The firm, formerly of Seeton, where they did a small busincss, commenced operations in Aylmer about a year ago with a capital of $\$ 1,000$ in cash and stock. Their liabilities are estimated at $\$ 10,000$; assets at $\$ 4,000$.

Tue houschold effects of M. A. Clark, a bookseller and stationer at Paisley, Ont., have been sold under $\pi$ chatel mortgage given to a T'oronto creditor; who also holds a mortringe on the stock, and consequearily the prospects for other creditors ate not bright. Olark commenced business about six years ago and had previously been a clerk with a Puisley dry goods firm.

Tre sheriff is in posscssion of the estate of James M. Watson, a furniture dealer of St. Nary's, Ont., on account of attachments taken out by his father and other creditors. Finance and Insurance Review．

MONTREAL；MARCH $7,1884$.

THE BUDGET SPEECH．
We have given a condensed statement of the Budget speech，which，as might have been expected，gives a coulcuir de rose view of the financial position of the Dominion．There is no getting over the fact that the receipts for the first seven months of the fiseal year are，in round figures，two millions of dollars less this year than in the corresponding period of last，－while the payments are about a million in exsess．We are not of the number of those who believe that what is called the National Policy is respon－ aible for the present depression，any more than we butheve that theprevious prosper－ ity wis 10 any appreciahle extent caused by the atoptima of that policy．We have On mote than one gecasion pointed out
that there has been commercial depression at the very same time in Gireat Britain and the United States, two countries whose fiscal policy is widely different. We have no inclination to object to the principle of protection to mative industries, which we believe to be in accordance with public opinion on this continent. It has become apprenterthat the Democratic party in the United States, which we may, as regards the question of free trade, assume to be in sympathy with the Canadian opposition, is by no means prepred to alopt a free trade policy. In the late debate in the House of Commons Mr. Patterson, of Brant, claimed credit for his party, on the ground that they were not free traders but that they merely objected to excessive duties. The truth is that the tariff has to be considered with reference to every item comprised in the list of articles on which duties are imposed, and this involves the separate consideration of every item on that list. There certainly are leading articles, which more particularly call for special consideration, and prominent among these are sugar, cotton, iron and woollen manulactures.

Now, as regards sugar, there is a loading principle involved, which is to aftord reasonable protection to our own refiners. The old policy, which, we ought in justice to state, was not adopted on political grounds, was to admit refined sugar at a very triffing advance over unrefined, the practioal effect having been that United States refiners were enabled by the operation of the drawback system, to defy competition in a foreign market. We have always defended the action of the Government in so regulating the tariff, that there is no longer an inducement to carry on what may without exageration be termed $\Omega$ fraudulent irade with the British Provinces. 'The effect of the tariff has been that refined sugars are no longer imported into Canada. Nevertheless, the tarift is far from satisfactory. A distinction is drawn between sugars which are ouly likely to be used for refining purposes, and this distinction is particularly favorable to Brazil, which produces a sugar of a much lower grade than the British West Indies. There is said to be much dissatisfaction in Ifalifax, owing to the falling off in the West Indian trade cused by the premium held out to foreigners to send their very inferior sugars to Canada. Surely, when there is a combined specific and ad valorem duty the least that could be expected is that all sugars suitable for the refiners should pay the same specific duty. The grade
that is considered suitable for the refiners is what will be below the grade of 14 Dutch standard. The Government has made an important distinction between Nos. 14 and 9, and as the British West Indies do not as a rule export any sugar of so low a grade as under 9 D . S., the foreign State of Brazil enjoys a protection at their expense, and the consequence has been that our own Atlantic port of Halifax has suffered considerably by the loss of the old West Indian trade.

We have on several occasions felt it our duty to point out the effect of the combined specific and ad valorem duties on cotion manufactures which operate as a protection to foreigners. 'Ihere can be no dispute as to the fact, which the trade returns establish most satisfactorily. We fear that the opposition is as much to blame as the Government, as we have never seen that the point has been taken by any member on that side of the House. It is clearly one of the serious defects of the present tariff, and we camnot imagine that a single argument can be used in its favor. It is not in cotton goods alone that this objectionable principle has been brought into operation. It will be found in almost every case in which combined specific and ad valorem duties have been imposed on imports from Great Britain. When it is borne in mind that Great Britain could almost by the stroke of a pen retaliate with such effect that it could bring Canada literally on her knees, this highly discreditable policy becomes even more objectionable.

