In order, if possible, to bring about a more healthy state of things, the cash system is to be adopted in future in the payment of butter, and an inspector is to be appointed at each of the principal shipping points, who will inspect all butter brought to market, grade it according to its quality, have it weighed, and the seller will then proceed with his or her ticket to sell it, either for cash, for there will be no lack of cash buyers for a reliable article, or "to trade it out" in the old way, as found convenient. 


