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GERMANS DRAW UP PEACE TERMS LIST

Would Absorb Belgium for Future Military and Economic Development.

TO ASSURE SEA CREDIT

Settlement Not Having These Results Would Render New Struggle Inevitable.

PARIS, Aug. 11.—What purports to be the text of a confidential memorandum sent to the imperial German chancellor, Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg on May 20, by representatives of German manufacturing and agricultural associations, is published by The Temps. The memorandum, according to the newspaper, covers financial, territorial, industrial and military concessions to be demanded of the entente allies as Germany's terms for peace and to insure the development of a greater Germany. It is signed by the following men who are prominent in the life of the German Empire:

Signed by Leading Germans. Dr. Rosé of the Agrarian League; Von Besenrodt of the German Peasants' League; Baron von Thielack of the Association of Westphalian Peasants; Herr Rouger of the Central German Manufacturers' League; Herr Friedrichs of the Manufacturers' League and Professor Eberle of the Union of the Middle Classes of the Empire.

The memorandum after calling for terms which would insure the development of greater Germany and "guarantee an amelioration of the bases of the German Empire," says: "A peace which has not these results will render new struggles inevitable at an early date and will make the chances much less favorable for Germany."

Referring to Belgium, it says: "Because it is necessary to secure our credit on the sea and the future military and economic situation with respect to England, because Belgian territory, so economically important, is so closely linked with our principal industrial territory, Belgium should be from a monetary, financial and postal viewpoint, subject to the future of the empire, its railroads and waterways should be most closely linked with our communications."

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—After listening to a speech by Senator Hoke Smith of Georgia, more than 300 New York importers today adopted a petition to President Wilson urging him to take prompt and strenuous action to relieve American importers of the conditions caused by Great Britain's refusal to allow products of Germany and Austria to be shipped from neutral ports to the United States.

Senator Smith declared that the blockade, as carried out by Great Britain was one of the most flagrant and inexcusable violations of neutral rights in naval history.

Government Inefficiency Caused Lusitania's Loss

Sir Charles Beresford Makes Startling Accusation in Letter to Meeting on Contraband-ing of Cotton—Declares He Can Prove His Contention.

LONDON, Aug. 11.—In a letter read tonight at a meeting for the purpose of urging the government to do better on the contraband list, Lord Charles Beresford claims that if certain advice that he had tendered Premier Asquith in April had been followed, the Lusitania would have been saved. Lord Charles was to attend the meeting, but he sent a letter supporting the movement, wherein he stated: "On April 5 last I wrote to the prime minister on various matters connected with the war, showing how inefficiency, brought about by want of organization and forethought, was causing the loss of invaluable lives. I further stated that the cause of the disasters mentioned were all avoidable and that men's lives were being sacrificed by criminal negligence. It is the warning advice tendered that has been acted on the Lusitania would not have been lost. I have in my power to prove that this statement is a fact when the proper time comes."

WARSAW AS CAPITAL OF POLISH KINGDOM?

Polish Faction in Austrian Parliament is Dreaming Dreams.

VIENNA, via London, Aug. 11.—The Polish faction in the Austrian Parliament has issued a manifesto calling for the organization of a kingdom of Poland, with capital at Warsaw, as an integral part of the Hapsburg monarchy.

The Polish national committee, endorsing the manifesto, issues a call to the people of Polish territory, now free from Russian domination, to send delegates to a general national convention in sending delegates to a national convention intended to work for a reunited nation.

USUAL TEUTON METHODS.
LODZ, Poland, via London, Aug. 11.—The extent to which German institutions in Poland already have been transferred to the German model.

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Secretary of State Lansing has gathered here today to discuss plans for the restoration of peace in Mexico that the United States in sending battleships to Vera Cruz intended only to afford protection to foreigners and a place of refuge. The assembling of diplomatic representatives from Brazil, Chile, Argentina, Bolivia, Guatemala and Uruguay, then discussed with Secretary Lansing details of the appeal to be issued to the Mexican people urging a peace conference of all factions thru which a provisional government would be re-established.

The conference adjourned late today after having approved the appeal to the Mexican people, which probably will be despatched tomorrow following a conference in Washington of President Wilson and Secretary Lansing.

CARRANZA SENDS PROTEST.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—Tonight Mr. Arredondo made public a message sent to Gen. Carranza by Gen. Candido Aguilar, governor and military commander of Vera Cruz, protesting against interference in Mexican affairs by the United States and Latin-American Republics.