If we were disposed to criticize minor items of the speech we might point out that although never in the opinion of the Finance Minister did the credit of Cinada stand higher than it does now, yet, "ow"ing to the depreciation in the value of "lumber, which is one of our principal ex"ports, owing to overtrading in certain "branches in the Dominion as well as over "imports, we have a depression at the " present time." We cloubt whether the latter part of the sentence is consistent with the assertion previously made. We, however, doubt whether that very convenient charge of over importation and overtuding can be substantiated. There were peculiar circumstances connected with our cotton mills which may have stimulated over production but we have no evidence to lead us to believe that there has been over inportation. We have to trust to the discretion of our wholesale houses to regulate our imports with reference to the demand ; and we are fully convinced that neither the Finance Minister nor those journals which are constanlly deploring the over importation of
our merchants are in a position to form a reliable opinion on the subject.

There are some details referred to in the Minister's speech, among other the proposedalterations in the customs duties, which we may advert to ona future occasion.

THE PaCIFIC RAILWAY.
The Govermment Loan Bill has been reall a second time in the Senate by a large majority, and has passed through its other stages. We have seldom noticed more unfair criticism on any measure that required the action of Parliament than that of the present opposition, and the press which supports it. Dissenting, as we do, from much that has been written on the subject by Bystander we can cordially concur in his remark: "The chiefs of the company " are no more responsible for the treaty " with British Columbia or any of the "consequences in which it has involved "the mation than they are for the treaty "of Berlin. 'Ithey are merely national " contractors on a vast scale, and in the "opinion of all impartial judges they " have done their work well." Those who disapprove of the construction of the section of the road north of Lake Superior should bear in mind that for this the Government is alone responsible, and we are far from meaning by this remark to altach any blame to their decision. There can be no doubt that this is the true Canadian line, and the one most likely to draw the Lraffic of the NorthWest to the St. Lawrence. The policy of the opposition has been to divert the North-Western trafic to the Southern railroad lines, and to the United States cities on the Alanticseaboard. The personal attacks on the members of the Syndicate have been simply disgraceful. The Crank Trunk Company had to appeal to Parliament on more than one occasion for assistance, but no one ever had the meanness to allude to the immense fortunes of Mr.' 'Whomas Baring, or of Lord Wolverion who had thought proper to take stock in a limited liability company, which is precisely what the gentlemen composing the Canadian Pacific Company have done. Such remarks as we have noticed are in the highest degree disdiscreditable. As we have noticed the fivorable remarks of Bystander we ought, to prevent misconception, to state our regret that the distinguished writer referred to should persist in asserting that our Canadian public works are to be attributed to "Imperialism inspired by aristocracy." The same writer thinks
that Quebec influence has not been without its eflect; but, while concurring in this opinion we venture to ask any impartial Camalian whether the Quebec members have been under the influence of imperialism.

## THE FINANCIAL POSTYON.

The financial position of the United States is daily lecoming nore critical. The shipments of gold between 25 th February and Ist March were $\$ 2,505,000$, and on the 4th inst the steamship Arizona took $\$ 1,450,000$, making nearly four and-a-hal nillions in about a week. Everything points to the practical atoption of the silver standard, of which the treasury holds over one hundred and sixty millions of dollars. There is still a very large amome of gold in the treasury, but experience has taught the impossibility of maintaining two standards, one of much less value than the other. The issue of standard silver dollars is mather increasing the amount coined in the latest month of the present year for which there is a return, heing in excess of the corresponding month of last year. There is no reason to suppose that Congress will repeal the law requiring the continued coinage of silver, which has alremly become a serious nuisance in the United States. When once the subsisting agreements between the banks are found, as they must and will be, to be impracticable, silver alone will become the standard, and when that is the case the next move will be an unlimited coinage of silver and the exportation of gold. That Canada which has a sole gold standard will be materially affected by the change there can be no donbt, and yet there is no reason, so for as we can judge, tozsuppose that either the Finance Minister or his critics in the House have given any consideration to a subject which is very likely to assume a very difterent position before another session of Parliament.

## HAMITHON PROVIDEN'L AND LOAN SOCIETY:

We have much pleasure in again directing the attention of our readers to the report of the Mamilton Provident and Loan Society presented at the twelfh ammal meeting of the Society. It is most satisfactory to learn that the Society has lieen able to pay off a portion of its debenture debt by the issue of new debentures at a lower rate of interest. That is one of the chief causes of success with similar instilutions. To have credit in the Euglish market sufficient to insure the
sale of debentures at a low rate of interest is especially necessary to the success of such companies as that whose report we have to consider. The rate of dividend, 8 per cent, has been kept up, and $\$ 100,000$ has been transferred from the reserve fund to the credit of shareholders to enable them to pay 20 per cent. on a fresh allotment of shares. It is highly satisfactory to learn that the inspector of the Society has been able to make such a satisfactory report as to the securities for the loans in the Province of Manitoba which has been looked on of late as under. going a period of reaction after an almost unprecedented inflation.

