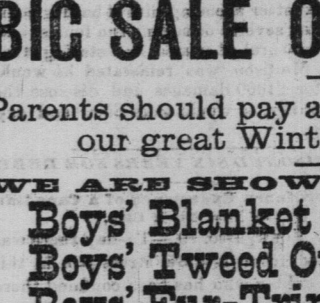

THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION FOR THE SUPPRESSION OF THE SWEAT SYSTEM.

The Principles of Proprietary Right in Membership Confirmed—President McKnight says he will still fight.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec. 19.—The common pleas court was thronged to-day with a crowd of baseball managers, players and others anxious to hear the argument upon the motion to continue the injunction restraining the expansion of the Metropolitan club from the American association.

Both sides were fortified with bundles of affidavits. On the behalf of the plaintiff were submitted first, Erastus Wiman, who was the president of the Metropolitan association, that he had made arrangements to establish a baseball ground on Staten Island, and that in October at a meeting held in New York city, the American association approved his plan and agreed to play on these grounds.

Secretary Williams of the Metropolitan club explained the general features of the association, its constitution, that the receipts of all games went to the home club, less expenses and \$65 to the players of the visiting team. He further stated that the association was a continuing one, and that no complaint had ever been made to him or any other representative of the Metropolitan club of any misconduct by it.

Manager Gifford's affidavit explained the loss that would result to the Metropolitan club from expansion, and averred that the attempted expansion was the result of a desire on the part of several clubs to get the players composing the Metropolitan club.

Counsel for the defendants read a number of affidavits, beginning with that of Charles E. Der Abo, averring that the agreements were only binding for a year, and that a practically new association was formed each year, and a new agreement was usually with one or two new clubs, while the old clubs were often dropped, notwithstanding their protest.