Similar protests, it was announced, were received from other Carranza adherents.

Three Battleships Sent.
Secretary of the Navy Daniels late today sent reports that the Atlantic fleet at Newport, R.I., had been prepared to sail for Mexican waters, but announced that he had ordered the battleships to remain at Newport, and Louisiana to await further orders "in southern waters."

The New Hampshire and Louisiana are now 18 hours out of Newport with sealed orders, and the Connecticut is in Italian waters.

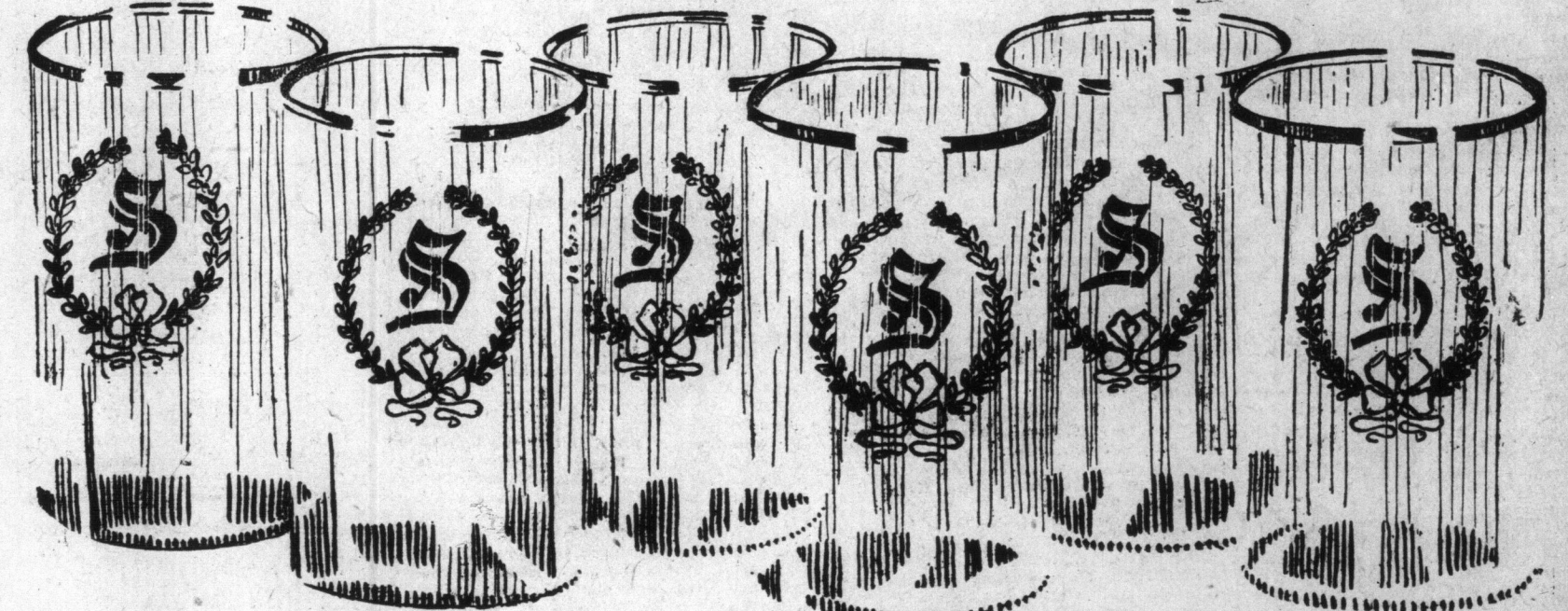
Secretary Daniels added that generally unsettled conditions in southern waters required the presence of greater naval forces.

It was found also that some of the contestants, women with heavy household cares and no strong-armed man around to do heavy digging, were showing excellent results, although not probable prize-winners and a prize will as a result go to the woman who overcomes the greatest difficulties. Another added prize will be for the garden showing the greatest improvement.

SEVERAL MORE INTERESTING

To encourage gardeners to keep tab on their operations so that they will know just how much of a saving their gardening is a special prize will be given for the best set of records. Another will go to the gardener who has the best display in front of his house. It is also proposed to give prizes for the best exhibit of special varieties of flowers or vegetables apart from the general prizes for exhibits.