## the mill trade.

Depleted stocks of Labrador herrings have led to unusual animation in the Montren tish market, and the same condition of tande is reportel at Quebee, St. Johnamd Malifax. Of the No. 1 and No. 2 grades there are searcely any to bo had, and leading firms here and elsewhere have of late been scouring the market and fiad that they must be content with No : grade. 'This state of the supply is in great contrast with that of a year ago, and with the usual incrensed demand during leonten senson just commencent, the trade in this regard is not in at comfortable position. Good qualities of all kinds of salt fish, if not scarce, are in comparattively dight suphly,-atecounted for by the inereased consumption through the relatively extreme prices denamed for hog product of all description, while the rigid inspection of this year was in a measure another incentive to consumers and dealers. By it they knaw exactly what quality of fish they were buying, and hence bought more liberally at the early part of the season. Upon the receipt of the first arrivals of the new seasou's catela by consigners, the quality was so irregular that a more rigid insplection was demunded, the result of whieh demonstrated that the largest proportion of Labrador herring was of the No. 2 and 3 grades, with but very sumil percentage of No. 1 Finding this to be the case the disposition to carry over supplies was much weakened, with a corresponding ansiety on the part of the trade to unleard; lience liberal shipments followed from Montreal, making the distribut. ing points, Kingsion, Chicngo, Milwanke and elsewhere, and it would now appear that these same shippers would much prefer that they had been less urgent at so early a date in selling slock. It is truic that Lake trout, British Colunbia sulmon aud cod have, in a measure, supplanted the Laboudor goods, and partially met the demand, but agrain the stocks of these are considered but very moderate for the season of the year.

## THE CITMENS INSURANCE CO.

The exprience of this company during 1883, as shown by the report published ou another page, is no exception to the general results of Ganadian underwritiug for the year. A scrutiny of the ample details given will go to prove,
howerer, that every thing has been estimated on the severe side, and that, had there been any desire to fo:ce the condition of the company to furuish a rose-culored statement, the small balance of $\$ 11,441$ under Fire and Accident Revenue account might lave ensily been eliminated. As it is, the amomu of losses in comre of adjustment will probably reduce this amount one half through sulvage, while the appreciation in securities siace the date of the report rill restore much of what was deducted on this account at the close of the year. The report contains no meation of au assel of rabut $\$ 7,000$, which appears to have escaped the notice of the directors, it being in the unture of an undonbled cham tor re-insurance against the Mmhathn of New York, as yet unpaid. It will be observed that, after providing for a fall re-insumate reserve of $\$ 82,605$ and tor losses in course of adjustment, including a very small amonut contested, this department shows a surplus of assets over linbilities of 368,350 .-The Life branch shows better results, and the mortaity for the year, which is in the proportion of $1+\frac{10}{} 21$, as compared will the actuarint expectation of the company, is ample testimony to the caro observed in the selection of lives. It will bo observed, also, that the more severe Hon ty per cent reserve on outstanling policies has been neopted. The securities in this branch have also been subjected to the pruning process, before appenring in the list of assets. The policy pursued by the Uitizens' management and directurate in carefuly spreading their fire risks, altbungli operating against a much larger business, cannot fail in the long time to make itself felt in the dircetion of diminishent losses, while the new tatiff for this Province in connection with the general alvance in rates, must redound to the benefit of a company which has hitherto refused to enter into any competition involring an budue cnting of rates below the price of first-class indenmity, which its budy of slatrehukiers, comprising many of the wealthiest men in Canada, afiord to those of the insuring pimblic who favor the compury with a share of their business. It may not be premalure io say, in conclusion, that sharcholders may shortly begin to congratulate themselves on that condilion in the by-laws which relates to the transfer of stock, and which prevented some of them from sacerifieng their property during the darker lays of fire-maderwriting in Camada. It was well said by the president in the course of his remaks that the infugion of a little of that inherited spinit which rendered such good service in days gone by to two or three large and now suceessful fire compuies in Ontario-a spirit that has never deserted the life companies of the comatry - would go far towards chabling the compring to shortly resme the payment of dividends to the shareholders.

