

## STRIKE SETTLED.

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## BLOCKADE LIFTED.

ROME, Oct. 4.  
Orders that the blockade of Fiume be lifted, have been issued by the Government and the Italian authorities in the vicinity of Fiume have received an order to allow mail and foodstuffs to pass into the city, according to the Joca. Military blockade against soldiers and civilians entering the city is all that is now being enforced, according to newspapers, which say the decision was made after the Government had examined and discussed a protest from the Fiume National Council.

## THE KING'S MOTOR JOURNEY.

LONDON, Oct. 5.  
(Reuter's).—The strike has been marked by many picturesque features but none more remarkable in view of the traditions of royal progresses than their Majesties' motor journey of 547 miles to London from Balmoral. The King returned earlier than he had intended, being anxious to get in touch with his advisers. In view of the crisis it would have been possible to have arranged for a special train, but his Majesty preferred to share the experiences of so many of his subjects and travel by road. Starting on Friday their Majesties took the short cut across the Grampians, over Spital and Glenelg, through Perth, Sterling, Lanark and Carlisle and spent Friday night at Lowther Castle as guests of Lord and Lady Londonderry. They travelled all day yesterday via Altonby, Doncaster, Grantham, and Hatfield, arriving at Buckingham Palace at five o'clock in the afternoon, a crowd at the gates cheered their safe arrival. The only attendants of their Majesties were Lord Stamfordham, the King's Private Secretary, and Col. Cleve Wigram, Assistant Private Secretary and Equerry. Princess Mary remained at Balmoral. Prince Albert and Henry left Aberdeen yesterday, proceeding to London by ordinary passenger steamer. Premier Lloyd George will probably see the King to-day.

**London Reports Strike Settlement.**

**Italian Blockade of Fiume Raised-- And Now Its Luxemburg and Belgium--Outrages Result From Train-men Strike in U. K.**

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**It is understood that work will be resumed forthwith.**  
**NEGOTIATIONS BROKEN OFF.**  
BRUSSELS, Oct. 3. Economic negotiations between Luxemburg and Belgium have been broken off by Belgium as a result of referendum in Luxemburg under which France became Luxemburg's financial ally. The Belgium Ministry in Luxemburg has been recalled.

**CHICAGO AGAIN DEFEATED.**  
CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 4. Cincinnati now needs but two more games to bring the world's champion flag to the banks of the Ohio. Chief Moran's Red Legged National League defeated the White Sox in the fourth game of the series, two to none. Rain caused a postponement of Sunday's game.

**OUTRAGES REPORTED.**  
LONDON, Oct. 4. Dockmen of the West India Docks, comrades of the great war, opened the dock roads at Plymouth where the dockers struck yesterday. A meeting of railwaymen at Teignmouth last evening was broken up by ex-soldiers and sailors. A more unpleasant feature in the recurrence of outrages. An attempt was made to wreck a train near Fort William by removing the fish plates and slewing the line. A surface man who discovered the outrage was assaulted with bricks, but he escaped and reported the damage in time to save the train. Railway points in Hull were tampered with, the apparatus of a signal box at Newcross altered, and the trains in Cheshire and West Lothian were derailed, but all the damages were repaired, preventing disaster to the crowded trains. A number of strikers were fined sums ranging from forty shillings to five pounds each in London yesterday for creating disorder and assaulting workers. One striker was sentenced to three weeks in prison for aggravated assault.

**TERMS OF SETTLEMENT.**  
LONDON, Oct. 5. The strike of railwaymen which has been in progress upon the British railroads since midnight, Sept. 23, was settled to-day. Settlement followed a meeting between Prime Minister Lloyd George and members of the Executive Board of the National Union of Railwaymen, which was arranged at last night's conference between Bonar Law and the Conciliation Committee of the Trades Union. The official terms of the settlement are as follows:—First, work shall be

resumed immediately; second, negotiations shall be resumed on the understanding that they shall be completed before the end of the year; third, wages will be stabilized at the present level until Sept. 30, 1920. After August 1st, they may be resumed in the light of circumstances then existing; fourth, no adult railwayman in Great Britain shall receive less than 51 shillings per week with the cost of living is 110 per cent. above pre-war level; fifth, the railway union agrees that their men work harmoniously until the men who returned to work or who remained at work during the strike nor shall there be any victimization of strikers; sixth, arrears of wages will be paid on resumption of work.

