Juvenile Delinquency in Canada

Toronto, Aug. 14.—Juvenile delinquency shows a marked increase in Canada, according to a bulletin of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, with the greatest increases in Toronto among the cities, and in Ontario among the provinces. This is not creditable to our social conditions, or to the influence of the home, and should receive our most thoughtful consideration. What is the matter with our boys and girls? Judge Dysart of the King's Bench, Manitoba, is quoted in the Bulletin as saying, "It is not society but the homes that are at fault, and I am convinced that there is no need of the radical reformation suggested in our punitive system. Quite true the home may be so infected by general conditions of society as to be demoralized and slack, but for this condition the parents, I submit, are surely responsible and primarily to blame."

On the other hand the Vancouver Province recently had an editorial in which a much brighter view was taken: "No one who carefully observes Canadian youth of to-day ought to be pessimistic about the new generation that is growing into manhood and womanhood. The appeal of outdoor active life was never as strong as it is this summer. As for the girls, their health and vigor is so far superior to those of the past generation that they are beyond comparison. The Boy Scout goes to camp. So does the Girl Guide. Both learn to swim. Both have their life-saving medals. Youngsters hike and learn the good lesson of self-reliance that life in the open teaches. Summer camps are entitled to a great deal of credit for this strengthening of young Canada."

PROHIBITION HAS ONLY PRODUCED POISONOUS DRINKS THEY ASSERT.

That the good results promised by prohibitionists to the people of the United States have not matured, and that prohibition, far from achieving anything for the good of the people, had become an actual evil, was the opinion of the committee of eight delegates appointed at the 33rd biennial convention of the Hotel and Restaurant Employees' International Alliance and Bartenders' International League of America at the Mount Royal hotel to bring in a report on the annual report of the general secretary-treasurer.

"Prohibition in the United States is more honored in the breach than the observance," reads the report. "The spirit of anarchy has taken hold of our younger folks to such extent that spirituous liquors—which in pre-Prohibition days were taboo—are now the cardinal diversion among minors of both sexes."

The report deprecates the fact that the illicit sale of the liquor in the United States has put on the market poisonous and impure drinks. "Drinks," it continues, "has not decreased, as everyone knows. Thousands upon thousands of crimes are on our record which can be traced to the diversion of habits of our people from wholesome beer and wine, to these poisonous drinks now being consumed."

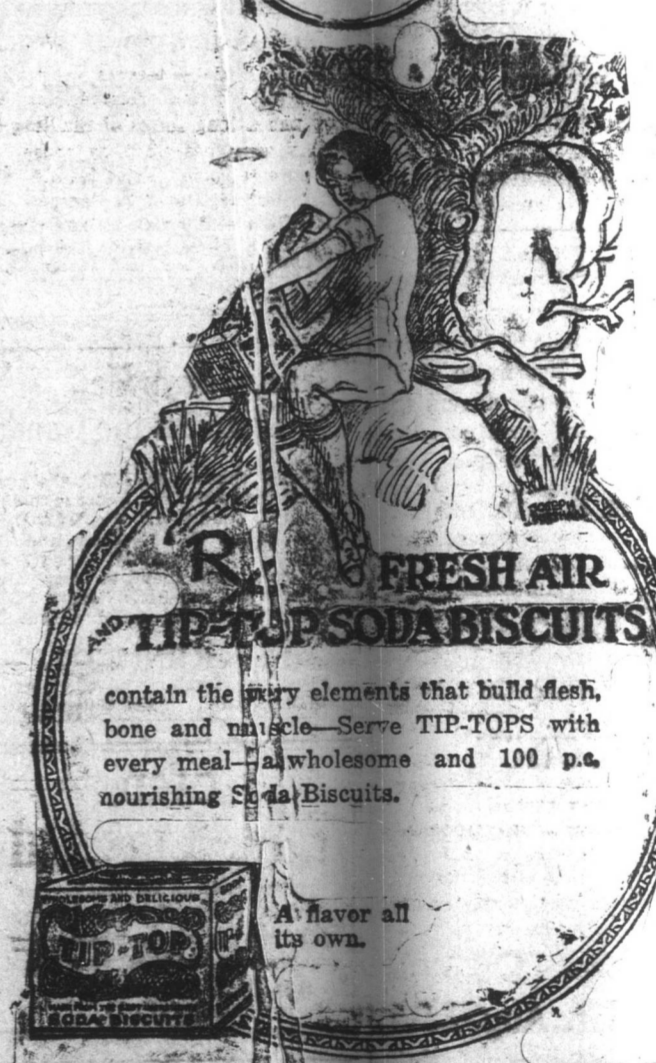

Rosalind Collides With Oil Tanker Harvester

Off Point Judith—Passengers and Crew Safe—Troops Withdraw From Cape Breton—New Brunswick Memorial to Bonar Law.