Rubser Shoms.-A correspondent points out some disulvantige under which mannfacturers of Camadian rabber goods labor in competing with those of American make, so largely imported of late yenrs to this country. The quality and the price (notwithstanding the duty) of the American manufactured article.
are so apmarent that thousands of people, especially in the cities and large towns, hesitate to use any other, and this notwithstmoling the low profit or no profit at ath at whith they are handled by the shoe houses. Penple whothave tried both, say the imported artiele is chetpue also in the sense that it does not emek me bretk away so rapidly, and is, on aceonnt of its lightness, flexibility, and softness, mich more comfortable, less liable 10 slip, amd does not wear smooth on the soles so quichly. The Canadian manufachurers complain that the tariff of 1879 is less a protection to thom than it appents, that-many of the artioles regnired in the manafacture must still be importit, and instatuee the artiele of collon fibute employed in the premuration of carrare-covers and oblier broad roode. I'le only eomplay which hals nthined to may great prominetiec in Cmanala should look to its lautels. This compuny is gemenally sthposed to luave a monepoly of the bisitess. The following table may tend to show that this itea is more fancied than real :

Its casli assets were $\$ 55,5+2,902$, on the Ist of Jamary last; the number of policies in force $69,22 \overline{7}$, and the mount covered by t ese $\$ 108,740,043$. Some 15,500 new policies were issued, being an increase of 3,383 on those; of the year previons; $552,735,564$ of new insuratece was witten, being an excess over 1882 of $\$ 97,330,040$. These tigures are simply amaing, nond second only to those of the gignmic New York company reecntly referred to in these columns. The income of the compary drawn from premiums, iuterest, rents, las inctrosed $51,710,704$ during the jear, and the total income shows an exeess over expenditure o. S4,559,3:34. The tutal ammut pand to protieyholders during the geat for death datms, endowments, manities, divitends, and surrender
 ment of the company has been equally suceesshal, the amomat added to that fund h wing been $51,116,039$, and that paid on matured tontines suide 215 . Stuch a report requires litale comment ; the high reputation of the company and the standing of its ullieers place the New York Lifie Insuranee Co , as regatds capital and prosperity, among the first companics doiug business on the "matual prancinle."

Hbayy ancanob in Qumbe--During the mast week this usually expensive drug has ataracted unusual attention, praticulaty in the United Sintes. An ntvance of 400 to 50 e per onnce vial is made, owing to the fire nul total destruction in Philatelphin of the extensive premises of Mesars. Puwer \& Weirhtman, manafactures. At the time of the fire there was in stock an unusually large supply of quinine. all of which was consumed. As a consequence, all of the smerican manufucthrers have advanced the value from F 1.40 , per ounce to $\$ 1.80$, while all that could be pro: cuted in matke of the above mannfacture is held at $\$ 1.00$ per ounce. Considerable excitement prevails in the trade, with active speculation as a result.

## WESTRERN ASSURANOE UO.

The thirty-third unnat meding of the shareholders of this Gompmiy was held at its offices in loronto on the 28 tis ult, , the chatir being oceupied by the president, A. N. Smith, bisg
Prom the repurt of the Directors on the business of the past year it appeared that the premiam receipts in the fire lranch, compared with those of the previons year, show a considerable increase. This is due in some measure to the better mons that have been obtained, particularly durjog the latter months of the year, but the improvement in this respect has bem comoterialanced by exceptional losees; the fires recorded, both in Ctmada and the United States, laving been largely in excess of those of average years.
The Marime business of the company duxing 1583 was redteed, especintly on our inland waters, on account of the low rates which prevailed. Owing to the comparatively small amomat at risk, the company did not suffer to any great cxtent from the serions disisters to lake shipping which ocurred towards the cluse of the season ot indand nusigation.

After providing for all lusses reported to the 31st December, ind fior the payment of two half-yenrly diridends of six per cent., the Reserve Fund of the company stands at $\$ 700,-$ 000 , and $\$ 3,828.28$ remains at the eredit of Protit and hoss Account: The amount estimated as necessary to ro-insture all existing risks is 5515,582 , which leaves a net surplas over Capital and all Liabilities of $\$ 188$, 246.38.

