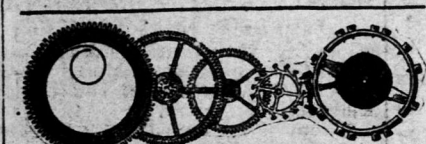

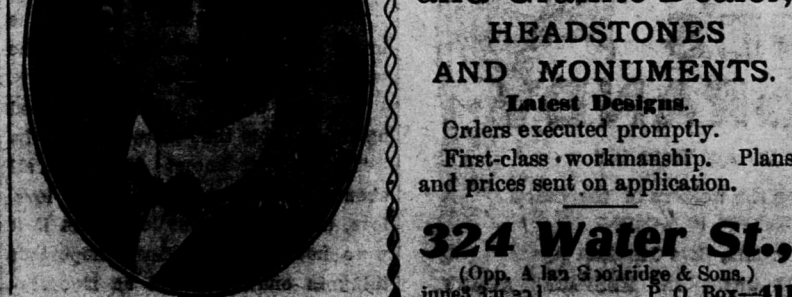

Derringham hastens to Greece, catches Halcyone in the temple of her goddess, and after another beautiful scene all ends well.

BELFAST, Aug. 15.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.
It is said to be reasonably certain that no further protest will be made by British on behalf of the British mercantile interests, against the Canal Bill, if it finally takes the form reported yesterday from the Conference Committee. The British objection was based on discrimination against British shipping. As such shipping will not now be privileged to enter into the American coastwise trade, which alone is to receive favored treatment in the Canal, that objection is overcome. It is regarded as possible, however, that in deference to Canada, the British Government may be led to object to the prohibition against the passage of railway-owned ships, but the Department officials would not hold under the Treaty, as the prohibition is to apply to American vessels as well as others, there could be no charge of discrimination there.

TenorHas Opera House of His Own.

Signor Constantino, the Spanish tenor, announces that he will open an opera house of his own in Buenos Ayres, September 20th.
The Teatro Constantino will be a modern opera house in every particular. The building is a cement structure with one of the most beautiful parks in Buenos Ayres at its threshold. It cost \$250,000, subscribed by a syndicate of leading citizens of Buenos Ayres. It will contain an auditorium accommodating 2,000 and be equipped with seventy boxes; a restaurant and rooms of the leading social club of the city. The curtain, chairs and decorations were purchased in the United States, Signor Constantino being a patron of Uncle Sam's industries.
Signor Constantino will open the house on September 20th with "Rigoletto." The season will cover twenty-five performances of leading French and Italian operas to be given in one month. During the year the leading opera singers will appear at the theatre on their way to and from Europe and the United States. All the prominent artists will appear and all the leading operas will be produced.—American Musical News Service.

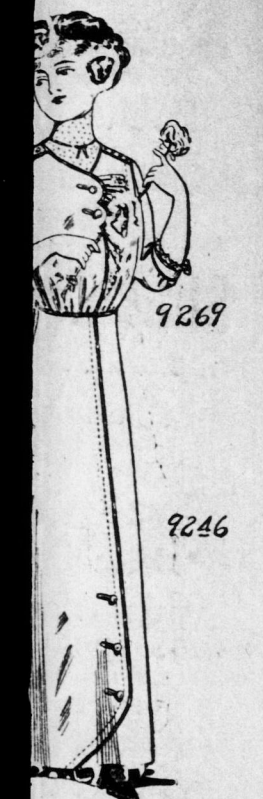

THE TORY SLOUGH.

Editor Robinson this morning tells us, that in spite of all our criticism of the Premier's doing, Sir Edward would offer us the glad hand and help us out of a slough. And Editor Robinson speaks as one speaking with authority and knowledge. His readers know full well he is Sir Edward's journalistic mouth-piece. It is passing strange that the editor of the Morison organ should play such a part, but he has been playing it now for some considerable time, and it is overt evidence of Sir Edward's guile. So much then for his authority. As to his knowledge that is a matter of record. No one has abused Sir Edward more roundly than Editor Robinson and his chief patron, Hon. D. Morison, unless it be his twin brother of the Chronicle. He one has attacked him more fiercely than this trio of political heeler who have been deep in the political slough.