**STEAMER IN TROUBLE.**  
BOSTON, MASS., Oct. 5. A call for immediate assistance was received from the steamer "Lake Gravel" at the Naval Radio Station here to-night. The message from the steamer, which is bound from Fowey, England, for Portugal, was in urgent need of coal, and because of the heavy weather was unable to reach a coaling port. Her position at 6.20 p.m. was latitude 44.05 north, longitude, 48.27 west.

**Noble Attempts Suicide to Escape Execution.**  
Saturday, October 6, 1919, was the day fixed for the execution of Count Louis Bathanyi, a member of one of the most ancient Hungarian families. During the present European War Hungary has been frequently mentioned in newspapers, the Emperor of Austria being also King of Hungary, an independent State, with an area of about 124,448 square miles, or rather larger than Great Britain and Ireland, though with a population numbering only 17,463,791 at the census of 1909, instead of over thirty-seven millions like the British Isles. In March, 1918, Bathanyi was summoned by the emperor—King Ferdinand—to form the first independent and responsible Ministry of Hungary. In compliance with this call to duty he laboured to prevent all ruptures between the sovereign and subjects, but although Hungary had also a parliament of its own, with Upper and Lower Houses, there was in it a revolutionary party, which threatened the country with a civil war. Bathanyi opposed this, and attempted once more a compromise between the king and the people. As he failed at this effort he was arrested on January 8, 1919, and after nine months imprisonment was tried by court-martial, declared guilty of high treason, and sentenced to die on the gallows on October 6, though he had never aimed at the complete separation of Hungary from Austria, and was decidedly opposed to the establishment of a Hungarian republic. He heard the sentence with tranquility and composure, and took leave of his wife. But he endeavoured during the night to open the veins of his neck by means of a blunt paper knife, and thus to escape the indignity of being hung. He attempted was discovered, and though he lost much blood, the surgeon succeeded in saving his life. Subsequently his sentence could not be carried out, and it therefore being changed to a soldier's death, he was shot. The news of his execution caused astonishment and horror throughout the civilized world.

**Price of Bacon Ordered Cut Down in Canada.**  
TORONTO, Sept. 29.—Definite action to reduce the price of bacon and other products of the hog, was taken to-day by the Board of Commerce at present sitting here, when an order was issued that from October 15th next, pork and hog products sold for consumption in Canada by the Canadian packing houses, and other producers, shall be sold at prices practically the same as those which prevailed on March 10 of this year.

The Board further orders that the price of such products shall be still further reduced if conditions warrant it, and an intimation is given that they will keep the industry under close surveillance to make further orders along this line, if found necessary.

Fine congregations were present at both Harvest Home services yesterday in Gower Street Church. The preacher in the morning was Rev. W. B. Bugden, and he delivered a splendid sermon from 1 Tim., 2:3-4m. "For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour, who will have all men to be saved, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth." In the evening the Pastor spoke on the laws of sowing and reaping from Gal. 6:7-9. "Be not deceived, God is not mocked, for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. He that soweth to the flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption, and he that soweth to the spirit shall of the spirit reap life everlasting. And let us not be weary in well-doing, for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." He said it was a good thing to remind ourselves, by bringing into the place of worship the products of farm and garden that God is the giver of the harvest, and of all good gifts. More reliable even than the laws of seed time and harvest is the law that governs the human world. He outlined the objectives of the spiritual part of the Methodist National Campaign, and pointed out that if spiritual harvests were to be gathered, there must be adequate preparation made and adequate causes provided by the putting forth of spiritual and moral effort. Literature on the campaign was circulated at the service. The platform and choir loft were beautifully decorated by the members of the choir, under the direction of the choir leader, Mr. Beresford. Sheaves of oats, flowers, ferns, fruits and vegetables were used in the decorations, which were very tasteful and effective. The music was bright and suited to the theme of the day. In the afternoon Rev. Gordon Dickie spoke to a good gathering in the men's Bible Class, and his address was greatly enjoyed. The Rally Day of the Church and Sunday School will be held next Sunday.