## REPORT.

A review of the business of the company for the past year is, I regret to sav, not so satisfactory as I anticipated it wonld be at the date of our last ammal meetiog. The Fire and Aecident losses especially were unusually large, and the mates of insurance were lower, probably, than ever before. The Fire Losses for the City of Montreal for 1853 were greatly in excess of those for teu years previously. Uuder these cireumstances, it is a matter for thmokinhess, that the year's business, on the whole, shews but a trithing deliciency; which, however, will be reducel intle ultimate settlement of vutstunding clains in the Fire buaneh.
'ine Lafe Deratrmext.-Thi. depariment shows a gratifying increase of business, and a hatudsome balance of $\$ 2,719.7$ upon the year's operations.

Rate of Montahity-The report of our consulting actuary shows that the mortality during the year wasmuch less iban the expectation would have justified-in the portion of fourteen to twenty-one, or seven thonsand dolhars in favor of the company.

Yaluation of Pollcies, -Tbe company bas had a donble raluation made of its Life Policies, one by Protessor Cherriman of the Govermacht lasurance Depurtment, Utawa, and one by the company's Consulting Actuary ; and as the former was slightly in excess of the latter, Professor Cherriman's ralination for Reserve, being the higher, has been adopted.

Cosimtions of Lafe Insurance.- Oareful attention has been directed to the conditions of our Lifie Policies, and several changes have been made tendiag to greater liberality of terms, and offering inducements to insurers which will compate favorably with those of any other company doing business in the Dominion.
New Aplications.-11,106 new applications for Fire Insurance, exclusive ol Renewals were receired during the year; of which 904 were declined.

Rates of Insumance.-The low rate of memium upon the fire insurauce which has obtained of late has engaged the serious consideration of moderwriters in Canada and the United States, and a movement has been inaugurnted in both cunntries looking to ia reasonable increase of rates of preaitum. 'Jbis, carried into effect, will doubtless operme to the adrantage of Jnsumace Companies, in which we may expeet to secure our full share.
Rorat. Companibs.- It is a matler for regret that rival insurance managers and agents have been fond, who buse not serupled to arail themselves of the free circulation of momytions and untrablful eiremars, to the prejndice of the reputation of this company, and with the object to promote their own interest thereby. Such conduct deserves the unqualified condemuation of all honorable mea, and will, no doubt, ulimately recoil upoa those who resort to such unwambutable pratiers.
Investments.-A comparison of the companys investments for the past and previons yeats, shows an apparent falling off of $\mathrm{Sl3}$, 914; this, however, it will be obserred, is for the most part due to a depreciation in market value on 31st. Decrmber hist, which will be but of temporary duration, while any subsequent appreciation will appear to the credit of the assets in succeding statments. The company has further provided for an increased liability of $\$ 21, S$ it. 68 , over the Reserves of last year. The Anditor's Gertificate is upon the iable. Thie retiring directors are Robert Anderson, N. B. Corse, and Henry Lyman, who are eligible for re-election.

With respect to the

Fregret to siny that, owing to a depreciation in the valne of limber, which is one of our princi pal exports, owing to overtrading in certain bmanches of trade in the Dominion, as well as over imports, we have a depression at the present time, which, trust, will not be of long durntion but will be spuedily uvereame, and we may be in the position we ocenpied at year ago - mosperiar in every particular. As to the receipts and expendilures for 1879, 1 may state that the receipts for that year were $\$ 35,749$, (0) ; that the expembiture was $528,730,157$, lenving a surphes of $57,064,492$. Adding to that the $1,1000,000$ received from the sate of lands in Manitobr and the North-west pives us a sur-

 stated as follows, those bring the priacipal items:-Sinking fund, $053,412-$ snbsidies to
 expenditure was requived fine expenses conneeded with the genema elections; postal service, $\$ 105,523-$ railways and canals, working expenses, $\$ 371,364$; immigration and guarantine $\$ 184,763$; monnted poliee, S109,369. The inerensen expuinditure on public works and harbors was $\$ 436,3 \bar{j} 9$, no this expentiture, I am sure, will be genemally aproved of. The increase in the administintion of justice was $\$ 33$,S93. Then we have an increase of $\$ 150,000$ for the bounty to the fishemen. These items make ahont $\$ 1,600,000$, mad it will be lound that only small portions-hat portion which was expended in public works, and that portion phid as a bounty to the fishermen, were direet charges on the country. Therefore, while the expenditure then incteased about $\$ 1,600,000$ the taxation has not covered one-half that amount, and the expenditure for the other lati was ou public works and other objects. Now, sir, there were othor expenditurts during the year

## chamgeable to capildal account,

reaching \$14,171,43. How were these expenditures met? In the first place, there was a surplus fiom consolidated revente amounting to $\$ 7,064,002$. Then, there were proceeds from sales of hads in the Northwest, $51,009,019$; deposits in the savings banks of the contatry \$4,445,44j. Besides this, under arangement made with the Gandan Pacific. Railway Uompany, we received the proceeds of the sales of their bonds which were in our hands. 'llase proceeds amounted at the elose of the year to 3 $2,694,000$, 1 non which four per cent. interest was paid. I may say fiather, in answer to the charge of increased taxation, that deductilig from the receipts from customs and excise since 1873 the surplos, und charging simply the gmounts which were necessary for the payment of the expenditure of the govermment, our expenditure per head of the population has been less since 1879 than it was from 1874 to 1878.

