SIDNEY LOBB IS ACQUITTED.

THE JURY SAY THAT HE DID NOT SHOOT HIS WIFE. And It Only Took Them Thirty Minutes to Arrive at Their Verdict—The Evidence Was Circumstantial and the Evidence Was Little That—Doctors Show Why Mrs. Lobb Could Not Have Committed Suicide.

After a trial, extending over several days, Sidney Wentworth Lobb was yesterday acquitted at the New Westminster, B.C., Assizes, of having been guilty of willfully causing the death of his wife on June 8 last at Nanaimo. Lobb, who was employed as an accountant by the New Vancouver Coal and Land Company, formerly resided in this city, and his wife was a daughter of Mr. Robert Elliot, the Front-street wholesale druggist.

Mr. Lobb has suffered much since the melancholy occurrence, which was the subject of the trial. He was defoliated by Mr. E. P. Davis, Q.C., of Vancouver, instructed by Mr. Arthur Lobb of this city, brother of the accused.

Many Witnesses Testify. A very large number of witnesses were examined. All the witnesses for the prosecution admitted that Lobb and his wife lived apparently on the most friendly terms. Two witnesses, who were at the Lobb's house at 8 o'clock on the night of the occurrence, testified that both Lobb and his wife seemed to be in their usual spirits. At 10 o'clock the same night Lobb, attired only in his night shirt and an overcoat, ran to the house of James Lester, a mine of Nanaimo, and said: "Jim Lester! my wife has shot herself. Lobb was greatly excited and apparently much distressed. Mrs. Lester went to the house and found Mrs. Lobb seated in a chair, lifeless. Deceased had on a flannellette dressing gown and nightgown and a pair of boots, but no stockings on her feet. The boots were only slightly buttoned. The pistol was lying on the floor beside the chair. She had not a close conversation with her husband at any time, except that she asked her if there was any hope, to which she made no reply. He then said: "I do not think there is any hope. She then died. My impression was that she would have been further from death than she has been. The case has been held by Mrs. Lobb.

Witnesses always denied accused very pleasant and gentlemanlike. The room showed no appearance of a struggle, but was very neat.

SPOKE OF THE GLORY LAND.

MR. MOODY TELLS HOW TO REAP THE TITLE CLEAR.

Recognition of Friends in Heaven—The Ministry of Angels on Earth—Repentance: What It Is and What It Is Not—Seven Lessons From an Epitaph—Host of Inquirers.

The 19th of Mr. Moody's revival services in Massey Hall yesterday afternoon was very successful. There were 6000 persons present, quite a number from places outside of Toronto. There was a larger proportion of males than on any previous afternoon. Whether it was owing to the subject announced or a coincidence, the fact was that there were more elderly people present than on any former occasion. Mayor Kennedy sat beside Dr. Potts on the platform. At 8.30 Mr. Moody arrived and the song service commenced. All the hymns had special reference to "Heaven," which was Mr. Moody's promised topic.

Song of the Glory Land. Rev. W. O. Cushing's hymn, "Beautiful Valley of Eden," was first sung, and gave an earnest of a good musical service. Then came a general favorite, one of Dr. Watts' earliest and sweetest hymns: Give me the wings of faith to rise Within the veil, and see The saints above, how great their joys, How bright their glories be. "I am waiting for the Master" was then sung, and the audience heartily joined in the chorus— They are waiting at the portal, They are waiting at the door; Waiting only for my coming, All the loved ones gone before.

Rev. E. Adams' sacred song, "Safe Within the Veil," led up in faith to the time when all earthly storms shall have passed. Then the people jubilantly sang "The Home Over There," and the refrain of this popular hymn was heard far afield.

By Mrs. C. G. Moore. At the request of Mr. Moody Miss Agnes Forbes modestly but very sweetly sang Mary Lee Demarest's Scotch song: I am far from my home, An' I'm weary afterwhile, For the land of the living brings, An' my Father's welcome smiles; An' I'll ne'er be content Until my e'en do see The golden gates of heaven, An' my ain country.

