty of Peace, regard being
had as contemplated by the
Treaty, to the time and character
of similar legislation enacted by
other nations. The encourage-
ment of confidence and co-opera-
tion between employers and em-
ployed.

AGRICULTURE.

The inauguration of policies
conceived with a view of increas-
ing the agricultural production of
Canada, and of improving mark-
eting methods and facilities in
order to obtain the best net return
to producers. With this object
in view, and for the purpose of
eliminating duplication of ser-
vices and expenditures, the reach-
ing of an agreement with the
provinces respecting the future
activities of the Federal and
Provincial Departments of Agri-
culture. Co-operation with the
provinces in the direction of pro-
viding better rural credits and
improved social conditions in rural
communities. Regulation and con-
trol of cold storage and refrigerat-
ing facilities so as to provide for
the satisfactory marketing of
perishable products in the in-
terests of both producer and
consumer. Co-operation with the
Provincial Departments of Agri-
culture in a united effort, having
for its object the improvement of
the live stock and dairy industries
to the end that production may
be increased and quality im-
proved. To further facilitate and
encourage all phases of agricul-
tural production and experimen-
tation.

FOREIGN TRADE.

Continued thorough study by
competent experts of foreign mar-
kets and the opportunities therein
for the development and exten-
sion of Canadian trade, and the
collation and distribution of per-
tinent and up-to-date information
in relation thereto to the business
men of Canada. Efficient pub-
licly agencies for making known
abroad the commercial resources
and products of Canada. The
maintenance of continuous com-
munication by correspondents and
personal visits between our agen-
cies abroad and our producers at
home. A system of accurate and
comprehensive statistical rep-
resentation of our commercial and
productive output and distribu-
tion.

IMMIGRATION.

A firm adherence of the prin-
ciple that Canada as a self-govern-
ing nation has the absolute right
to determine its own immigration
policy. The energetic promotion
of immigration of desirable classes
of persons who wish to establish
homes in Canada and to become
loyal Canadian citizens. As in
the past, encouragement will be
continued to prospective land seek-
ers, agricultural labor and house-
hold workers. The continuation
and extension of the policy adopted
to prevent the landing in
Canada of mental or physical
defectives of all such persons as are
likely to become public charges,
and of those whose ideals, cus-
toms and modes of life are such

as to render them incapable of
assimilation within a reasonable
time.

NATURAL RESOURCES AND
CONSERVATION.

The transfer under fair terms
and conditions of the remainder
of the public domain held by the
Dominion to any province of Can-
ada, in which such domain is
situated, subject to such reserves
as may be deemed advisable in
the public interest. As regards
the public domain and all other
natural resources outside the prov-
inces and owned by the Domin-
ion, the adoption of such policies
as will result in their use and de-
velopment to the advantage of
Canada as a whole.

INLAND WATERWAYS AND
HIGHWAYS.

Such further development of
the existing canal systems of
Canada as is necessary to improve
navigation and cheapen transpor-
tation, with the additional object
in view of developing the produc-
tion and use of electrical energy
for domestic, agricultural, mun-
icipal, industrial and railway pur-
poses, and under such prudent
regulations as will thoroughly
safeguard the interests of the
people. The carrying to comple-
tion of the provisions made by
Parliament for co-operation with
the provinces in the matter of
highways construction.

Local and Other Items

A huge increase in educational expenditure for London is proposed which will make the rate for education a shilling in the pound.

The priests of this diocese are attending their annual retreat this week, at St. Dunstan's University. Rev. Father Cunniff, S. J. is the preacher of the retreat.

Admiral Lord Fisher, former Admiral of the Fleet and First Sea Lord of the British Admiralty, died in London on the 10th inst., aged 79.

Eight workmen employed on the State Industrial Canal were killed at New Orleans on the 9th, by lightning striking a pile driver under which they had taken refuge from a storm.

Sir Lomer Gouin, Prime Minister of Quebec, has resigned the Premiership and is succeeded by Hon. Mr. Taschereau, Minister of Public Works, in the Provincial Government.

Mrs. Edwards Maloney and Mrs. Alexander Duffon, both of Brooklyn, were drowned when a row boat in Lake George, N. Y., on 9th, came in contact with the left side paddle wheel of the steamer Sagamore near Claverdale.

After clinging to the bottom of an overturned knockabout six hours and having been borne on his father's back toward safety, Lawrence E. Chapman, 20 years old of Providence, R. I., dived from exhaustion in the waters of Narragansett Bay the other morning.