ROSLIND IN COLLISION.
NEW YORK, Aug. 23.
The Red Cross liner Rosalind, bound for St. John's via Halifax, was tonight being back to port after collision with the oil tanker Harvester, two miles off Point Judith, Rhode Island. The vessel was able to put back under their own steam, the Harvester calling for assistance and the Rosalind with bows stove in.

PASSENGERS PRAISE CAPTAIN JAMES OFFICERS AND CREW.
NEW YORK, Aug. 23.
With her bow crushed and buckled, the steamship Rosalind, of the Red Cross Line, which was in collision last night with the Texas oil tanker Harvester, off Point Judith, returned to port today with 116 passengers. The Harvester, which was badly damaged on her side, where the Rosalind's bow struck, put into Stapleton, Staten Island, after the accident. The Rosalind was bound from New York to St. John's, Nfld., via Halifax, N.S., and the Harvester had just left Providence, R.I., for Port Arthur, Texas, when the accident occurred. Two sailors' bodies in the forecastle of the Rosalind were smashed to splinters when the ships came together. The sailors and Bremen, asleep at the time, were hurled to the floor by the violence of the impact. Most of the passengers were on deck. It was a clear night and the stars were shining. The passengers could see the Harvester coming out from Providence towards their ship. The vessels approached, but they did not dream there would be a crash until there were three sharp blasts from the Rosalind's whistle and the engines went full speed astern. Five minutes later the Rosalind's bow struck the Harvester on the starboard quarter, throwing most of the passengers off their feet and causing those who had retired early to rush to deck. There was little excitement. The officers were among the passengers and assured them that there was no danger, and that the hole in the bow was fully three feet above the water line. To-night the Rosalind's passengers, who were preparing to go to Halifax by train, spoke highly of Captain William James, his officers and crew. Captain James, while reluctant to discuss the accident before consulting the owners, Morning Star, said the Rosalind was steaming 32 knots when she sighted the Harvester; the Harvester tried to cross the bows of the Red Cross boat, he said, and when he saw there was going to be a collision, he threw the engine into reverse and blew three blasts. The Harvester did not reply, he said. When a crash came the Rosalind was making three knots, he estimated. 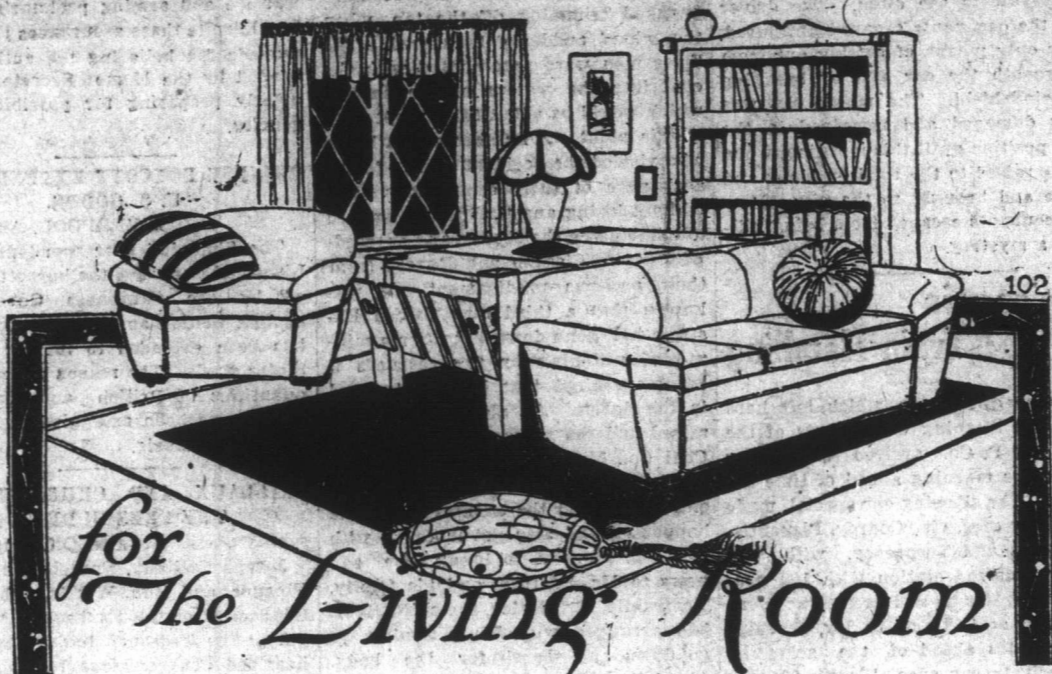