We furnish to-day a specimen of Robinson's abuse of Morris, and we can furnish more specimens as occasion demands. Here is one: "For Sir E. P. Morris, it is enough that moneyed men, capitalists like the Harmsworths are concerned. Capitalists have an apparently irresistible attraction for him. It is long since the tribune of the west end became transformed into the courtier of King Pentas, whether Prince Reid or Prince Harmsworth be the regent. But what wonder! Sir Edward has more than one illustrious example, wealth not infrequently transforming the socialist into a reactionary of the bluest tint. After all, the man who could vote for the contract of 1898, and then vote for that of 1901, could vote for anything, and we may well be pardoned for not taking seriously his views of any contract where capitalists are concerned."

Is it a wonder then that the lines

quoted by the Editor of the Daily News stick in his memory? Is it a wonder that the author of the abuse applies them to the man who took him out of the political slough and hoisted him into the Legislative Council?

A perusal of the words will point the moral. They are:—"While you are abusing him, even now, He would help either one of you out of a slough."

Mr. Robinson speaks from personal experience, and who should know if he does not, and moreover he has other examples before his eyes. There is the parallel case of the Hon. P. T. McGrath, who heaped abuse on Morris and now finds himself an honourable member of the Legislative Council.

Striking as these illustrations are, they pale into insignificance before the illustration to which a veiled allusion is made in the objection taken to our criticism of the action of the Governor and the Prime Minister in the Morison case. We have dared to criticize the sacrosanct features of these veiled prophets, and to tell them what we think of their whitewashing of Morison, and as a result called forth confessions of Mr. Robinson. He calls upon himself and his readers in charity to remember that "Folks never understand the folks they hate." What a penitent mood Editor Robinson is in at present! And how charitable!

Mr. Morison could never have understood Sir Edward when he wrote of him:—"If my main object in life was what the man in the street called political success, I might take pattern by Sir E. P. Morris, who is such a warm friend of Temperance reformers and rumsellers alike at one and the same time."

"However," in the words of the Hon. J. A. Robinson, "let us in charity remember that 'folks ner understand the folks they hate.'"

Let us remember, too, about Sir Edward: While you are abusing him thus, even now He would help either one of you out of a slough.

Are the public likely to forget that Sir Edward Morris helped the Hon. Donald Morison out of the slough into which his Orange Bay letter and his timber greed had plunged him?

But they do not honour Sir Edward Morris for that. They attribute it to the fear that if he had not pulled him out, the whole administration would have been shortly in a political slough out of which they could not have extricated themselves.

They do not honour Sir Edward for setting the Hon. Donald Morison, the Hon. P. T. McGrath and the Hon. J. A. Robinson on political pinnacles, no more than they trust him for deceiving them about the cost of the railway. They have lost confidence in him, just as we lost confidence in him.

The editor of the Daily News declares some years ago we delighted to honour Sir Edward Morris. Yes, that is so. But, it was before he became a political turncoat and succumbed to the blandishments of the Tory party. Has the Daily News editor forgotten the blandishment used in a letter in the Daily News of May 17th, 1909, when Sir Edward Morris was acting as Premier during the absence of Sir Robert Bond in London?

Here are the concluding words: "Sir E. P. Morris is fortunate in the possession of friends on both sides of politics, who are proud of his success and who will be glad to see him at the proper time go up higher." These words were significant and foreshadowed the action of Sir Edward Morris three months later, when he left the Bond government.

But they are no more significant than words which appeared in another Tory paper of an earlier date; when Morris was called the Man of the Hour, and called upon to leave the government.