**Cochrane Street Centennial Church.**

The morning sun, with golden rays shining through the stained windows, became transformed, and with lovely rich colour filled the sanctuary. Reverent worship, devotional hymns and a sense of an all pervading Presence, led the worshippers to look up for a brief hour, seeking comfort and strength and peace. The God of Bethel again came down and visited His people, and as the old hymn was sung, many heads were lifted in prayer, confession, trust, and praise. The anthem was Whittier's beautiful hymn, "Immortal Love, for ever full," to a setting by Dr. Sanders of Ottawa. The preacher was Rev. D. B. Hemmison who took as his text, "There was a great calm." Peace, real peace, said the preacher, does not come from your environment, it is something within. As in this case, so it is always Christ in the heart makes peace. In spite of racial friction, international troubles and industrial strife there will be peace if Jesus Christ is allowed to take His place. Indeed, the cure for the unrest that is prevalent is the placing of Jesus in His position of pre-eminence. The imperialism of the day will not change matters, but rather make them worse; and the Church, instead of raising Christ's banner and following in His footsteps, leading the people to higher ideals and nobler purpose, has been content to follow in the wake of the material powers. But while many people, forming the visible Church, have loosened the hold of the higher things, the principles of the Kingdom will remain and the victory is to those who are faithful to these principles. Peace to the earth will come and can only come through Jesus Christ.

At the evening service the Rev. Dr. Alfred Hall was the preacher, and for his text he took the words of Elijah to his servant on Carmel. "Go up now, look towards the sea." Dr. Hall spoke in the interest of the Royal Naval and Marine Institutes of which he is the Chaplain. Many things call us to "look towards the sea." God's boundless mercy and long-suffering kindness are illustrated in the great oceans; Jesus Christ walked on the sea and stilled the tempest; History, in the Armada, Nelson's deeds and the great war, invites us to "look towards the sea;" and duly calls us to seek the good of those, who do so much for us along the paths of the great waters. Before the service closed the flags of the allied nations were brought in procession to the communion table and there presented, while a prayer of thanksgiving was offered by Dr. Hall. The service was very impressive and will long live in the memories of the congregation who witnessed it. The hymns were heartily sung and the choir sang as an anthem, Sir Arthur Sullivan's arrangement of "The strain sprang."



Soak dry yeast at least one hour before using it! Lemon pie filling should be cooked in a double boiler.

**Destructive Fire at Welbeck Abbey.**

A serious fire occurred early on the morning of October 6, 1900, at Welbeck Abbey, the Nottinghamshire seat of the Duke of Portland who, with the Duchess, was at the time in Scotland. At about half-past two a watchman on the estate saw smoke and flames at the top of the west, or what is known as the "Oxford Wing." An alarm was at once raised, and in a few minutes there was a scene of great excitement. The estate fire brigade at once got to work and they were subsequently joined by the brigades sent from Sheffield and Worksop. The three children of the Duke were for a time in the utmost peril, the fire having broken out in a room adjoining their sleeping apartments. Mr. Clacey, the groom of chambers, at a good deal of personal risk, entered their rooms, and carried them into the private chapel, where they were dressed, and later in the morning sent to the London residence of the Duke. **Coaker's Object.**

Coaker is out to win the Government of this Dominion, and with that one purpose in view, he has allied himself with R. A. Squires, another equally determined office seeker, who has also a similar object to that of Coaker. These men will stick at nothing to attain their ends, and should they succeed in seducing the electorate, they will prostitute the power of government and subordinate all its principles to their own emergencies. Their past records prove this, and their characters have been so faithfully delineated, one by the other, that their present political union is but a makeshift to suit exigencies, and their personal opinions are unchanged.

