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PETROLIA THE OIL CITY.

A VISIT TO THIS INTERESTING COMMERCIAL CENTRE.

THE TRAVELER MAY VISIT the majority of the cities and towns in the Dominion and think he has got all the wonders of the world. This being the headquarters for coal of the industry here seen in its highest state of development. Petroleum is the pivot round which everything centres, and everyone is more or less interested in its production. It is a striking fact that the intelligence and inventive genius of many of the citizens have devised such perfect machinery for carrying on this industry with safety, expedition and profit that orders for it come from all parts of the world, while the miner or well-borer is engaged in it.

The town is in the township of Enniskillen, county of Lambton, on Bear Creek, a tributary of the Sydenham River, and in the terminus of the Petrolia branch of the Grand Western division of the Grand Trunk Railway, and of the Canada division of the Michigan Central. It is 15 miles southwest of Sarnia, the county seat, 120 from Toronto. It was incorporated as a village in 1868, and up to this time had no particular history other than that of an early settlement. The finding of oil started it on a career of prosperity and it has grown and prospered ever since. In 1874 it was incorporated as a town, and improvements ever since have kept pace with the increase in population.

The town of today has a tasteful, substantial and progressive look. The principal streets are block-paved and have good sidewalks, and Electric-street, which are the principal business streets, would be a credit to any city in the Dominion. Among the fine blocks are the Masonic Temple, a white brick 3-story building, in which are the Postoffice and three stores. The Oddfellows' and Dr. Meares have fine buildings, and among the others show houses "Lancaster Hotel," Vaughan's, Watson's, McKay's, Archer's, Alley, and Union Street special mention.

Not to be behind any progressive town in modern equipment, the Petrolia Electric Light Company has been organized, and Kirk Oil will have in a measure to bow down before the latest development of this wonderful element which finds its way from the clouds with the rain. Water-works are also projected, and whether to bring the water direct from the St. Clair, or by artesian wells, is under discussion, and this far without any definite conclusion. The 1000 wells were put down, and the water there, it is said, an unlimited supply can be pumped.

The Town Hall has just been finished, at a cost of \$35,000, and is one of the best designed and most handsome public buildings in Western Ontario. It is a white brick structure, 72 x 108 feet, 3 stories with basement, and surrounded by a tower of fine architectural design and in harmony with the building. The fittings throughout are of the most superior and commodious nature. The room deserving of the best attention is the hall, constructed in opera house style, beautifully frescoed and decorated with large stage proscenium boxes and magnificent drop curtains, and is furnished with 1000 opera chairs. The council chamber is another elegant room, and independent of the accommodation required by the council is seated for 200 visitors. This is used for the Police Court and as a Division Court room. There are rooms for the town officials, a fire station and all the equipments. In the fire station are two steam fire engines—a Stanley, Corry, W. A. Wilson, Mason English steamer, a brake engine, hook and ladder apparatus, half a dozen hose carts, and all other necessary appendages. It may be noted that the hall is provided with iron galleries at certain places, from which there are iron stairs, intended as fire escapes. It is heated with steam throughout and lighted with gas.

The assessment roll of 1898 shows a population of 4022 and a total assessment of \$1,040,010. The officers of the corporation for the current year are as follows: Dr. Meares, Mayor; O. W. Simmons, Reeve; S. Steeles, Deputy-Reeve; Councilmen—H. Wilson, Harrison Corry, W. A. Wilson, W. C. Duncan, S. J. Morwood, D. B. Mills, W. A. Reynolds and Jacob Boozey, Geo. S. McPherson is Town Clerk.

The town is well supplied with churches, the English church, Roman Catholic buildings being handsome white brick structures of superior architecture, with graceful spires. The Presbyterians are erecting a new one in keeping with the town and the increasing number of members in the church. Methodists and Baptists have frame churches, the Methodist church building being tastefully designed and surrounded by a spire. Electric Light.

Messrs. Faust & McKee, with the enterprise and energy which characterize a great majority of the business men, are now introducing the electric light, the system being the Kellano of Waterloo, a Canadian invention, which has been proved satisfactory in every detail. They are commencing with a 20-horse power and additions will be made as justified by the demand. This extension, we imagine, will soon be justified, as at the time of our visit the lights were all taken up 20 cents per night each till 12 o'clock in the charge, and the corporation pay 30 cents each light per night. This is probably the cheapest quotation for all night lights in the Province. Mr. Faust is general manager of the local electric light company.

W. A. Wilson is an oil producer, a former resident of Smith's Falls, who came to Petrolia 10 years ago, and became one of the solid men of the place. He has been in the oil business during the past ten years and is the owner of number of good paying wells. He has been 3 years in the Town Council and is chairman of the Board of Works. He is recognized as a useful practical man in the Council, and as a citizen is much esteemed.

John McMillan is one of the pioneer refiners, and has always been himself in everything pertaining to the oil business ahead of the times. He promptly procured the best apparatus as invented, was the first to adopt tank cars and the originator of the "Union" brand of refined oil. He has been five years, and in addition to the various brands of illuminating and lubricating oils, manufactures benzine, kerosene, and quantities of paraffine wax. He owns over 80 wells, the products of which are conveyed in pipes direct to the refinery.

H. Hawkes, manufacturer of boots and shoes, has been 20 years in business and is noted for the superior quality of work and material used. He has had 4 years before the public as family butchers and have won an excellent reputation for the uniform superior quality of their meat. They are practical men, judges of good stock and know what to buy.


