Both Parties Committed to Protection, Says Finance Minister Therefore New Tariff Changes Little From Old National Policy

MR. FIELDING ADHERES TO PREFERENCE GIVES CANADA PROMINENCE IN EYES OF EMPIRE EXTENDED TO OVER-SEA POSSESSIONS

Drawback Clause a New Feature and Dumping Provision is Extended to the Free List—If Tariff is Shown to Facilitate Formation of Combinations in Restraint of Trade Duty Will Be Removed.

IRON AND STEEL BOUNTIES EXTENDED FOUR YEARS

Government Refuses Protection to Tin Plate Industry—Hon. G. E. Foster Denounces Measure as Admitting Millions of Dollars' Worth of Goods That Should Be Made in Canada.

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—(Special.)—The new tariff is a revision in form rather than in substance. There are some slight increases and some slight decreases, but the result will work no change in the total amount of duties collected. The British preference remains, and if anything, is a trifle more pronounced. An effort is made to promote trade with Great Britain by admitting from British possessions free of duty some articles upon which there is a small duty as against foreign countries. Raw sugar suffers a slight increase amounting, under the preference, to 71-2 cents per 100 pounds. As substantially all our raw sugar comes from the British West Indies this change results in an increase in revenue amounting to about \$300,000 per annum. The duties upon rice, oranges and lemons are reduced, causing a deficiency of about the same amount. Iron and steel receive bounties for four years more upon a sliding scale, as heretofore. Tin plate receives no protection, but there is no substantial relief to the farmers upon agricultural implements.

The general trend of the change is slightly upwards. The new feature of the tariff, apart from classification, is found in the so-called "intermediate tariff." This is a rate about 10 per cent less than the general tariff, which may be and order-in-council become effective in favor of any nation which desires reciprocity. Mr. Fielding, however, admitted that it was problematical whether it would be so unless acted upon by a number of countries, as the favored nation clause in imperial treaties would make it apply to many other nations if for any other reason it was extended to any particular country. It is difficult to understand why any revision was made at all and it is difficult to see what the present tariff, as a rule, changes are slight and offset one another so as to produce no change in the revenue of the country.

A prominent merchant said to-night: "It is like a merchant using the same goods but arranging them differently. No new mercury is used in the CANADA'S PROSPECTS."

Mr. Fielding in opening, of course, referred to the great prospects of Canada, alluding with regret to the trouble between the Dominion Coal and the Dominion Steel Company. He said significantly that both companies owned a people of Canada and the people of Ontario and the west, but was of the opinion that these difficulties were a tribute on the progress and prosperity of the country. It expressed his confidence on the part of the laboring men that they were creating. The usual figures were gone into.

The estimated revenue of the last fiscal year had been \$79,000,000. The actual revenue was \$80,139,000. On the other hand, more money was spent than anticipated by \$740,000. There remained an apparent surplus of \$12,898,000. As a matter of fact, however, the expenditure upon capital account had wiped out this apparent surplus and the net debt of Canada had increased during the past year by \$18,000,000. Increase was shown in all departments. From customs the increase had been from \$41,300,000 to \$46,000,000. In excise collections were from \$12,586,000 to \$14,000,000. In the postal department from \$5,125,000 to \$5,933,000. Even the territorial had shown a surplus of \$41,915, offsetting a deficit on the part of Prince Edward Island of \$39,900. The anticipated surplus in the post office department had leaped from more than one-half million in 1905, to more than \$1,000,000 in 1906.

ESTIMATED SURPLUS \$13,000,000
The receipts of the government for the period between July 1 last and the present were so large as to justify an estimate that for the nine months ending March 31, 1907, they would amount to \$85,000,000. The estimated expenditure for the same period is \$72,000,000. The finance minister hopes by March 31 to have paid all capital expenditures on capital account out of the current revenue for the nine months, and to decrease the national

POINTS IN NEW TARIFF

The Fielding tariff of 1906 continues the British preference, which the minister says is a good thing and has given Canada prominence in the eyes of the empire and of the rest of the world. The preference is extended to all the outlying portions of the empire. The second column of figures provides for special treatment to those nations which give Canada the benefit of lower duties. There will be no duty on tin plate. A request for protection for this industry was refused on the ground that it would add to the cost of canned goods and cast a burden on the consumer. Iron and steel bounties are continued four years on a sliding scale. Dumping clause continued. Slight increase in duties on raw sugar, while there is a reduction on rice, oranges and lemons. Agricultural implements are altered, but the net result is the same. While there are many changes in the schedules, Mr. Fielding has adhered to the principle of protection, and the general effect of the tariff is to leave the revenue from customs about as it was. In fact, the Fielding tariff is a revision in form but not in substance.

