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

continuation of the work of the Asso-DR. KEEGAN'S SPEECH. Dr. L. E. Keegan then contributed an enlightening and practical address. He explained that Tuberculosis was a germ disease. In that respect it was like typhus, typhoid, small-pox, and diphtheria. In the case of this group, an attempt was made to fight the germs. In the matter of Consumption, no attempt was of Consumption, no attempt was made to isolate cases. Let a case of small-pox arise in the city and im-mediately a panic arises, isolation is called for, and the germs are fought and conquered. In the case of conumption nothing is done to con-uer them, but on the contrary, ough ignorance, everything is done facilitate the spread of the disease s did not occur from any infre-ncy of the disease, or from any difficulty in stamping out the germ. Go to Rawlins' Cross and watch the mournful processions that wend their way past that spot. Ask what the dear one died of. The answer will rarely be, diphtheria, typhoid or small-pox, but in most cases it will be consumption and you will often be told that other members of the same family had died from the same disease, and yet it is most difficult to get people to understand that this germ disease is the most easy to fight of all the germ diseases. These germs are small, infinitely small, far too minute to be seen with the naked eye, they are miscroscopic in size, and can only be seen by the aid of the powerful lenses of a microscope. On one occasion he took a man into his

man enquired what the brass article was, and on being told it was a mi-croscope, remarked, "I thought you had the germs in that box," and left he surgery. There are many men as lifficult to enlighten as the one referred to. It was this appalling norance that had to -be dispelled. These consumptive germs need suitable soil in which to thrive. Darkness, bad air, dirt, all offered it a suitable home. It was often said consumption was hereditary. was not so. A child was born of weakly consumptive parents, it weakly and bodily unable to make a fight against the germs which sur-rounded it in its home and from its parents, and like its parents, it succumbed to the surroundings to which the consumption germs thrived. Not only were many habitations insanithe city itself was a disgrace its citizens. 

# Cable News.

Discussing the Workingmen's Invrance scheme in the Commons today, Chancellor Lloyd George estima ted that his plans would affect 14,-00,000 men and women. Provision will be made whereby women will receive thirty shillings in maternity cases on condition that they do not work for a month following childbirth, and for free medical attendance for every contributor. The State would also help in the Crusade against Consumption, providing \$7,500,000 to aid local authorities in the erection of sanitariums, also \$5,000,000 towards maintenance. Although cases of permanent disability would have a sick allowance of five shillings week, ten shillings will be allowed for the first three months in the case of men, and seven shillings and sixpence in the case of women. Those who can be shown to have invited their incapability through excesses or otherwise would receive no insurance, though necessary medical treatment will be provided. The Chancellor concluded that the total amount to be raised for a dual plan of insurance and tuberculosis campaign will be \$122,500,000, of which amount the State would contribute \$12,500,000 the first year. By the fourth year the State contribution would be almost \$27,500,000, but a measure for the relief of invalid and nursery homes would have been taken.