For these and many other reasons, we decline to take the glad hand of Sir Edward Morris. But we decline chiefly because he is plunging the country into a financial slough which will seriously embarrass the future. The only hope of the future in the statesmanship of Sir Robert Bond, who will have a difficult task in taking the country out of the slough into which Morris is casting it. Doubtless, the Daily News would be pleased if Sir Robert Bond would succumb to the blandishments of Sir Edward Morris and allow himself to be put in nomination for high office. Then in charity, the penickers would begin to understand the folks they hate. Then the Daily News man would have a good word for him as he had when Sir Robert gave him a job about the Post Office. But Sir Robert is too patriotic to succumb to blandishment as Sir Edward did. As for ourselves we shall continue to criticize Sir Edward Morris's administration, as order, and if not, give us a trial criticism to serve the King and preserve his name by criticizing the acts of his servants which are derogatory to his honour.

We shall not be deterred in the future any more than in the past by the exalted office of that servant. We shall not hesitate to criticize a Governor, who is staggered by wrongdoing and condones the wrong-doer. Who but a hard-shell Tory of the most reactionary brand could have converted our plain speaking to the Governor about his whitewashing of Morison into an insult to the King?

Why, we were honouring the King, while the Governor, the Premier and the Attorney General were degrading his Government. An Attorney General greedy of timber lands who writes a letter such as the Orange Bay letter is not preserving unsullied the vice-regality of the King.

But the journalist or public man who comes out boldly and criticizes acts derogatory to the King's government, is serving the King best, and endeavouring to preserve the fame and name of the Kingship unsullied. As to Sir Robert Bond, he will be faced with a gigantic task in extricating the Colony from the slough into which the Morris administration has plunged it. But he is a statesman, cast in heroic mould, and he will face the task, as he faced a similar task in 1895.

Seven Murderers

Electrocuted at Sing Sing To-day.
One Man Put to Death While in a Faint.

Ossing, N. Y., Aug. 12.—Seven murderers were taken from their cells in Sing Sing this morning and put to death in the electric chair. This is the largest number of criminals to suffer death penalty by electricity on any one occasion since the electric chair was adopted as a method of capital punishment. The six Italians and one negro electrocuted this morning went to their deaths quietly and the executions were accomplished in an hour and sixteen minutes. The condemned men were put to death in the following order:—John W. Collins, Lorenzo L. Calif, Salvatore de Marco, Filippo de Marco, Angelo Giusto, Vincenzo Cona, and Joseph Ferrone.
Cona fainted as the straps were being adjusted about his body. He walked to the chair white faced and trembling, and as he kissed the crucifix when the leather straps were being placed about his body he fell over limply in a dead faint. The cap was affixed quickly and the current sent through his body.
All the prisoners with the exception of Collins walked to the death chamber protesting their innocence. Collins came in smiling and seemingly happy and did not deny his guilt. He prayed on his knees at the chair for a minute before he was executed.

JUMPED FROM EIFFEL TOWER.

Paris, Aug. 12.—An elegantly dressed young girl, whose identity has not yet been established, committed suicide by throwing herself from the top-most platform of the Eiffel Tower, 905 feet from the ground.
The girl ascended in the lift and was seen to scribble something hastily in her note book and then to tear up what she had written. "For a moment she leant on the balustrade contemplating the superb panorama spread out at her feet and weeping bitterly. Then she suddenly sprang on to the bench running round the large platform and dived head first out of one of the windows.
Her body dropped to the second platform, 535 feet below, after being practically cut in two on the intervening ironwork. The remains were mutilated beyond recognition. In the pocket of her serge tailor-made dress was found £16 in French money and a pencilled note giving the address of a Paris hotel. There, however, the girl was quite unknown. The remains were sent to the Morgue.

Darrow to Speak Himself.

Speech to be Delivered Next Week is Drawing Crowds to the Famous Trial, Los Angeles, Aug. 10.—So great has been the demand for seats at the bribery trial of Clarence S. Darrow next week when the final arguments will be made, that admittance probably will be arranged by card. The entire week will be given over to oratory, with the case going finally to the jury not later than Friday evening. There was no session to-day, as the taking of evidence was concluded yesterday.
Mr. Ford, assistant district attorney, will make the opening argument for the prosecution on Monday. He will be followed on Tuesday by Mr. Horace H. Appel, attorney, who will open for the defence. Appel will divide the day with Earl Rogers, chief counsel, who is expected to continue his speech through the greater part of Wednesday.
Because of his oratorical ability Darrow's closing speech in his own behalf is expected to excite the most interest. The accused probably will begin his plea to the jury late on Wednesday afternoon, and conclude Thursday at noon, after which John Fredericks, district attorney, will make the closing argument, using Thursday afternoon and probably all of Friday.