The other selections were: "There is a Land of Pure Delight," "I Long to Be There," "Not Half Has Ever Been Told," and Mrs. E. H. Galt's "Song of the Beautiful Land," the first verse and chorus of which are: I will sing you a song of that beautiful land, The far-away home of the soul, Where no storms ever beat on the glittering strand, While the years of eternity roll.

Oh, that home of the soul! In my visions and dreams Its bright, Jasper walls I can see; Till I fancy but thinly the veil intervenes Between the fair city and me!

Future Meetings. Mr. Moody again expressed thankfulness for the good which is being done by these meetings, both in and out of Toronto. He announced an address to parents at 4 o'clock this afternoon and a special meeting for unconverted men only at 8 o'clock this evening. On Friday there will only be one meeting, at 8.30 o'clock, when the evangelist will speak on "The Bible." He desires the presence of sceptics, for he holds if anyone has any doubt of the inspiration of the Bible the gospel will, whilst the doubt lasts, be inefficacious.

Heaven a Place, Not a State. This, at the outset of his discourse, Mr. Moody proved by the citation of passages of scripture, that the evangelist put his heart and soul in it. On the transitoriness of life he was most pronounced, but as men think all men mortal but themselves the effect was not so manifest as when he told of deathbed scenes.

Glimesp of the Glory. Mr. Moody believed in visions of glory on earth, and gave confirmatory evidence thereof. But it is not the pearly gates, the golden streets, the jasper walls, the sea of glass that make heaven so attractive, but those who people the heavenly mansions. What makes your home so attractive? The furnishings? Oh, no; it would be only a gilded sepulchre if the loved ones were not there.

Good Society in Heaven. So it is with heaven. The best spirits of the world for 6000 years are there. You will have good society when you get home. (A voice: "Praise God.") Angels as well as saints will be there. The service of these ministering spirits on earth, Mr. Moody referred to. When death stared him in the face on the ill-fated steamer Spree he found comfort in the faith that God's angels were in attendance. ("Praise the Lord.")

Your Name Registered. Heaven is for all whose names are in the Lamb's book of life. All who believe in Christ have their names registered. "Dr. Potts, ain't you registered?" "The Doctor: "Yes, that I am." "Ain't you, my brother?" "Yes, Michael Pavetti, "Praise the Lord, I am."

My Treasure and My Home Are There. Mr. Moody then compared earthly and heavenly treasures. Riches offered, speedy wings, pleasure unattained, in God's presence is fulness of joy; all His right hand pleasures for evermore. O, then, build above the world; eye, above the sun, and then let the old world rock. Ye are safe! ("Praise the Lord.")

Chicago Versus New Jerusalem. Mr. Moody told of a young man who was engaged body and soul in the real estate business in Chicago. He left his Christian father in charge of the office. A man inquired the price of a corner lot. "I don't know," said the father, "but I would give much more for standing room in the New Jerusalem than for all the corner lots in Chicago." (Laughter.) The son came in and said, "Father, this will never do, you will break up the business." (Reverent laughter.) Mr. Moody: "You see the boy was in Chicago, the father in the New Jerusalem."

Not Worth Their Salt. Said Mr. Moody: "I never knew a man that was worth a snap of the finger for Christian work that was looking for his reward on this earth. Christ Himself said: 'Great is your reward in heaven.' If He said great, how great must it be? Dead to the world and alive to God is the Christian's true attitude. If it be the case we can afford to laugh at the world's jeers and sneers. Child of God, hit up your head. We have no corruptible inheritance, and soon shall hear the Master's 'Well done, good and faithful servant.'" (A chorus of "Amen.")

Better Than the Cars of Crowa. Paul's compensation for all the stonings, stripes, imprisonments and sufferings out of count was the crown of glory which he saw at the end of his career. What is the crown of Russia in comparison with this? The poor Car of the world, it is very long.

In concluding his very serious discourse Mr. Moody quoted Scripture to show that friends will know each other

in heaven. But better than this was the glorious truth: "I shall be satisfied when I awake in Thy likeness."

The Night Meeting. There was less than the customary crowd in the evening, but there was the customary jubilation. Nearly 6000 men were present. Among the songs were: "Come, ye that love the Lord," "White as Snow," "Sound the Battle Cry," "Peace, perfect peace." My faith looks up to Thee," "I will sing the Wordless Story," "Gathering Home," "Christ Receiveth Sinful Men," solo "My Ain Country," "Miss Heston," "Arise and Shine," and "Though your sins be as Scarlet."

