Tropical Fruits.

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT BANANAS, PINE APPLES AND ORANGES.

The fruit trade during the past year was profitable to most of those who were largely engaged in it, though the supply was in excess of the demand, and prices were therefore low.

The importation of bananas last year consisted of 165 cargoes by sailing vessels and parts of cargoes by 113 steamers.

Florida is a great banana region. The banana is the fruit of a short, rapidly growing tree. It is an annual, the fruit coming to maturity about a year from the time the shoot is planted.

From the trunk, which is in the heart, fibrous nature, are thrown out six or more long palm-like branches. The bunch of fruit appears at the juncture of the trunk and branches, and consists of from four to twelve hands, each hand having in its grasp from half a dozen to a dozen bananas.

Several shoots sprout, each of which in turn may become a tree. The method of cultivation is simple. The method of first cleared. A hole is then dug, into which the shoot is placed.

The pine is out of the root, and plant and fruit are shipped without being separated. This is expensive, but the price obtained warrants it. The fruit can be kept a long time in this way.

There are several orange factories on the islands. Most of the fruit is canned in this country, but it is asserted that it is inferior in flavor and quality to that put up on the islands.

One of the best oranges is the 'Parsonage' orange, which is exported from Jamaica to the United States. The ordinary are plucked and brought to the seaboard to be packed in crates.

They do not keep unless you add a little salt.

APRIS MARZALLA. - Take, core and cut in small pieces any kind of sour apple, and to every pound put in three quarters of a pound of sugar. Put them in a preserving pan and boil over a slow fire until they are reduced to pulp; then add a few drops of lemon juice and keep in a cool place.