Coaker's object is the assumption of power and the creation of a dictatorship in Newfoundland. The ambition of Squires is also for power and the other things that power brings and compels. Coaker wants to reign supreme; Squires holds the same desire. Both cannot assume the office of dictator, and it is obvious that one must yield to the other. Will the one to surrender be Mr. Coaker? His past actions say No. Will it be Mr. Squires? Not if it is correct that he said when a boy, "that it was his one ambition to get ahead." So here there are two rivals. Both ambitious and both animated by the most violent jealousy toward the other. Should they be elected, strife will be brought about at once, for Coaker will not submit to Squires, neither will Squires give way to Coaker. A split must then inevitably result. Neither of the twin leaders possess the confidence of either their following or of the people, and it will be in the best interests of Newfoundland that both of them be relegated to the oblivion to which they rightly belong.

Coaker's object is to control the Civil Service, subordinating all the offices to the wishes and desires of the F.P.U. Witness his attempt to elect Road Boards of which every member was to be a Union man. Witness also his endeavours to have the mail couriers subservient to the dictates of the F.P.U. Consider his arranged dismissal of the Lighthouse and Fog Alarm Keepers of Cape Bonavista in 1917, and the appointment of F.P.U. men in their stead.

Do Newfoundlanders want their destinies to be controlled by W. F. Coaker and "that black rascal" (vide Coaker) Squires? What opinion can voters have of these men who have blackguarded each other in season and out of season? How can confidence be generated in the bolshevist leaders of that party which has appropriated a name to which it has no right? A name which is being used to beguile electors into voting for one of the most destructionist parties that ever appealed for popular support. Coaker and Squires spell stagnation and ruin. Their election

to power will mean that Newfoundland will lose her native independence and become the bond-slave of the big Corporation of Canada which at present control our coal supply.

Will voters then take chances on electing the retrogressive, destructionist party led by Coaker and Squires, or will they give a renewal of political life to the Liberal Progressive Party led by Sir M. P. Cashin? With Cashin at the head of affairs there will be prosperity and progress. With Coaker and Squires there is bound to be stagnation and poverty, and the riveting of the shackles of serfdom upon the people. Who wants a departure from the present state of happiness and success? If there is one who desires a return to the ancient condition of things let him vote for the Dictatorship of Coaker and the autocracy of Squires. But Newfoundlanders are not going to be turned aside from the right track and on November 3rd, they will mark their ballots for Liberal Progressive candidates and by so doing will inaugurate a new era in the history of their country which will bring added success to their industries and labors.

**Does Coaker Want Another Bank Crash.**

The memories of the "Crash" are still fresh in the minds of most people; it would be hard to efface the tragedies and hardships of that awful time. Although it took place twenty-five years ago, people still shudder when they speak of the misery and destitution which prevailed when the whole economic fabric of the country came toppling about their ears and caused sorrow and desolation throughout the land. We have emerged from those conditions, gradually it is true, but none the less surely, and the country has steadily built up its credit, while, under wise and prudent administration, an era of peace, happiness and content has been brought about, the evidences of which are to be seen on every hand.

All classes of our people are living better, dressing better, and getting more out of life at the present time than they did twenty years ago, or even ten years ago. The standard of home life amongst the fishermen has been raised on to a higher plane. They are more independent, comfortable and prosperous than they have been for two decades. All this has been brought about through careful administration of public affairs and prudent conservation of the general interests of the country under the guidance of sane and level-headed men. But what has been so carefully built up during the past twenty years can be torn down and destroyed within four short years, should the affairs of the Colony be turned over to the control of a man like Coaker, who wakes up every morning with a fresh wild-cat scheme which he wishes to impose upon the people.

