Then, again, there are fertilizers, such as bone and potash, nitrate of soda (which comes from South America), Peruvian guano (which is the excrementitious deposit of certain sea fowl, which is found on the coast of Peru and islands of the coast).

Why Best Eggs? Since the introduction of baking powder, it has never been necessary to beat eggs. Let your materials be good, steam, add the eggs, milk, seasoning and sifted flour, with baking powder, and spend the energy you have wasted on the egg in thoroughly beating the cake as a whole, then if your material was good, your cake, no matter what its name is, will be good also.

Officer SUREBARK. Make the crust of a flat pie of flour, one and one-half teaspoonfuls baking powder, half a teaspoonful butter, and milk to make a dough just stiff enough to roll. Have it, and roll out to a depth of about one-eighth of an inch; then roll the other half, and lay over the first and bake. While baking, prepare the following: Drain the liquor from a quart of oysters; place this liquor with one and one-half pints of milk in a saucepan, bring to a boil, then add a little thickening, a tablespoonful of butter, with salt and pepper to taste. Put the oysters in, and as soon as they are thoroughly heated, add the crust apart; pour in the oysters, and serve at once! The delicacy of the dish depends on eating it at once before the under crust becomes soaked.

DELICIOUS CHOCOLATE CARAMELS.—The secret of success with these caramels is to boil to the right thickness, and the length of time required to bring them to this point depends on the quality of the sugar used. Fifteen minutes of hard boiling will usually be sufficient. Six tablespoonfuls of butter, three pounds of refined sugar, one and one-half pints of milk in a saucepan, bring to a boil, then add a little thickening, a tablespoonful of butter, with salt and pepper to taste. Put the oysters in, and as soon as they are thoroughly heated, add the crust apart; pour in the oysters, and serve at once!

How To Drink a Farm. But Bonhôte gives this simple recipe: "My homestead friend with a chromatic nose, while you are stirring up the sugar in a ten cent glass of gin, let me give you a fact to ponder over. You may say you have longed for years for the free, independent life of the farmer, but have never been able to get money enough together to buy a farm. And there is just what you need. I have a good, improved farm at the rate of a hundred square feet a gulp. If you doubt this statement, figure it out yourself. An acre of land contains 43560 square feet. Estimate for convenience the land at \$43.56 an acre, you will see that it brings the land to just one mill per square foot, one cent for ten square feet. Now pour down the money and imagine you are swallowing a strawberry patch. Call in five gulps down that 500-foot gulch. Get on a prostrate course some day and see how long it requires to swallow a pasture land to feed a cow. Put down that glass of gin; there is dirt in it—one hundred feet of good, rich dirt, worth \$43.56 per acre.

Blubberies as a garden berry are practically unknown, but the Manchester Union says the luscious fruit does not require transplantation, and improve by cultivation as much as other small fruits. This authority advises care in transplanting, as the wild berries differ in size and flavor. Select bushes that produce the best fruit, and cut them back nearly to the ground. Then set the roots in good strong land and mulch them well. The first season they will make some growth of wood, but the second year they will make more and will begin bearing, and will probably improve in quality and size of fruit after their usual product while growing wild. The blubberies is a berry entirely like the vegetables which are eaten as salad. The small fruits, once started, take care of themselves, and give large returns over for neglect. A little care makes them pay as well as anything on the farm.

A Prompt Cure. GENTLEMAN.—Having suffered over two years and spent them in two. Clean them in a pan, the outside uppermost, and bake. Bake with unrefined butter.