Un brundy, gilu, mam, whiskey and wines the increase was se36,000; on fruits and sugar, $\$ 242,500$; on laces, hosiery, hose, jewelley', 71,100 ; whent, flow; $\$ 46,000$; machinery $\$ 80,000 ;$ pig irui, $\$ 28,000$; glassware, $\$ 0.4,-$ 000. The inerease of the excise duty was mainly on the attiele of spidits, and the decrease in tobateo was about covered by the increasid $d$ daty received on malt. That was before the decrease of 8 cents per pound of excise toak phace in the artiele of lobaceo. The estimate of castoms for the curvent year was $\$ 21,000,000-$ the amended estimate is $\$ 20,2 \pi 0,000$. It may be asked by the homse, what has occured to produce this reduction? I may state in answer liat the imports of iast year were $\$ 5,000,000$ in excess of the estimate, and the revente from colstoms Si,000,000 in excess of the estimates. 1 ann satistied, and it is now well understood, that the imporis of hast year were greater than was warranted by the demandand by consumption. Weare now feeling the effect of that over importation, because there is a corresponting reduction in revente receipts from constoms as a result of that over-importation. Then there is another canse. Since this time twelve months a large portion of the imports into Ganada have decrensed in value, as those hon. members who ate engaged in business know perfectly well. Many of the artieles imported have fallen in value, owing to increased stocks in hand in the United States and Old Uountry. I know af one article which was formerly sold at $\$ 9$, but which is now sold for $\$ 6.75$, and so with many other aticles. Itherefore, the overimportation of $\$ 5,000,000$ last year and the fall in the value of inupurts this year have resulted in areduction in the totnl imports down to the present time, and estimating that the next four months will yield one-thitd of the revenne that has been received from cusioms in the last eight montlis, I place the

I think but we have had to expemi a very considerable sum on public works, for the completion of the pmblic buiddiligs in Alanitoba, on the harbor of Toronto, and on works in various parts of the Dominion, where works wore absolately necessary, and the sum voted was not found satti. cient, so that the expenditure under this heaid has been increased, and therefore I estimate that the total expenditure this year wall anount to $\$ 31,200,000$ leaviag it surphus of consolidatited revenue of $\quad \mathbf{F} 1,000,000$. I estimate that the proceeds from public lands in the Northwest will amomut to nother $\$ 1,000,000$, making the totat surphas for the year $\$ 2,000,000$.

## spectal puices.

I will appeal to every hon. gentleman in the house to-day who is duing business either with the United States, or even the other side of the Athante, to say whether the manufacturers in the United Stutes and the manaficturers in the Oid Comntry have not approached him in the last three or four yents anil sold him goods at a lower rate to meet the increased revenue that has been collected and has gone into the treasury of the Duminion. Therefore a very considerable protion of the $\$ 16,000,000$ of customs that has been paid into the trensury of the Domiaion over and above what was necessaty to bay our expenditure lans been beyond doubt paid by the manufacturer nbrome it is a fitct the consmer always pays the increased duty? We know perfeelly well that muny of our men who are largely engaged in business complained that the imposition of the two and a hitf per cent. duty upon the goots they import is just so mucia ont of their pockels that they do not get from the consumer.

## mevenub.

We had a deficit in the first yent of the N. P. as the result of the over importation of the year prexiuns. But we bad in the next year a surplas of $\$ 4,000,000$, in the next yent a surplus of $\mathbf{p} \pi, 000,006$, and in the next year a surplas of $\$ 7,1000,000$. Under these tircimistances, findiag that that tarify was ample to meet not only an! that was required for the lime being but to mett the requarements of the funure, the Govermment came down and asked parhament to take oll t wo millions and a gharter of taxation We have increased the Dominion note circulation since 1879 by six aud a half millions, atd by providing that we should deposit Dominion debentures guaminted by he Imperial Goverinment, for a part of it, we have not been required to keep one dollar of gohe more than. When we had a circulation of \$11,001,000 or $\$ 12,000,-$ 000. We have reduced the interest on our debt by improving une credit, by having a respectable surphas, and we have by the comrse we have pursued with beference to the applipriating of the surplas in reducing our debl, flaced ourselves in a position limat the lasi liscal year the net interest puid by the Domithion of Cannda was $\$ 000,000$ less than we mid in 1870-s0.