Protest Against Panama Bill.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-Day.
Melbourne telegrams indicate that a strong feeling has been aroused in Australia over the Panama Canal Bill. Premier Fisher, Labor Minister of Commonwealth, has made representations to Imperial Government especially concerning the proposal to grant free tolls to American coasting vessels. Both Australia and New Zealand have declared for similar preference in favor of Empire as against foreign ships, in what they American principle regard as constant wise trade between all parts of British Empire. Australia is understood to be willing to greatly enlarge the tariff preference on British goods if the British Government will remove provisional Imperial Veto on measure which has already passed commonwealth Parliament, restricting preference to goods carried in British bottoms. The leading ministerial Journal, the Daily News, adds its protest against Canal Bill as violation of solemn treaty obligations. It forshadow that if Congress persists the British Ministry will ask that an Independent Tribunal be called upon to interpret the true meaning of Hay-Pauncefote Treaty. If the Senate Veto that demand, America would confess in the face of the whole world, she had no case and was perpetrating a naked act of injustice. This ministerial Journal adds "We refuse to credit the American Senate with a desire to do anything so contrary to international comity and so injurious to the good name of the United States."

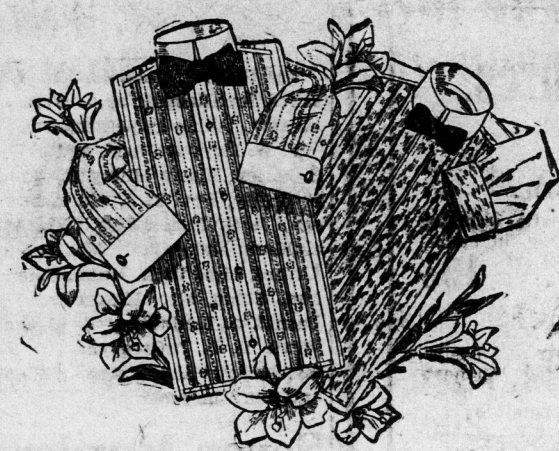

Hello Girls May Lose Their Job.

Latest London Invention is a Girl-less Telephone Exchange.
London, August 10.—In the basement of the General Post Office yesterday afternoon four men were busy examining the magic of an automatic telephone exchange.
The buzzing of little machines, the flashing of colored signals, and the tinkling of bells filled the small room and drowned the explanations of the officials at this opening ceremony of the first automatic exchange in London.
So simple, and yet so wonderful! On a round brass disc there are ten holes, through which the numbers 1 to 9 and 0 are shown.
You want a number. You poke a

finger through the hole of the number's first figure, and pull the disc as far round as it will go. This you do two, three or four times, according to whether your number runs to tens, hundreds or thousands.
Then you wait. Excited buzzing from the machines; a bell rings, and you are "through." That is all.
Sometimes the number is engaged. If it is, you hear no bell. You wait and try again. There is no telephone girl to blame now. You can only have it out with the machine.
The installation, which provides intercommunication for all the various departments of the Post Office, is on the same system as the automatic exchange at Epsom.

Moving Picture Greetings.

The Italian Government has thought out a novel treat for their soldiers in Tripoli, in order to relieve the long hours when they are not actually fighting.
Moving pictures showing the soldiers' wives and families have been specially taken, and an operator sent over to Tripoli to show these pictures. At the barracks of the Eleventh Bersaglieri, a famous Italian regiment in Naples, the families of all the men at the front, from the wife of the Colonel of the regiment down to the baby brothers and sisters of the youngest private, were assembled in a group.
They all slowly walked in front of the machine, blowing kisses and waving handkerchiefs. Each one can be distinguished clearly, and in the evenings the Italian soldiers will be able to see their loved ones again almost in the flesh.

Bank of Montreal Thieves, Captured.

