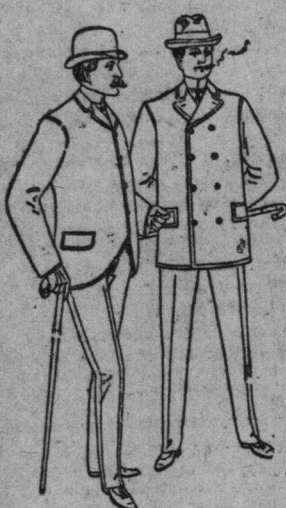
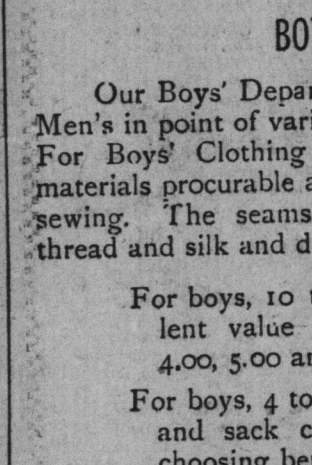

OSPREY'S CONSPIRACY CASE

Preliminary Examination Before Magistrate Jelfs Lasted All Day. Defendants Charged With Conspiring to Defraud and Theft—Pleaded Not Guilty and Declined to Elect—Many Witnesses Examined—Prisoners Admitted to Bail—Hamilton Notes.

Hamilton, Sept. 14.—[The preliminary examination into the criminal charges laid against A. L. Stares of the late firm of furniture dealers, and W. B. Cook, a clerk, began before Magistrate Jelfs this morning and lasted all day. Three charges were laid against the defendants. They were charged with conspiracy to defraud the creditors of the firm, with stealing goods and with conspiracy to defraud the bank.

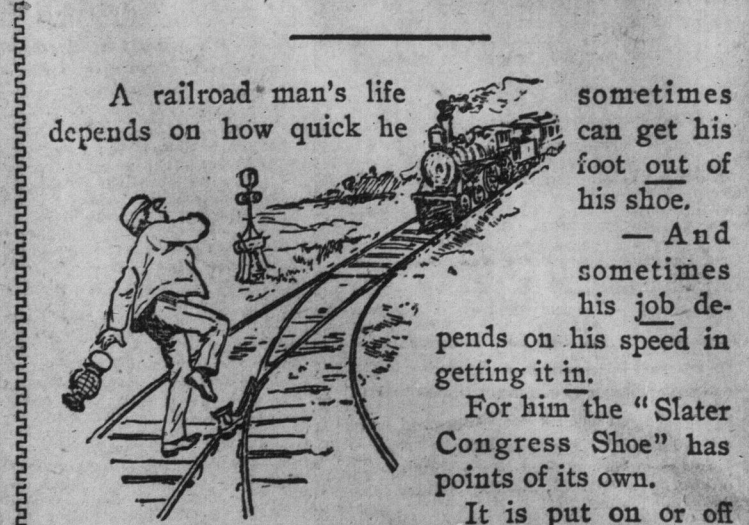