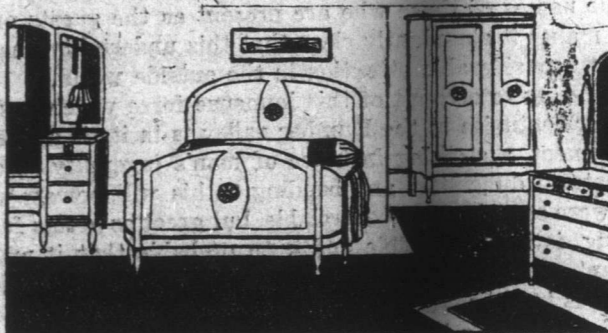

Governor Opens Humber Plant

Operations Officially Begun at Corner Brook --- 700 Guests Attend Ceremonies.

In glorious weather and in the presence of a large gathering of the invited guests, the official opening of the Corner Brook Paper Mills, took place this morning. Sir Glynn West, Lieutenant Governor, presided at the ceremony. His Excellency, Lady Allard, accompanied by the other members of the family, and the other guests, for their presence, and expressed the gratification of the company in having established an industry worthy of the country. As in the case of the opening of the Humber Paper Mills, the Governor expressed a belief in the huge paper industry at Corner Brook, setting in motion a paper conveyor on which appeared a suitably decorated roll of paper followed by standard rolls of paper, representing the great 400 ton paper mill in which construction work was first started in May, 1923.

The big shed in which the opening ceremony took place was filled with guests, over 600 of whom were the representatives of the Newfoundland Power & Paper Company, and included many distinguished visitors from abroad. Prominent amongst the guests were the members of the British Empire Parliamentary delegation, Premier Roby and the Honourable Mr. George P. Brown, M.P., and the Honourable Mr. John G. Brown, M.P., and other representatives of the Newfoundland Legislature, the various manufacturing companies, and other persons connected with the mill. In dedicating the Mills open, his Excellency referred to the happy coincidence of having present the Parliamentary delegation from Great Britain which was a joint partner with Newfoundland in helping finance such great enterprises. He also referred to many events in history and mentioned whether any of greater importance or of greater possibilities had taken place.

Following the opening ceremonies a visit was paid by the guests to the station and mills, his Excellency being accompanied by Sir Glynn West, John Stabler, the General Manager of the N.P.P., and other officials. All were greatly interested in the intricate mechanism of the plant, which is one of the largest in the world and when working at its maximum capacity will produce 400 tons of newspaper per day.

The luncheon to-day, held in one of the great wharf sheds, an interesting event was the presentation by Sir Glynn West of a specially engraved silver tea service to Mr. Christopher, the pleasure of Corner Brook. The presentation was made following a prayer given by the Rev. Fr. J. J. Walsh, S.J., who presided over a consulatory address to the various sub-contractors, whose efficiency and interest in their work helped so much towards the early completion of the Mills. Addresses were also made by Mr. Alexander, who has been the local manager of the Armstrong, Whitworth Company since construction work began, and by John Stabler, the General Manager of the N.P.P., whose experience in the papermaking industry is an assurance of the ultimate prosperity of the Humber development.

Lady Allard opens Hospital. Early this afternoon Lady Allard opened the Company's hospital, which is a splendidly equipped building, fitted with every necessary convenience. Following Lady Allard's address, Miss Keegan, the Superintendent of the Hospital, spoke afterwards, and afterwards addressed the guests by two distinguished medical visitors, Sir Henry Grey, the well known surgeon, and Dr. Haden Guest, who is one of the Labour members of the Parliamentary delegation.