40 DEAD; HUNDREDS HURT EXPLOSIVE WORKS BLOW UP C.M.A. TARIFF COMMITTEE TO DISCUSS CHANGES TO-DAY

Bodies of the Killed Terribly Mangled—Shock Felt for Ten Miles.

Dortmund, Germany, Nov. 29.—So far as can be ascertained this morning, 40 persons were killed, 86 were dangerously wounded, and several hundreds were slightly injured as a result of the explosion last night of the roborite factory near Annen, where the Krupp Works are located. At the time of the explosion 600 boxes, each containing 80 pounds of roborite, were stored in the factory. The great force of the explosion was felt as far as Dortmund, ten miles from the scene of the disaster, where a large number of windows were broken. On the main road to Annen all the houses were razed to the ground, the bodies of the killed being terribly mutilated. The surviving parents dragged their sleeping children from their beds, collected their portable possessions and fled from the collapsing buildings.

A second explosion occurred at 6 o'clock this morning. Experts declare that, considering the great precautions which the explosives were stored, the disaster can only have resulted from some oversight. Emperor William has directed General Von Schoen to visit Annen and Witten, and has subscribed \$250 for the relief of the sufferers.

LONE RUNAWAY LOCOMOTIVE BRINGS DEATH TO THREE Bad Accident in the Winnipeg Yards—Men Killed When Collision Occurs.

Winnipeg, Nov. 29.—Three men were killed and four injured in a railway accident this afternoon in the Canadian Northern yards. One of the victims was William Nell. The other two men killed are foreigners. An engine was being put in readiness to take out a freight train, and the engineer and fireman had stepped off, when it is supposed the throttle blew out, and the monster started off at a terrific pace, ran into a switch and crashed into a dead train on a siding, on which a number of men were unloading supplies. The jar threw a concrete mixer the full length of a flat car, almost instantly killing three men and seriously injuring four others.

EARL GREY LOOKS TO EAST FOR A MARKET AND FOR LABOR SUPPLY TO AID CANADA'S FUTURE

Governor-General, Guest of Canadian Club, Makes a Notable Deliverance Couched in Words of Semi-Warning.

Earl Grey's speech at the Canadian Club banquet last night was an eloquent and exhaustive survey of Canadian nationality and its problems, treated in a vein of high-minded and experienced statesmanship. It met with frequent applause, and at times elicited no little amusement by adroit allusions to the chairman's remarks. Points that excited attention were his recommendations to study the need of cheap foreign labor, for which capital waited to enter Canada; the activity of the C.P.R. in erecting irrigation works in view of a possible cycle of lean years; Premier Whitney's Aladdin's cave in Cobalt, and the entry of the C.N.R. to Toronto, and the Niagara power development, upon which he personally complimented Col. Pellat; the growth of Canada to a population equal to that of Britain, when as a grown giant she will shake the world for evil or for good. Better to be honest than smart, he said, and character counts for more than wealth. Spencer, Shakespeare, Cromwell and Nelson were the four men to follow in the production of such a race as made England immortal. Earl Grey, who wore the George and an Indian decoration, spoke for an hour. There were 300 present, and the scene was a brilliant one. The Earl's speech was a fine tribute in itself to the distinguished guest. Wealth and learning were sandwiched around the snowy circle. Senator Cox tried to interrupt the C.N.R. to Toronto. Mayor Coatsworth, J. W. Flavelle and George Jackson, J. W. Flavelle and Byron Walker were the other members of this notable company. Hon. W. J. Hanna sat at another table near, and Dan Mann was at the next one, and received the personal congratulations of Earl Grey amid applause on the entrance of the C.N.R. to Toronto. SUBMITTED TO ARBITRATION COMPANY ASKS MEN TO RUN CARS

Provincial Railway Board to Consider the Hamilton Affair—Manager Green Says Invitation Will Be Extended to Strikers to Return to Work.