The articles it is proposed to place on the free list are as follows:-Belting cloths, boracic acid; canvas manaliactured from jute, 58 inches wide, for hour vileluth-that has been pree when uncalendared, and I may say here that the parties engared in this industry thronghout Uanadin homght they had a right to import, and did import, the uncalendared anticle for it time, but it was found to be not consistent with the law, and it is proposed to place jute canvas calendared in the sane position as mealendared jute-canvas was betore; cheregheat welding componad; grease and grease serap was upon the free list before, but comnected with it was the condithon;" when imported by saup manufacturers," and that is struck out now, and it is open for any person as well its sony, manufacturers to import giense and seran; indigo paste and abstract indigo has been, free in the pasi, but they have a new preparition of indigo called "paste and abstrict," for the same process, and it is proposed to intioduce
these articles into the free list. It will be remembered that lasi session it was decided that iron beams, sheets, plates and knees for composite shijis or ressels should be free. It is now proposed to add angles to that list, and make it iron or steel, because the parties are importing and usiug steel as well as iron, and it is simply placing steel for these purposes in the same eategory, and udding angles. Then wo add to the froe list oxide of manganese, German mineral potash, sulphate of sedium and steel for sinws. The steel for saws was free before. Weadd straw cutters cat to shape. We strike out colcothar; it was an uncertain artiele, and an atempt was made to import other articles under that name. Vegelable fibre for mimufacturing parposes involved a greal deal of dilliculy in the cusions department, and it is proposed to strike that ont. Fish plates, steel, are to be struck oft the free list. They will come in under the iron and sleel phates at the same rate of duty. Then I come to
fife buthabe last.
Acenic reid is to be raised fiom 15 to 25 per cent. it was found that a rery strong deseription of vinegar under the lieat of acetie acid was imported, and it probably was acelic acid, but, by redicing $i t$, and ndang large quantites of water, they converted it into vincfin:, and paid less duty than the kan who imported vinegar. So it is to be putat the stame rate as vincgar, and it is proposed to put such a duly upon it as will make about the sam: rate of daty as is pmid on vinegre. Coplins, undinished leghore hats, are to pay the same as finished hats, 20 !ner cent. ad. Valorem. Capreting and tates of hemp re bo be the same fis
 noi. Uellnoid, when monhted into sizes for knite-landles, when brongha in a certatin shape not maniftemued, will pay 10 per cent. This has becoms necessary in oriler to suphly one or two cutlery mantactories that lave bean established in ile Dominion. It is moposed also to admit handes unimistod at 10 ger cent. Last year we phaced 2 at per cent unou collons, prints and dyed jeans, they remuin the same. Jeans and contilifes were left on the 20 per cent. list with one or two artieles of a similar description of cotton. It is proposed now to phace cotions and jeans fand contils for corsetmakers at 20 per cent. Cotions 42 inches wide, for cimmelied choth, will remain ins at present. This 42-inch cotton is not made in Ganada, and the manufaturess were given aright to inpoit it at 15 per cent. and this is excending it 10 the manafieturers of entmelled cloth. Eartlenware, decorated, painted and sponged, mul atl not elsewhere specifed, will remain as at proseat, 30 per. cent. I may slate liere that the reason is that a questiva has arisen between the importers nad the customs devarment with relerence to the tarill, as itexisisat present. Anaction was brought by a firm in Montreal, chaming that the customs departinent had made an erromeons calculation; and. the verdict was given in favour of the defariment. It is thonght betior; in order to prevent diftienlty in the future, that the administration of the department with reference to the act as it is at present should be jusitied by miming the articles as I have done liere. India rubber, valcmized handles for knives and forks, will be lea per cent. Jron-Unst iron forks in ant unfinished condition, 10 per cent. Lablels for fish cans to piys six cents per pound and 20 jere comt. Pias mate of biass wive are now admilled at one rate of duty, and of iron wite al another rate. As a considerable amount of crpitel has been invested in Ontario in making pins, in oider to obviate the diliculty of ascer-m uning whether a pin is made of iron or apass, the duty is made 30 pei cent. on all. Soap powders will be 3 cents per pomal. Steel, now Sis per ton, is to be \$3 per than and 16 per cent. This is in order to equillize the duty, and give some more protection to the steed industry than it liad in the past. Steel, rolled round wire rods, under lulf an inch indiameter, for mannfacturing wire, now stands at 10 per cent. Arringements are being made for the manufucture of a wire whichbas been faying $1 \overline{0}$ per
cont., and in order to give the manuficturers protection it is proposed to rednce that description of iron used in the manafacture of wire to $\overline{0}$ per cent. Needes such as are monufactured in Canda are to pay hereafter 30 per ceht.