700 Guests Will Attend Dinner. At the dinner to be held in one of the mill sheds to-night, covers will be laid for more than 700 guests. Sir Glynn West will preside, and the following Toast List will be proceeded with:

Money for Jam

Every Country Has Its Own Paying Profession: Food and Tobacco Are the "Best Sellers."

According to an income-tax return filed in Italy the best paying profession in that country is that of the Italian surgeon's average income is, however, only £1,200 a year.

Even the Italian income-tax people prefer their singers and their film stars. One Italian film actress, Signora Menichelli, is stated to earn £10,000 a year.

Probably the best paying profession in America is that of picture-makers. In this connection it is worth mentioning that an ex-cabinet member of the United States, Mr. H. Hays, resigned his office two years ago to accept the post of director of the motion picture industry of America, at a salary of \$100,000 a year.

It is also of interest that the son of a notable oyster fisherman, who has moved to California some thirty-five years ago with only a few shillings, returned to England last year a millionaire in pounds, not dollars—all fortune being made from cinema.

Bull-fighting to Fortune. The biggest fortunes in the States are made from oil and motor-cars. These industries respectively, produced the two richest men in the world—John Rockefeller and Henry Ford.

Apart from commerce the best paying profession in the United States is that of the lawyer. There are said to be in the States who are making \$50,000 a year or more. Second, come architects, who hold a much higher position in America than in any other country. Forty thousand pounds a year is no out-of-the-way income for first-class architect in a few American cities.

In Britain the great surgeon does much better from a financial point of view than the architect. But doctors, engineers and journalists all receive their pay in the United States than in any other country.

Spain, once the richest country in Europe, is now one of the poorest. It has still one road to riches—the bull-ring. Two famous bull-fighters, Bombita and Machaquito, retired recently. The former had accumulated a fortune of three and a half million pesetas—£130,000—and the latter rather more. Bombita had been the bull-ring for twenty years, and the course of that time has been crowded more than thirty times. So he probably earned all he got.

The Briton's Surest Cards. Machaquito's meteoric career ended

with his romantic marriage to Miss Angela Clementson, the daughter of a wealthy American to whom he had been devoted for years.

In England it would seem that the two surest roads to wealth are by way of food or tobacco. Mr. Francis Blackwell, of Cross & Blackwell, left nearly a million; and Mr. Les. of Les & Perrins, over a million. Sir Thomas Lipton affords another example of the money that can be made out of supplying food for the million.

The record in this respect is, however, held by Mr. Charles William Fogel, who, in the short space of twenty-one years, made the enormous sum of \$4,249,123 out of his breakfast foods. Another American, the late Henry Josephs Hertz, made over \$1,100,000 out of pickles.

The Wills family, of Bristol, have made enormous fortunes out of tobacco, and beer, too, has produced, and still produces, millionaires.

Cathedral Put to Many Uses.

BUILT IN EARLY DAYS IS STILL MILES FROM RAILWAY.

London, Aug. 14.—To a widely desolate spot on the Essex coast, ten miles from the nearest railway station, where the calling of the seabirds, the bleating of sheep, and the coursing of the winds are the only sounds to be heard, there a few days ago a pilgrimage, headed by the Bishop of Chelmsford.

Motor cars, charabancs, and traps were parked in the fields and the pilgrims trod the Roman road to a barn-like building standing on a grassy mound within 300 yards of the North Sea. The clergy paused at a thatched shed, opened their suit cases, and put on the robes of the church of England.

Then they passed through a nail-studded door into the barn-like building, and there—for this primitive place was the first Essex cathedral—offered up praise remembering with gratitude the builder, Bishop Cedd, who left his cell at Lindisfarne Priory, off the rock-bound Northumbrian coast, to bring Christianity to the heathen East Saxons.

Long before St. Cedd came to Essex this wild district of Bradwell-on-Sea was important Roman station.

St. Cedd reached to the East Saxons and made converts, over whom he came to minister as bishop. In 663 he built his monastery and cathedral church, and declared Lancaster—the Bradwell-on-Sea of to-day—his cathedral city.

