





On the assumption that a lecision in the European conflict might be delayed for a year or more America's possible reinforcement of he man power at the disposal of the Entente would obviate not only every vestige of chance of a German victory, which, as Lloyd George said, is already out of the question, but also the likelihood of a condition which is feared in some quarters, and which, in the opinion of the best minds here, would condemn Europe, if not the whole world, to a long period of excessive armament in preparation for

The main feature of possible American assistance are outlined by Lord Sydenham in an article in The Evenng Standard, in which he says:

"Should a situation arise which in President Wilson's view would entail belligerency, the Allies would welcome the United States as a companwhich we can now count, would be strongly emphasized, and the naval assistance it could give would not be negligible, although it would not be decisive Its cruisers and light craft of all kinds, could be used to put down raiders, convoy freight ships, nd seek out submarines, and would be of great and real value in guarding the ingress and egress of transatlantic ports against piracy, which already has been perpetrated off the nerican coast. The interned Gernan ships might be set to carrier of supplies.

"Thousands of gallant Americans are already serving with the Allies, and if only a single division represented the American Army in France, it would serve as a symbol of the wholehearted co-operation of the unmilitary American people in a great cause. Whatever may happen, the United States will be called upon for o such sacrifices as the Allies are enduring. Their territory is safeguarded and the war will end before they could create large military forces capable of turning the scale. For America there could be no dark days, such as those through which we passed, when the ill-equipped armies of the Allies opposed the overpowering artillery which had been carefully created for the conquest of Europe. They must still bear the burden of the war to the end, but America out of her abundance could share with us in providing the sinews for less weal-

thy members of the alliance. "These are only speculations. Th situation in enemy countries is serious and must grow worse. Great military effort is required to prove to peoples to whom the truth is denied, that victory in the field is no longer possible, and that their further endurance lines on which the contest, if it is must be in vain. 