Stole \$350,000 From The New Westminster Branch Nearly A Year Ago —Dramatic Arrest Of The Bandits In The Palmer House, at Toronto.

Toronto, Aug. 11.—The dramatic arrest of Walter Davis, alias Walsh, at the clerk's desk in the Palmer House yesterday, and the arrest a short time later of Alice Davis, alias Walsh, who claims to be the former's wife, has come as a climax to one of the most painstaking pieces of detective work carried out in Toronto for many years and has led the detectives to believe that they have one of the men who was implicated in a most daring robbery committed on the British Columbia coast. No less than \$2,020 in notes stolen from a branch of the Bank of Montreal in New Westminster, Sept. 15, 1911, when \$350,000 disappeared, were found in a grip belonging to Davis and, the officers allege, was obtained by changing groups of the stolen notes. Davis is maintaining a determined silence as to the manner in which he got the notes.

Setting The Trap

The arrest of Davis is primarily due to a plan conceived by Detective Tipton. About a month ago information reached the detective department that some of the stolen bills were in circulation in Toronto. Detective Tipton then thought it would be advisable to get a list of the numbers and the series of all the looted notes. He secured this from the Bank and numerous copies of the list made out. These he left with the proprietors of hotels, cigar stores and many other places at which money changed hands. The day after a copy of the list had been left a McKinney's Hotel a man bought a drink and gave one of the stolen bills in payment. Immediately after receiving the change he left the hotel and disappeared.

Trailing The Thieves.

On August 7 a woman made a small purchase at the cigar store of William Goldstein and company, 82 Young street, and tendered one of the missing bills. The detectives were telephoned to, but the woman had left before Detective Tipton got to the store. On Saturday afternoon a man bought a walking stick at the cigar store and gave one of the stolen bills in payment. He also asked that another of the notes be made into change for him. The suspicion of the employees in the store were immediately aroused and his description was given to the police. About 10 o'clock in the evening Detectives Cronan and Mitchell were in the waiting room of the Palmer House. A man who walked to the clerk's desk aroused their suspicions. After a moment's study they decided he fitted the description which had been given them as that of the man who had bought the walking stick at Goldstein's and they immediately arrested him and took him to Goldstein's. There a clerk positively identified him as the man who had earlier bought the walking stick and paid the bill.

GANG UNDER ARREST.

Detectives Tipton and Cronan went to the Palmer House. There they found that the woman who had been passing as the man's wife was still a guest. She was arrested in her room just as she was ready to leave for the train. All the grips and suitcases of both the man and woman were seized. In the grips the officers found \$2,020, in bills which tallied as to numbers and series letters with the list of stolen bills as supplied by the bank. Besides these there were notes of other banks to the amount of eight hundred dollars. The fact that these bills were done up in many separate bundles led the officers to believe that they represented many of the missing bills, which had been changed. Of money, other than bills corresponding to the missing ones, there was all told \$7,180.50. Some of the money was in gold.

Last night Constable Sparrow was called to King's Road where he arrested a seaman for indecency. The seaman was tried before Judge Coproy to-day and fined \$10 or 30 days.

Immortal Schooner Made Famous by R. L. Stevenson

Ship of Adventure in Which Noted Writer Sailed Over Sky Line of Romance, Never to Return.

San Francisco, Aug. 5.—Four lines of agate type, buried in the waterfront news of the day, carry the announcement that the schooner Casco, immortal as the ship of adventures in which twenty-four years ago Robert Louis Stevenson sailed over the sky line of romance, never to return, shortly will be remodelled "to enter the fishing business."

Stevenson sailed from San Francisco in 1888 seeking health. He left the world behind, but his hemorrhages of the lungs did not leave him and he died in Apia, Samoa, December 3, 1884. Cruising through Oceania on the Casco, he assembled the materials

for the grim little masterpiece, "The Ebb Tide," "For the Wrecker" and "In the South Seas."

Many of his best letters in the collected edition were written as he sat squat-legged on the Casco's sun-bleached decks. He delighted in telling how her trim lines and smart rig made her the wonder of the Polynesian year, how island beauties, scantily clad, slid over the red plush cushions of her white and gold cabins for sheer joy in the luxury of the sensations.