One song the choir sang was the sacred song by Mary Leslie, entitled "Gathering Home," the first verse of which is: They are gathering homeward from every land, One by one, As their weary feet touch the shining strand.

One by one, Their brows are enfolded in a golden crown; Their travel-stained garments are all laid down; And clothed in white raiment they rest in the mead, Where the Lamb doth love His saints to lead.

One by one, Rev. Dr. McTavish and Rev. Mr. Simpson offered prayer.

Discoursed on Repentance. The choir sang for an hour and a half, thus breaking the record at the 20th meeting. It was 8.30 before Mr. Moody ascended the special platform. Repentance was his subject, founded on Isaiah lv.: 6. Seek ye the Lord while he may be found, call ye upon him while he is near; 7. Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts; and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon.

8. For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the Lord. 9. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts.

Religion is Not Christ. The world, said Mr. Moody, is full of religion, but religion is not Christianity. He contrasted Mohammedanism with Christianity, stating that the religion of Mahomet sanctioned the foulest and vilest sins, but the teaching of Christ was to forsake sin. If this were not done there was no true faith.

Two men got drunk, returned to their rowboat and vigorously plied the oars. Strange, said they, we are so long in crossing. When daylight dawned they found they had never untied the boat. (Laughter.)

What Repentance is. It is not feeling; it is not fear, it is not penance, it is not remorse, it is not conviction. Repentance is an afterthought; it is a change of mind; it is to change your course. It is not shedding a few tears, but turning right round. As a soldier expressed: it is Halcy Attention, Right-about-face, March! and that is all there is to it. (Laughter.)

Human Efforts Unavailing. The evangelist instanced the case of Naaman the leper to show that human thought is quite astray as to God's work. When he laid aside his thoughts and obeyed the prophet's orders he is groovy departed from him. Athens was as rotten as hell itself, although it had plenty of philosophy and philosophic thought. Where there is true repentance there is immediate pardon.

A Seven-fold Record. On an old gravestone in the States is this inscription: "I have sinned; I have repented; I have trusted; I have loved; I rest; I shall rise; I shall reign." Let us, said Mr. Moody, all say this. And they all said it after him, and the sound of the confession, the faith, the hope, all went up to the heart of God.

Tearful prayers followed. Then there was an overflowing attendance at the enquiry room, where hundreds wished the prayers of God's people. A large number professed conversion before the meeting closed.

Mr. Moody attributed the blessing to the earnest prayers of the women in the Metropolitan Church and to the intercession in the Massey Hall.

THE HUGGER CONVICTED. He Will Not Kiss Ladies Against Their Will in Future. Barney, "the Hugger," has been caught. It will be remembered that on the night of Halloween a number of young ladies complained that while they were on their way home a man stopped them, deliberately threw his arms around their necks and kissed them. The police have been looking for the offender and he turned out to be Bernard McMahon, one of the gang of young toughs who have been in the habit of congregating in the neighborhood of the Queen-street subway. McMahon was fined \$2 and costs, with a promise that if he repeated the offence he would be sent to jail for a lengthened term. Two companions, who were not known to be "huggers," were fined \$1 each.

A Novel Sight. Yesterday something quite unique was seen in Toronto. A young Turk, a rug artist from a royal palace of Turkey, was seen taking a drive about the city. The carriage was handsomely arrayed for the occasion with beautiful Turkish rugs and cloths, and was prominent of all a silk rug prominently displayed and used as a wrapper and shawl. 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CIVIL LAW REFORM.

Chancellor Boyd Says There is Not So Much Necessity for Reform in the Law as the Expedition by Barristers.

In their presentation of the grand jury at the York Assizes pointed out that, while the law provided for the hasty trial of criminals, yet there was too much delay and too great an expense in civil trials. Property and commercial interests, they claimed, are endangered by the law's delays, and they urged that there should be instituted a reform in this direction.

In reply, Chancellor Boyd said that there might be too much haste in reforming the civil law. It was a matter that needed the most careful consideration.
