

The Flour Trade.

We have received opies of two petitions to Parliament on the above subject, which we learn are being numerously signed by millers, produce dealers, and others throughout the Province. One of the petitions asks for the continuance of the present policy, under which millers are allowed to import wheat from the United States in bond, to be manufactured into flour, all the flour produced from the wheat to be exported out of the Dominion.

The other petition asks for an advance in the present duty on flour. It shows that, ander present tariff, when Canada requires to import wheat or flour for home consumption, the imports have been and must continue to be almost entirely in flour; the experience of past years showing about nine times as much flour as wheat. This is quite unfair to our millers, and injurious to our own vessels and rail-