To-day all that remains visible of this cathedral city is the cathedral church of Bishop Cedd.

The "cathedral" is known to antiquaries as St. Peter's chapel. It has been restored within recent years, is under the care of the Chapter of Chelmsford, and was re-dedicated just five summers ago.

For years it had been used as a barn; during the Great War it was a billet, and the old stone bear marks of fires lighted by the soldiers who were in possession.

Once the "Cathedral" had a bellry, and during the days of Elizabeth and the Stuarts it served as a lighthouse.

To-day there is only one cottage within two miles. This houses the woman verger and her husband, and is hard by the "Cathedral" itself.

Ask Tax Exempt List be Cut in Interest of City

A complete revision of the tax lists at the city hall is asked for by the Montreal Trades and Labor Council, whose secretary, Gustave Franco, forwarded the following resolution to the executive committee recently.

"Whereas the revenue of the city of Montreal is much too small, compared with the number of improvements which are urgently needed:

"Whereas the number of institutions of all kinds that enjoy exemption from municipal taxation is constantly growing:

"That it be and is hereby resolved: That the Montreal Trades and Labor Council request the City of Montreal to carefully go through the list of these institutions now on the exempted list with a view of striking from it all those whom it seems to them just and reasonable to tax in the common interest of the taxpayers and the needs of the city.—Montreal Herald.

New Wave Length FOR C.N.R. STATION.

By changing the wave length of radio station CNRA at Moncton, N.B., from 313 metres to 291 metres, the range has been extended and the broadcasting usefulness increased. The change of wave length has been approved by the Radio Branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, the body in control of wireless in Canada, and all broadcasts emanating from Moncton during the week have been at 291 metres. As a result of this change the seaboard stations of the Canadian National Railways on the Atlantic and the Pacific operate on similar wave lengths.

The change has been asked for because when broadcasting at 313 metres CNRA was interfering with and, in turn, being interfered with by some of the powerful stations in the eastern states and along the Atlantic Coast.

Stole Ride on an Airplane

JACK RICHMAN'S ACT NEARLY PROVED DISASTROUS TO THE SHIP.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 15.—Ignoring the blind baggage of a passenger train, Jack Richman, finding himself up against it for transportation at Las Vegas, Nevada, recently grabbed the wing of an airplane and beat the best railroad time into Los Angeles.

The plane Jack "flipped" as it was taking off was piloted by Major C. C. Moseley, head of the California National Guard Air Force, and the weight of the man hanging on the outer edge of the wing nearly sent the ship into a disastrous side slip.

Then it was noticed that he had not forgotten to tie his bedding roll securely to a strut. Jack told newspapermen he was 17 years old and had left his home in Milwaukee July 7 to head his way to the coast. He added that the newspapers was his first ride in an airplane.