This information comes from Boston, under date of the 12th inst: The White Star liner Celtic has been held at quarantine since Friday because the crew refuse to be washed. The detention involves 1,543 steerage passengers, and is costing the company about \$30,000 a day. First class passengers were allowed to land without bathing.

Lethbridge advices of the 12th say: One and one half inches of rain fell over the whole of southern Alberta from the Rockies to Saskatchewan and from Calgary to the boundaries last night, and according to experimental farm reports the storm means an added five bushels to the acre on the southern Alberta crop this year.

Arrangements have been made by the British Government to liquidate its debt of \$100,000,000 to Argentina. It is proposed to make this payment by meeting periodically the interest on Argentina's external debt held in London. The July 1 payment has been made, and Great Britain has already liquidated half of her debt, which was for payment of cereals by paying off obligations amounting to \$50,000,000 which Argentina owed United States bankers.

Among the passengers landed at Quebec on the 9th from the C. P. O. S. Empress of France, were six stowaways who claim Liverpool as their home. They were all determined to come out to Canada, and not having the wherewithal to pay their passages, waived that formality by simply walking aboard the vessel and keeping under cover until the Empress was far out to sea. These supernumerary passengers, who were handed over to the custody of the local immigration officials upon arrival were held for deportation, are a sturdy lot of lads whose ages average only twenty years.

Winnipeg advices of the 8th say: On the whole the crop outlook in Manitoba is very encouraging, says an official report given out this afternoon by the Provincial Department of Agriculture. It is stated that reports from probably fifty per cent of points are entirely satisfactory while, from some others, there is some word of lack of recent rains. There is no suggestion of crop failure, however, and indications run from "fair" to "very good." Many early wheat fields are headed or heading. A fairly early harvest is expected. Grasshoppers have been successfully fought with poison.

Local and Other Items

There was a fair attendance at the market yesterday, and prices were not much changed from the last previous quotation.

Quebec L'Evenement:—"Sir Robert Borden will have for his successor as leader of the Canadian Government the most brilliant and the best of his colleagues, the Hon. Arthur Meighen, who, in spite of his comparative youth—being no more than 45 years of age—has been a member for 12 years, and a Minister for several years. This choice, we believe, will realize the desires of the parliamentary majority. It can be said with truth that he has been the right arm of his chief since they have fought together in the arena of the House of Commons."

The Times editorial, under the heading, "An Imperial Statesman," says: "Sir Robert Borden's retirement from the leadership of the Canadian Unionist Party will be received by the Mother Country, as well as Canada, with deep regret. Under his guidance Canada won equal nationhood with the Empire. He is one of the great figures of the war, and neither Canada nor the Empire can ever forget the debt we owe him." The Daily Mail says that through all weathers he has been true to a very high ideal of Imperial service.

The Naval Fleet, consisting of a cruiser, two destroyers, and two submarines, which the British Government has presented to the Admiralty, are expected to come out to Canada in September. Commander Hoss, who recently went to England to supervise the taking-over, has asked that a number of other officers be sent across. The ships are now being overhauled and got in readiness for service. They may be quartered at Halifax in summer and Esquimaux in winter. Commander Hoss is likely to succeed Admiral Kingmill as director of the Canadian Naval Service.

The following news is from Quebec, under date of July 6th: The C. P. O. S. steamship Victorian, docked at Quebec yesterday afternoon with 1,150 passengers, 650 tons of freight and a large quantity of mail. All the passengers were landed and examined before the special train left the pier, where the vessel is berthed. Bad weather and fog were encountered on the voyage out, but nothing of any note happened on the trip across. The C. P. O. S. steamship Metagama with 1,767 passengers and some mail and cargo, reached Quebec at 9.30 last evening. The captain reported the trip as being an uneventful one, except for the bad weather and the fog the vessel ran into. The ship's passengers were disembarked and examined this morning.

During the running of the Grand Prix de Paris at Longchamps, near Paris, June 27th, an airplane which had been circling the course at an altitude of 3,000 feet descended and followed the racers, flying over the horses at a height estimated at 100 feet and taking moving pictures. Engine trouble developed during the flight, and the pilot was compelled to make a landing on the field. The enraged crowd immediately surrounded the machine and wrecked the wings and tail. They were threatening the pilot and the camera man, when mounted police galloped up and arrested the aviators, who were taken to court on a charge of flying without permission, and a fine of about 2000 francs was imposed by the magistrate.

The sole land of a family of 125 men over 18 years of age who was at the commencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Holders of patents may come to the employment of farm laborers in Canada during 1921, as residence duties under certain conditions.
