Botulism Inquiry.

New York Fishing Gazette, June 8th.

Botulism, the disease which is be lieved to have caused several recent, deaths in London, is being investigated by scientists appointed by the Medical Research Committee, a body which is spending £50,000 a year in investigating new diseases and the treatment of war wounds. Neither money nor time is to be spared in the task of discovering its cause and cure. Help will be given by the Local Government Board and the London County Council Public Health Department. The latter is collecting material and food for investigation and asking medical men to report sus-

picious cases. With the customary caution of scientific investigators, Sir Walter Fletcher, Secretary of the Medical Research Committee, said yesterday: "We have no clear evidence yet that the disease is botulism or that it is caused by food."

A number of children in various parts of London have lately been stricken with a disease similar to polio-encephalitis, a brain disease which was epidemic in New York last year and is very similar to botulism. After investigating a large number of cases the New York doctors were not able to trace the disease definitely to food or give any very satisfactory explanation of its cause. Dr. F. E. Batten, physician to the Hospital for Sick Children, in an article in the Lancet, applies the name "epidemic stupor" to the children's disease. It is a new disease, Dr. Batten says, but that it is not essentially dependant upon eating ham, sausages, or tinned foods is proved by the fact that it has ccurred in breast-fed infants.—The







That men who have volunteered and have been rejected for military service on or before May 11th, 1918, and who have reported for service as required by the Act on forms prescribed, will not be called for medical reexamination before the 31st of October, 1918. 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

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