## mak sugar déty.

Daring the last six months the government have had their athention called to this question. 1 may meation lint doring last fall a new farit came into etfeet in the Unitel States with teference to sugar. That tariff is based upon the sacehatine value of surar, testad by the polariscope. It puts a specilic daty on sugar under 13 . Tlie duly is lixed on all sugar below 13 whose saechame value is tested by the polariscope. It has by its operation changed vely considerably the trade in that conntry, and it has affected to a certain extent the trade with us, becanse a description of sugar formerly mannfactured for the A merican markel suited one tarif That matter is now charged to a certainextent, and the result hats been inat. imports of sugar from the East ludies and from Brazil have increased considerably during the last six momhs. I may suy here that difficulties under the existung tariff huse arisen, as the mi tister of customs knows very well, under the following prorisions, "All sugats imported from the comatries of mooluct pad no dily tpon parkages or charges; therefore, sugar mopred from the comblry of growis sutfered various deductions, necording to the value of these packages, and the amount of these charges. These variod from 7 to 7s up to in many cases 27 , and great dithenlty las been experienced by the department in getting an exnet statement of these elarges. Then difliculties have been experienced by the department in uscertaining toe exact valne of the sugale. In some cases it wite discovered that sugars were imported below their value, and unreasoumble and illegal deductions were made for packages and for cliarges. After laving given this matter a good deal of consideration the govermment have decided, for the present, nut to adopt the polariscope but to make an investigition ourselves. We can enter into negotintions which will, no donbt, be not only desirable but necessary in the presemb state of arrangements beiween the United States and Spmin. It will be one of the carly efforts of our light commissioner, when he returus to Europe, to endeavor to make some aritagements with Spain on that subject. In the meantlime we have thought proper that this mater should stand, at all evems as fur the aloption of the polatiscope was concemed, lintil the next session of Parliment. 'To obviate existing dithiculties we muke this proposition:-The eloty now collected upon sugras imported from the country of growth is thirty per cent., atter dedueting chatges. It is proposed now to make the inroice for the payment of daty free on board, inchading packuges and all chatges, and to reduce tiis duy to 27 di per ceut. It has ber a decided abso to estaditish such a systent as will prevent what had ocenred in the past, an entry of goods at any port it to lower price than at muther lor:. Anoll er change is propesed ; At presernt the rite of duty collected on molasses when used for conversion into sugne or syrup is $2 \overline{5}$ per cent. and for domestic purpuses is 10 per cent. It is purposed to reduce the duty on all molnsses to 10 per cent., when it comes direct. The duty is to be collected free on hoard. Then chloride of zine and sulphate of zine, used in manafactures, is to be reduced to ofer cenc. It is now in the unenumerated list. It is proposed, in addition, to amend section 8 , 43 Vic., chap. 15, with :reference to

## damaged and perisilable goods.

At present if less than 25 per cont. of the whole invoice is damaged, glass for instance broken, ol goods damaged, no return can be had. It is proposed now thatif, for instance in a caso containing glass of any kind, es pel cent, of the package is destroved, the party is to hive the benctit. If 20 packages onit of 100 were at the present time destroyed, and did not amount to $2 \tilde{5}$ per cent in value of the whole, the party would notiget any benelit.

'the largely over-sold combition of the marke which was the supporting feature list week is still existent and exposed those "slowt" to serere attacks, which has resulted in important advances. Foreign and American markets, under large qumbities in sight and the favorrhle condition of the Winter Wheal phant, continte to droop, and a still lower range of valnes is recorded everywhere. Promincut Ohicaro rud Liverpool firms are of opinion that the builk of the old crop of whett cannot te moved out

Fherr--The coht smp hats ngain restricted twide, and, with the exception of Uranges, which are firmer at Sis. 50 to $\$ 0$, per case, the position of the general list is nuelmuged.