Hamilton, Nov. 29.—(Special.)—At 9 o'clock this evening the union and company signed an agreement to allow the Ontario railway and municipal board to act unconditionally as arbitrators of all the questions in dispute before the first arbitration. For the company C. K. Green issued a statement addressed to Ald. Stewart as follows: "In connection with the agreement to refer all matters in dispute to the Ontario railway and municipal board, it should be understood distinctly that the service is to run unimpeded with the force operating same or such force as the company may use for that purpose, and it is possible that the company will call upon some of its old employees if they should be available."

"It seems to us that the strike should be called off simultaneously with the agreement being entered into, but we are not making that a condition. What we want and what the public wants is peace and the discontinuance of the disturbed condition of affairs in this city. "While the arbitration is taking place possibly some of the men might be willing to return to the company's service, while others would exercise the option of not doing so, and it, therefore, seems unnecessary from any point of view that the strike attitude should be continued. "In signing the reference to the arbitration of the railway board we are only doing what we have for the last two or three weeks signified our willingness to do. "The men say, 'We cannot return to work until the strikebreakers leave.' "The railway board will commence the arbitration at 11 a.m. Friday, and expect to bring in a decision in two or three days. It is thought that the soldiers will be withdrawn at once. The East King-street line was operated this evening, and there were no disturbances. "It is thought that the railway board will ask the strikers to go back to work at once, while the arbitration is being carried on. "The company announces it will build a new roadbed, and operate up-to-date cars."

A gentleman closely identified with one of our leading financial institutions has just returned from the west after a visit of a few days in the bustling City of Winnipeg.

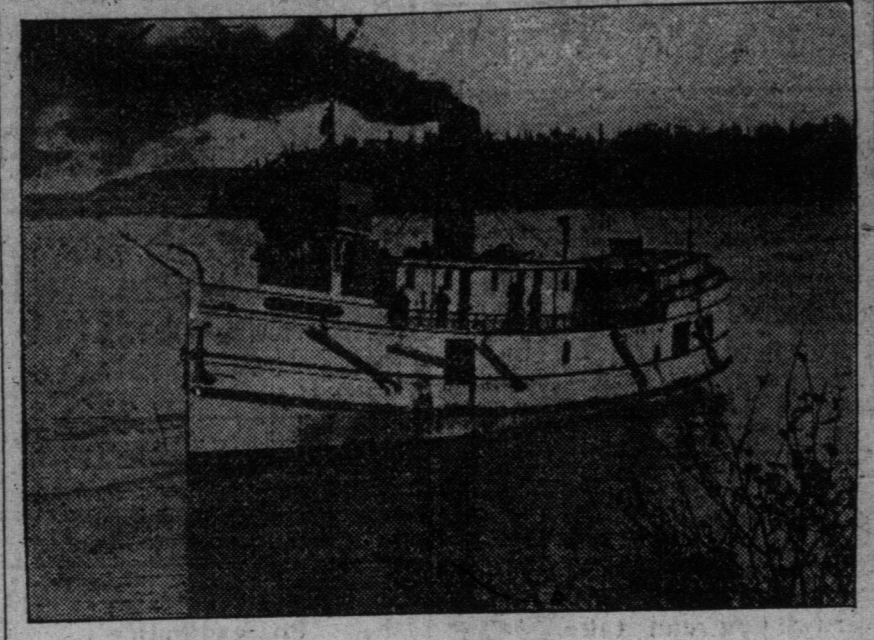

WATER FALLS OF "ROCKIES" TO REVOLUTIONIZE WEST

Syndicate Prepares to Develop Power for Industrial and Transportation Purposes.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 29.—Backed by a \$30,000,000 syndicate, Myron T. Herrick, former governor of Ohio, and Thomas F. Walsh of Denver propose to harness the mountain cataraacts and streams of the Rockies and revolutionize industrial conditions in the west.

Their plans contemplate one of the most gigantic engineering feats in the history of the United States, the development of the water power of the mountains of Colorado for long-distance transmission. The deal has already been financed, the millions of bankers and capitalists all over the world having been subscribed to push the project to success.

Herrick is enthusiastic over the outlook. The season of Niagara's cataraact, he declares, has shown what can be done with the Colorado streams. Fifty streams will be harnessed and Herrick foresees a commercial development of the west which shall bring electricity into use among all the western railroads and western manufacturing plants.