No more of that. The Casco will wallow into port with her waist full of rocking fish, and when she is too old for hard service, she will be sold to the wreckers and broken up for junk.

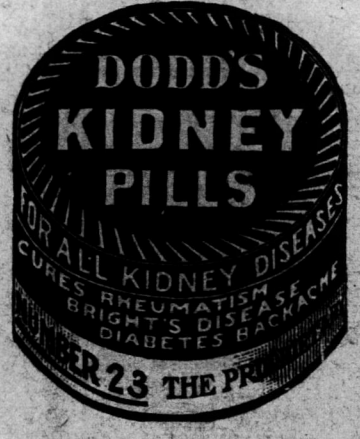

Naval Conference in Canada.

London, August 9.—The conference with the Canadian ministers on the naval question have practically concluded. It is probable that, by wish of the British Government, an invitation will be extended by Mr. Borden to Sir Wilfred Laurier to meet Mr. Winston Churchill, first lord of the Admiralty, in Canada at the end of September and discuss the matters involved. There is no doubt here that the existence of an emergency has been proved, and that Canada will make a contribution of an amount to be determined after Mr. Borden consults his colleagues, after which Mr. Churchill will go to Canada. A permanent naval policy will be decided upon, if possible, at a round table conference of all political parties in Canada. The British desire is to remove the scheme from the sphere of party politics, as has been done in Great Britain.

Mr. Churchill will arrive in Canada with Admiral Prince Louis of Battenberg and an imposing naval squadron.

Mr. Churchill and Mr. Hamar Greenwood, M. P., will make a tour of the principal cities of Canada and discuss imperial defence. The ministerial opposition here to Mr. Churchill's visit is due to an unwillingness to influence Canadian opinion; but the Unionist urge prompt action and Mr. Churchill is willing.

Prominent Government and Opposition members says Australia is becoming popular with British investors owing to its naval contribution. It is strongly felt that Canada must show practical loyalty, remain a part of the Empire and keep the confidence of Great Britain financially.

It is authoritatively stated that Mr. Borden has promised nothing definite in regard to the navy. As to the references to imperial co-partnership, the best minds here urge that all should go slow. It is only proposed now that there should be a Canadian minister in London for a part of the year for the exchange of confidential information on foreign policy. The union would be consultative. British Ministers see the danger of a rigid compact, hindering the Dominion's action in any Imperial Council.

Mr. Asquith declined Mr. Borden's invitation, and Mr. Churchill's visit is not with the object of stampeding Canada, but to return the compliment of the Canadian Cabinet.

NO PENNY POSTAGE.

The French Government holds that it cannot allow Great Britain to share in a penny postage scheme, and therefore such an arrangement with Canada cannot materialize.

Mr. Sempel, the British postmaster-general, and Mr. Pelletier discussed thoroughly the state cable question but with intangible results.

Charged With Poisoning Her Husband.

Philadelphia, Aug. 12.—Mrs. Frieda Trost, proprietress of an uptown saloon, who was arrested yesterday on a charge of having caused the death of her husband, William Trost, within a week after her marriage to him by administering poison, was committed to prison for her appearance to-morrow when an inquest will be started in the case. Edmond Guentle, bar-tender for Mrs. Trost, was also committed as a material witness in the case, which the police say will have sensational developments.

After the arrest of the woman, the police say they found a druggist from whom she purchased poison on Monday of last week, or shortly before her husband was taken ill. At the hearing to-day a Coroner's detective testified that in his investigation of the Trosts he learned that Mrs. Trost was a widow, and when she married a second time was deeply in debt. An autopsy performed by a Coroner's physician, the detectives said, showed that Trost's death was caused by poison.

The police said Trost had a bank account of \$4,000, and that his life was insured for \$2,000.

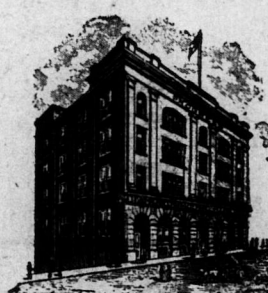
