WILTON EXTENSION COSTS TOO MUCH

Controllers Refer the Scheme Back—Will Arbitrate Victoria Park Deal.

Extension of Wilton avenue east from Bolton avenue, to cost \$570,000, was referred back to the works committee by the board of control yesterday because the city's share of the cost, 8 1/2 per cent, was regarded as most excessive.

WESTERN CANADA.

A Bumper Wheat Crop—Thousands of Men Required—This Year's Harvest Promises to Be the Largest in the History of Canada.

According to present indications the wheat crop of 1913 will be the greatest ever harvested in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Thus requiring the farm laborers of the east to assist in harvesting the world's greatest bread basket.

The governments of the respective provinces state that many thousand men will be required for this year's harvest. These will have to be principally recruited from Ontario and the prosperity of Canada depends on securing labor promptly. The Canadian Pacific on which company will fall practically the entire task of transporting the men to the west, is already making arrangements for this year's excursions from points in Ontario to Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

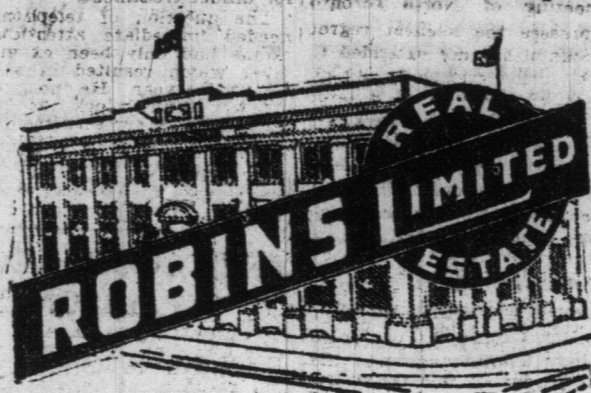

DETROIT, July 18.—Beekwith Havens completed a flying boat trip from Chicago to Detroit shortly before 4 o'clock this afternoon. He followed the route planned from Chicago to Detroit aviation cruise and covered 900 miles. It is said to have been the most remarkable trip ever undertaken by flying boats.

Everything that is belted is fashionable this year. This pretty house jacket is in the height of style for it includes, in addition to the belt, the slightly open neck and pretty rolling collar. Elbow sleeves and long sleeves both are worn so that each wearer can choose whichever she prefers. If the plain striped belt is not becoming, a draped one can be substituted or adjusted over the plain one. The sleeves being of the set-in sort are sewed to the armholes without fullness. One of the two jackets here are made, one of flowered voile with trimming of plain color matching the flowers, the other of dotted challis with collar and cuffs of silk. All the pretty, dainty summer materials are appropriate but voile and crepe are especially pretty. Dresden voile is being much worn and is charming trimmed with the same material in plain color, as pale green, blue or pink. There are only front and back portions to the jacket and the belt holds the fullness at the waist line. For the medium size, the jacket will require 3 1/2 yards of material, 27" x 27" yards 36 or 2 1/2 yards 44 inches wide, 34 yard 27 inches wide for the belt and trimming. 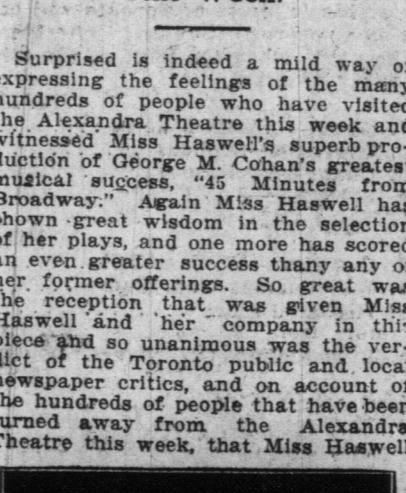

A grudging or condescending manner destroys the fine favor that should mark a granted request, and quite spoils the effect. A child may get what he is after, but he is quite aware of the manner with which it is given, and being a child, he is quickly influenced by example. Soon his manner and actions will show that he has learned an unfortunate lesson only too well. But do something gladly, promptly and with every evidence of pleasure in the doing, and the child learns a valuable lesson in helpfulness and courtesy. When you do things for children, try to do them not only intelligently, but with an eye to training the child to do things for himself. It is easier, often, to do a thing, than it is to show another how to do it; but such a method does not help the child. It is no kindness to allow a child to continue indefinitely in a state of dependence. Children are always interested in things, and wherever they are, they are always learning. It is their duty to learn, and it makes for their development.

BIG SHIPMENTS OF IMPORTED FRUIT Watermelons Are Plentiful and Price Was Cut in Two.

New Jersey tomatoes—a car of them in lush crates—arrived on the Toronto fruit market yesterday consigned to McWilliam & Evers. They are not as good-looking as the native grown vegetable and bring about \$2.25 the bushel.

Imported fruit was a big item in yesterday's trade. Cherries from Wisconsin, Florida peaches and alligator pears from the same state were on sale. The California peaches were scarce and did not last the day. Such quantities of water melons are now on sale that the price has been cut in two.

Raspberries were not too plentiful, tho' the supply was better than has been usual this week. Some shipments of blueberries came in and were disposed of in short order.

Yesterday's fruit and vegetable quotations are as follows: Raspberries, per quart box, 15c to 18c; gooseberries, \$1.50 per basket, 60c to \$1; blueberries, \$1.50 per basket, 75c; peaches, per basket, 75c; beans, per bushel, 70c; carrots, 40c; pumpkins, 25c; cantaloupes, 15c; potatoes, 40c.

J. HERBERT NEW HAS PASSED AWAY Was President of Toronto and Hamilton Sewer Pipe Company.

Jacob Herbert New, president and managing director of the Toronto and Hamilton Sewer Pipe Co., and for many years a well known resident of Toronto, died at his home, 127 Waterman road on Thursday night.

Mr. New commenced his business career in Toronto as manufacturer of wool cotton, woolen goods, etc., and was a familiar figure in the wholesale district of this city. He had a great number of friends, especially in Hamilton, where he spent the early years of his life.

He was married in 1886 to Miss R. A. Wright, who predeceased him by many years. One son, Hyland H. New of this city, and two brothers, John New of Toronto, and Edward New of Hamilton, survive him.

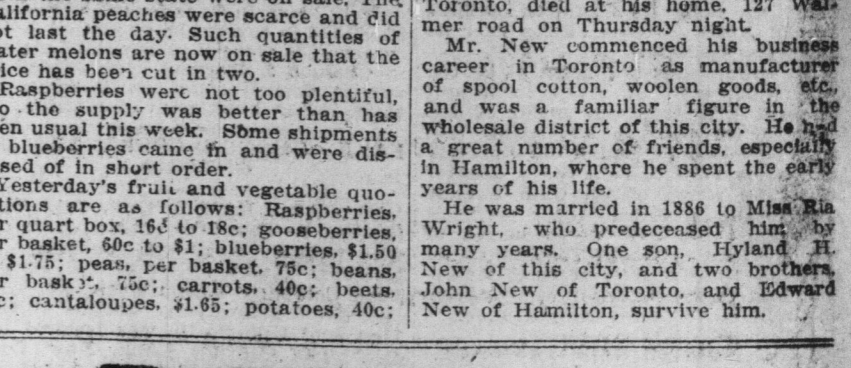
