Dear Sir,-The prevalence and persistence of diphtheria in the City are due to the fact that there have been many cases of sore throat which, though apparently not serious enough to require medical attendance, have really been mild cases of diphtheria, and of course highly infectious. Such cases, when not properly treated and when no precautions are taken, are the means by which the disease is

The public are urged to call in doctor in every case of sore throatwhether in child or adult-however trifling the illness may seem. Every case of diphtheria can cured if treated in time, but in every
