



The International Congress on Tu-berculosis that met in Washington last winter discussed the financial last winter discussed the financial side of consumption as well as its medical aspect. Prof. Fisher, Professor of Political Economy at Yale, made the statement that tuberculosis cost the United States a billion dollars a year. He based his figures on the cost of doctors fees, medicines, nurses, etc., and added the loss of carnings during the patient's period of sickness. He went into the

question in great detail, and nobody disputed his figures.