The project has been under way for three years. Herrick and Walsh, aided by other capitalists from Europe and the larger American cities, have made a careful canvass of the situation and have invested their money freely in the scheme.

"The deal has been financed," said Herrick, "and we are now waiting for the completion of certain electrical and engineering plans before incorporating the mountain water power company. Extensive operations will be in progress. John Hays Hammond, one of the best-known engineers of the age, has been employed, and for some time has been engaged on the intricate problems attendant upon harnessing the water power of the swift flowing mountain streams.

"I predict that in ten years every railroad company crossing the mountains will be using electricity and the west makes the cost from \$75 to \$125 a year more power to each rail-road company and manufacturer. With this increase for fuel our company can furnish the power at from \$20 to \$30 a year horse power. The price varies according to the distance power is transmitted. I predict a revolution of industrial conditions in the west."

It is necessary to wait several years until the branches of the young trees are large enough to graft, and several more for the grafts to bear. When grafts are set they will grow straight up, thus spoiling the shape of the tree. Better plant early-bearing winter varieties and save fur-

Their engineers made a careful examination and it is said that their report was satisfactory, but the principals could not agree on the price.

Many enquiries have come in regarding the Green-Meehan properties and your correspondent has paid a visit to the former.

This property has been under the public gaze for several weeks, and the value of the stock keeps climbing up.

The Red Rock has had a choppy career, but the camp has never lost faith in it. It was originally a McMartin-Fleming and Dunlop location and their luck has been proverbial.

The Green-Meehan is in the first concession of Bucke, the next township to Coleman. The Township of Lorraine lies directly south of Bucke.

Near the Green-Meehan is the Cobalt Contact, where two fair veins have been located and ore has been sacked.

The Green-Meehan forty acres were stated by Michael Meehan and the contact by his partner, Phil Green. These men came from Sudbury and are well known as prospectors. Green has located various iron properties in Hutton Township and around Port Arthur and his partner has made several nickel discoveries in the St. Mary district.

They came to Cobalt in the summer of 1905, staked their claims, got them passed and in the spring of the present year sold the claim formerly called the "Green" to O. F. Johnson & Co. of New York, who named it the "Cobalt-Contact".

During last summer they worked on the Green-Meehan continuously and found several veins, but it was in the early fall that they made the sensational discovery the announcement of which was at first received with incredulity around Cobalt.

Every body knows its subsequent history. It enriched the original owners and the commission allowed on the sale has in these two properties given the disappointed for the sale and entitled to a share of the plunder.

And Recoveries in Prices Are Made in the Active Issues at Toronto.

World Office, Thursday Evening, Nov. 29. The Toronto mining market, devoid of the support of the New York curb, showed much more strength to-day than almost any previous day this week. Liquidation was not quite so intensive to-day and when this showed signs of drawing to a close floor traders took advantage to pick up a few cheap offerings. The principal activity was in Trethewey, of which several thousand shares were sold. The buying of this issue is generally conceded to be very much better than the selling, although no attempt was made to force the price of most offerings. After selling freely around 2.30, the quotations strengthened until at the close an advance of five points was registered. The action of Foster to-day and yesterday was taken as a clear indication that there was very little stock to be had around present prices. The buying was by no means aggressive, but the mixture demand brought about over a ten point rise. Green-Meehan maintained its position without difficulty and profit-taking made but very little impression on the price. Cleveland Cobalt came in for further inquiry to-day, several orders being for out-of-town investors. The price touched 1.20, a new high record and was held at that figure at the close. Silver Leaf was substantially supported at firm quotations. Peterson Lake is succeeding from the coast off the recent too sharp advance and many are taking the chance of excellent profits. Red Rock was practically out of enquiry and sold lower. Silver Queen is still awaiting dividend announcement and is inactive.

Biggest Deal in Camp.
New York, Nov. 29.—A. S. Munson has gone to Cobalt, where he is making examination of the properties of the Cobalt Consolidated Company, the result of this examination to decide the fate of a deal involving stock now in pool. It is said that the transaction involves a considerable amount of money, and that in the event of its consummation it will go upon record as one of the biggest in that camp.

Not a Party to Wild Cutting.
W. G. Trethewey, who held a large interest in the Coniagac claim, disclaims any connection with the wild-cutting claimed by correspondents in price touched issue, to be going on in the notation of that property.
