



In view of the crisis it would have been possible to have arranged for a special train, but his Majesty preferred to share the experiences of so many of his subjects and travel by road. Starting on Friday Their Majesties took the short cut across the Grampians, over Spital, and Glenshee, through Perth, Sterling, Lanark and Carlisle and spent Friday night at Lowther Castle as guests of Lord and Lady Lonsdale. They travelled all, day yesterday via Allenby, Doncaster, Grantham, and Hatfield. Arriving at Buckingham Palace at five o'clock in the afternoon, a crowd at the gates cheered their safe arrival. The only attendants of their Majesties were Lord Stamfordham, the King's Private Sezretary, and Col. Cleve Wigram, Assistant Private Secretary and Equerry. Princess Mary remained at Balmoral. Princes Albert and Henry left Aberdeen yesterday, proceeding to London by ordinary passenger steamer. Premier Lloyd George will probably see the King to-day.
