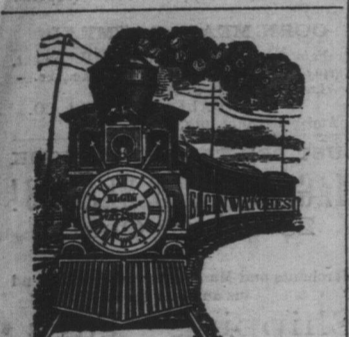

BOSTON CORRESPONDENCE.

AUGUST 14th, 1876.

You ask me to give my views regarding the political situation in this country. If I attempt to do so, I fear you will think them crude and unsatisfactory. To clearly and properly understand and appreciate the political situation and prospects to-day, it is perhaps necessary to revert to the history of the two great parties which are now contending for supremacy.

When the Democrats of the North, ignoring the good old Jeffersonian doctrine that "all men are born free and equal," formed a fatal alliance with the slaveholding Oligarchy of the South for the purpose of perpetuating the power upon which they had long been fattening and growing more and more corrupt, they abandoned the cardinal principles of their fathers, cutting loose from their time-honored moorings, and drifted to disaster and wreck upon the reefs of political heresy and inconstancy.

emergencies of the time—to restrain the growing corruption of the two long dominant Democracy—and to abolish slavery. It was a magnificent newly arisen party of reformers, whose objects and actions were responsive to the heart-beat of the liberty-loving people of the North; but the Democrats, entrenched in power, and with the aid of the United South, succeeded in defeating the new party in the Presidential election of 1856; but the new party, gathering weight, volume and momentum, swept the country in 1860.

Meanwhile, the controversies growing out of the question of slavery, had fanned the fires of sectional hate into the fiercest flame. Neither party, in temper or mouth, was for compromise. Heated and violent passions and virulently intense hatred took the place of reason and moderation, and civil war was the result. The South went into rebellion, and the Democrats of the North generally, horrified by the fearful consequences of their own blind, selfish and corrupt policy, listened to the battle-fare, or to the assistance the Government in some other way, to crush a monster which they had fostered and fed until it had grown into proportion so gigantic as to threaten the stability of the nation.

For four years "the clash of arms" resounded, the South was subdued, and slavery was wiped out. The war being over, the southern Negroes free, the friends of humanity rejoiced, but the sinister effects of that intestine war were to be felt for many years. The Republican party was now in the undisputed ascendancy; and having accomplished the mission for which it was formed—the abolition of slavery—it was called upon to bring back to the country the blessings of peace, to restore union in its old time prosperity, to harmonize discordant elements, to set the wheels of business in motion, to re-construct the States, to preserve the financial credit of the nation,—and, in short, to bring order out of chaos.

Eleven years have passed away since the close of the war, and during that time the Republican party had absolute control of the Government,—and what are the results? It would be more than time that I can devote to the matter to describe, ever so briefly, the lamentable failure of the ruling party to rise to the plane and elevated policy which the exigencies of those years demanded. After the lapse of eleven years we find every industrial pursuit languishing, the country groaning under enormous and unnecessary taxation, the public credit impaired, the currency dishonored by the Government's issue of fiat money.

Canadian tweeds, particularly light makes, woollens, matches, sewing machines, Godrich self-soiled boots. This article is largely used, and sold comes from Ireland. It is put up in a peculiar way to suit the market, which I cannot at once explain. Then all through the island fresh butter comes from Copulating; this is put up in tins the same as salted butter, and could be easily done in Canada. Condensed milk is largely used, and this is brought from the Swiss companies. There is a large quantity of lumber for almost the entire country comes from Liverpool, and it is a fact that Canadian cheese suit the palate of the West India. They require plenty in peculiar way. There is a great demand for good hams; 10 to 12 lbs. is the favorite size. Breakfast bacon, put up in a peculiar way, will also be useful. Tobacco, especially the blue mottled, and all Am. Tobacco, Furniture ditto. Grain and rye whiskey, ales, buckwheat and many other articles would sell.