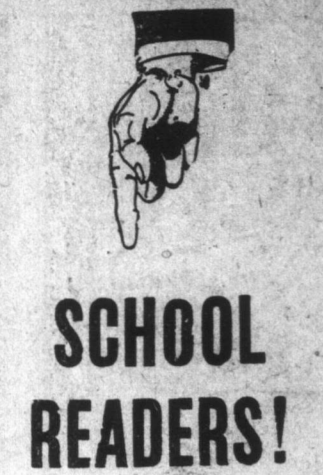

Codroy River, North and South Branches—3 rods, 43 salmon, 3 to 15 lbs. each.
Crabbe's River—Water low, rainstorm to-night; except big run of salmon next week.
Highland's River—1 rod, 3 salmon, 4 and 6 lbs. each.
Middle Barachois River—No fishermen this week; visited breeding pools 10 miles up the river; no one working this year; water very low.
Robinson's River—No fishing during the week.
Fische's River—No fishermen on the river; everything O.K.
Flag Bay Brook—4 rods, 20 salmon, 4 to 9 lbs. each.
Barachois Brook—Lots of salmon up river; no one fishing.
Harry's River (upper)—1 rod, 3 salmon, 4 to 15 lbs. each; water low; fish plentiful.
Fox Island River—River in good condition; plenty salmon; no fishermen.
Humber River—One party at Big Falls took 333 salmon during season. The guide reports seeing the tracks of a moose, one star caribou and one bear and a good sign of foxes at Big Falls and signs of beaver in Harriman's Steady.
East River, Bonne Bay—1 rod, 1 salmon, 8 lbs.
Western Brook—Plenty salmon and trout; no one troubling the river.
River of Ponds—1 rod, 12 salmon, 4 to 8 lbs.
East and Torrent Rivers, Hawke's Bay—4 rods, 12 salmon, averaging 9 lbs., heaviest 13 lbs.
Genevieve and St. Barbe Rivers—Salmon not as plentiful at mouth, but very plentiful up the streams; young birds plentiful.
Hare Bay Rivers—Salmon very plentiful on rivers this year.
Canada Bay Rivers—Game birds and fish plentiful about rivers.
Sop's Arm River, White Bay—Salmon waiting to enter when water rises; no caribou have been reported; rabbits plentiful.
Harry's, Middle and Southern Arm Brooks—Nothing new to report.
Indian Brook, Hall's Bay—No sportsmen this week; warden caught 3 salmon, 4, 5, and 7 lbs. each; lot of sea trout caught, some as heavy as 3 1/2 lbs. Quite a lot of salmon in pools; quite a number of snipe and ducks around.
South and West Brooks, Hall's Bay—Brooks a bit higher than last week; salmon scarce at mouths of brooks, but good signs in pools further up; good sign of sea trout; no fishermen; brooks all clear; rabbits, gulls, shags, black ducks plentiful; no report of moose this week.
Northern Arm Brook, Botwood—Salmon all gone in; no rods reported.

N. W. River, Trepassay—Salmon fairly plentiful; water low.
Salmonger River—Number of salmon in pools at mouth of river; plenty of water; 3 rods, at Piment's Falls report 4 salmon, 5 to 6 lbs. each; 2 rods at Murphy's Falls, 3 salmon, 6 lbs. each.
North Hr. and Colinet Rivers—Few salmon in North Hr.; trout scarce; water low; some salmon in Colinet River; no rods reported.

Come by Clinche River (lower)—No salmon taken, but numbers of trout, although none very heavy.
Sandy Hr. River—Salmon plentiful this week at mouth, also plenty in pools 3 miles up; no catches reported.
Cape Bodge and Bensch Rivers—Rivers still in good condition; plenty salmon in pools all the week.
Salmon Brook, Burin—Salmon still working up the river very fast but lots to go up yet; no rods reported.
Little St. Lawrence Streams—5 rods, 12 salmon, 5 to 10 lbs. each.
Garash River—Still good signs of salmon; river in good condition; no rods reported.
Cinq Cerf River—Very few salmon outside now and not many to be seen in river; no one fishing this season.
Burnt Islands Brook—Large catches of trout, averaging nearly 3 lbs. each.
Ile aux Morts Brook—1 rod, 28 trout, averaging 1 lb. each.
Grand Bay Brook—Quite a lot of salmon to be seen in the lower pools; river in good condition and salmon going up; no rods reported; everything alright.

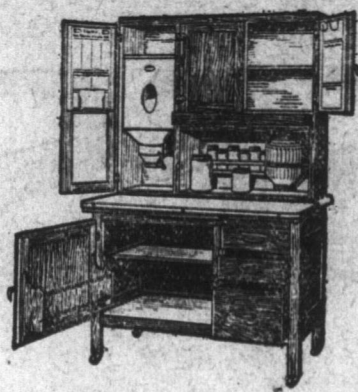

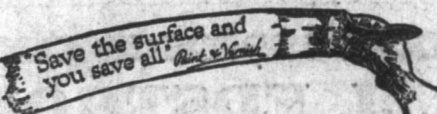

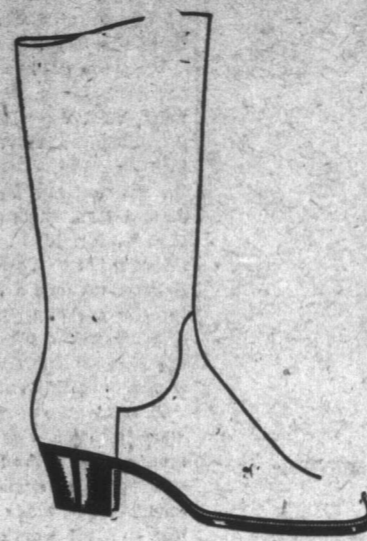
