The report of Knox's College Board was read. Number of students in attendance in the Theological department, 20. In addition to the regular staff of professors, the Rev. Bobert Ure, of Goderich, and Rev. J. J. A. Proudfoot, of London, have taught the classes in Apolegetics and Homiletics respectively, and the Board recommended that these lectureships be continued. Large and valuable additions have been made to the library. The Board notice with gratitude that during the year Mr. G. T. Beadmore has established two bursaries of \$50 cach, and has signalized his intention to contribute a similar sum for the next five years. J. G. Idie, Esq., contributed \$560 for founding a scholarship in connection with the College. W. Ross, Esq., of Stirling, Scotland, has remitted \$40, and W. Hall Esq., \$50, to be continued for four years, as bursaries. The amount received from congregations during the year for the ordinary college fund is \$5, 753.80; expenditure, \$5,383.32; leaving a balance due of \$629.92. There is also a further sum due to Professors of \$931. 65, making the total amount due \$1,461. 17. The sum due at the close of the year was \$1,129.46, so that the debt on this fund has been increased by \$431,71. Three Presbyteries formerly contributing to Knox College have been attrached to the Theological Seminary of Montral. \$4,060 were received from William C. McLeod, Esq., of Woodstock, towards the endowment of a Chair in Knox College.