Once with the reins of power within his grasp and the government of the country at his disposal, who can say what Coaker may do, or to what straits he may reduce the people. If his idea of guaranteeing fish prices were put into practice, and a loss should be met on the sale of the fish in the foreign market, nothing but ruin and bankruptcy of the country would follow; and not alone would the mechanics, labourers, clerks, factory workers and professional men suffer, but the very fishermen whom Coaker pretends he desires to benefit, would be engulfed in the whirlpool and sucked down to disaster and destitution.

If Coaker were to be elected to power with a majority of his followers, Squires would be a puppet in his hands. Coaker wrecked the Bond administra-

tion, and tried to betray the National Government. What hope would Squires have of being able to control Coaker's crazy desires, when Sir Robert Bond was unable to do so? NONE. ABSOLUTELY none. The day that Coaker becomes this Colony's dictator will witness the commencement of a policy which will only end in ruin and bankruptcy. Such schemes as the fixing of fish prices would lead to inevitable chaos and confusion, and in the end bring about such another Crash as that which blasted the fortunes of our people in 1894. Our people are now rejoicing in the sunshine of prosperity under the Cashin Government, and do not desire to be exposed to the storm of adversity and hard times which Coaker's revolutionary schemes would bring about. That is the reason why all intelligent voters have long ago made up their minds to vote for the Government candidates and consign the Squires-Coaker bolshevists to the limbo of forgotten things.





**Grave Suspicions Aroused.**

**Reports Current That Canadian Corporations are in League With Certain Political Elements in Newfoundland --- Industrial Development Threatened.**

Special to the Evening Telegram  
PORT AUX BASQUES, To-day.  
Passengers arriving by steamers from Sydney state that there are reports current on that side to the effect that the big Steel and Coal corporations are behind certain political elements in Newfoundland, and are supplying them with unlimited funds for the conduct of the coming election campaign. It is further stated that the agreement between the parties is that all development of Newfoundland's natural resources is to be stopped. This would apply particularly to the St. George's Coal Fields Ltd., in which company there are many local shareholders. Because of the persistence

with which these reports are being circulated, there is a strong suspicion created here that this is an attempt to strangle the possibilities of coal production in the interests of these big corporations. Such being the case, and daily it is being spoken of, the shareholders in St. George's Coal Fields should exercise due caution in casting their votes. A vote against Liberal Progressive candidates means a vote for the big interests in Canada, and the placing of a period to all chance of getting any adequate returns from money invested in local coal. Should any other reports of this nature be heard, your correspondent will keep you advised. Even as it is, electors must be on their guard.

**Rev. Dr. Hall at Kirk.**

The Rev. Alfred Hall, D.D., Senior Chaplain of Naval Institutes for Canada, was at St. Andrew's Church on Sunday morning, and was heartily welcomed by his friends, who also had the privilege of hearing him when he preached in the Kirk on the occasion of his visit eight years ago. As Dr. Hall has a great interest in the children and has already spoken in a good many of the city schools, it was very fitting that his introductory talk should be to the children, of whom a large number were present. He spoke to them of the jewels of wisdom and character, illustrating his points from his experiences in South Africa. Dr. Hall's sermon was on the text, "Thy way, O Lord, is on the waters," and he showed how much we owe to the sea. It is the connecting link of our Maritime Empire. We are no longer oppressed by the mystery of the sea, but regard it as a medium of transportation, one of the great foundations of our modern civilization. Dr. Hall also emphasized our dependence upon the men of the sea. In the language of Lord Fisher, "The British Navy bears the British Army on its back." We owe our very life to the same Navy to-day, for it is generally understood that the Battle of Jutland was the turning point of the war, and the decisive part in that battle was naturally the British Fleet. Surely the men of the sea are worthy of our best sympathy. And our strong determination should be that they or those depending on them should never want if we can prevent it. At the close of the service there was a procession of boys bearing the flags of the Allied nations, standing in line before the pulpit, while Dr. Hall offered a prayer of Thanksgiving for the protection afforded by the Allied fleets during the period of war. The service closed with the National Anthem and Benediction.