Many a beauty bemoans the fact that her feet are a "sight to behold," and spends hours trying to correct the abuse, caused by years of neglect and abuse. It is time wasted to try to improve the appearance of one's feet if we continue

it is next to impossible to restore a distorted foot to its normal shape, but you can improve the texture of the skin and manure the nails which will make it appear immaculate and well-cared for. Lamb Club Sandwiches. Cut thin slices from a cold leg of lamb and season with salt and pepper. Heat melted butter in frying pan and cook slices of lamb two minutes on each side. Spread mayonnaise over lettuce leaves, then arrange lettuce and lamb slice between bread or toast. If bread is used it may be served cold. The toast should be served heated.

Olive Sandwiches. These are excellent to serve instead of bread and butter, as an accompaniment to cold sliced meat and salad. Chop one dozen olives, spread bread with mayonnaise or butter, add one or two bits of cream, then the chopped olives, and press slices closely together.

Creamed Egg Sandwiches. Chop the whites of hard-boiled eggs and force the yolks through a ricer. Mix yolks, whites, salt, pepper and cream thoroughly, then spread on thin slices of bread and butter.

Cheese and Sardine Sandwiches. Cream two tablespoonsful of butter, and one-quarter of a cup of American cheese, grated, and an equal quantity of sardines, boned and mashed to a paste. Season with salt, paprika and a few drops of lemon juice, and soften with olive oil or melted butter. Spread on thin slices of white or brown bread.

A Chin of True Form Is Only Found in Man

By DR. LEONARD KEENE HIRSHBERG

THE lower jawbone of human creatures is one of the many manly structures which helps modern zoologists to dispose of the Darwinian notion of evolution.



The discoveries of the prehistoric skulls of man who lived hundreds of thousands of years ago prove that to be human is to have a chin.

There is a peculiarity of the animal's mandible or jawbone which leaves a wide hiatus between it and the lowest variety of human kind. This uniformity in brutes is not only true for today, but for all past ages as far as geological fossils, possibly a million years old, can testify. This fixed type of brute jaw shows that the chin, hence the so-called missing links and proofs of man's evolution from the man-like monkeys holds no water.

The elephant has a kind of chin, which, however, is not a chin, but a fragmentary kind of lower jaw, such as mastodons and mammoths also had. The ancient sea cows had a downward prolongation of the mandible, which is not a chin in the sense of yours and mine, but a kind of bone rostrum upon which such huge creatures carry their teeth. It is more like a flamingo's bill than a human chin.

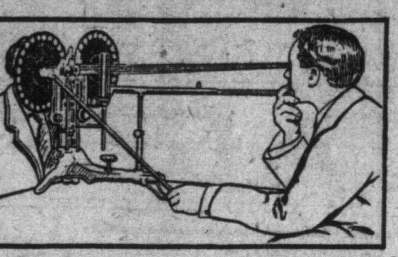

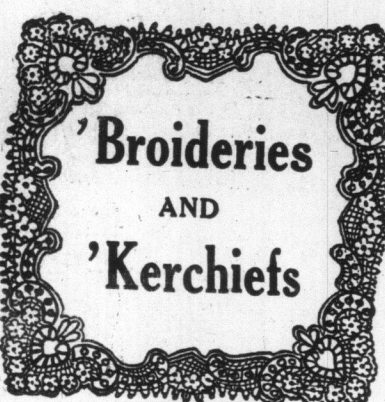

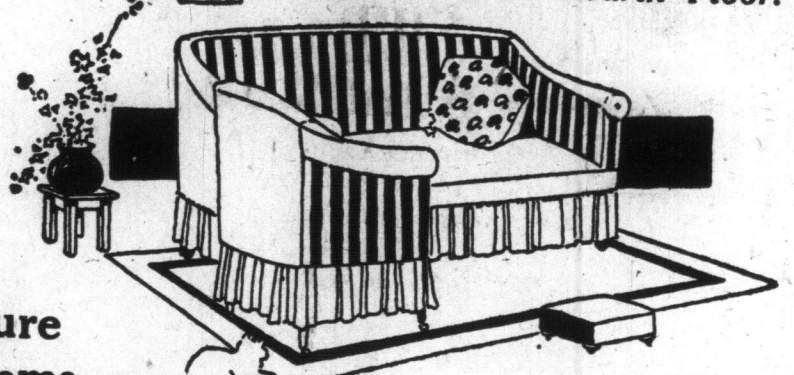
