The manufacture of comic opera is an unprotected American industry that has flourished and developed, in spite of the fact that there is no tariff on the imported article. Ten years ago, when the late John A. MacCauli produced the first work of Reginald de Koven and Harry B. Smith, American comic opera was practically unknown, and managers produced nothing but English, German and French importations. Since the success of "Robin Hood." however, nearly all the popular operettas have been of native manufacture. Suppe and Genee have passed beyond. Milloecker and Dellinger have not writt-1 anything successful of late. Strauss retains, even in his age, his wonderful gift of melody, but falls of find inspiration in the librettos offered to him. Sullivan's later works, though they have a fascination of their own, have falled to hit the target of popularity. There has been no successful French operetta since "La Clgale." American composers and librettists have the field to themselves, and they seem to be developing a school of American light opera which suits the tastes of the public. Such works as "The Little Corporal." "The Serrenade." "Robin Hood," "Rob Roy," and "The Fortune Teller," and "The Highwayman," as heard for the first time here last season, are certainly superior to anything of the sort that has come to us from over the sea of late. 



Scientific Requirements of a Rational

"Scientific Requirements of a Rational Social System."

He conterded that before the physical could be solved we must solve the metallysical. While we are all more or less blased in our opinions, social reformers must overcome this and get together, as there are enough in Canada to make the existing Governments tremble. The great fundamental axiomatic principle must be discovered, and the great problem of life is to discover the relation of cause to effect. Various reformers, free silverites, an archists, single taxers, socialists and preachers propound cure-alls for the evils of the present economic condition, but in doing so they fail to distinguish between sequence and consequence. Collectivism and individualism are both needed in a true state of society. The speaker also criticized socialists for condemning competition, although we have never had a true competition. 



Crow's Nest Pass Coal.

British Columbia's Minister of Mines, in

British Columbia's Minister of Mines, in his annual report for 1898, just issued, has the following to say regarding coal mining in the Crow's Nest Pass country:

The most important mining development in East Kootenay, if not in the whole prevince, during the past year (1898) has been the opening up of the magnificent coal deposits of the Crow's Nest Pass; a development rendered possible by the completion

the opening up of the magnificent coal deposits of the Crow's Nest Pass; a development rendered possible by the completion of a railway giving an outlet not only to British Columbia markets but to those as well of the Northwest Territories, and eventually to those of the Northwestern States.

The importance of this development will be felt throughout the province, but more particularly in the Kootenays, for on or near the coast of Vancouver Island mines have fully supplied the demands for tuel, and can continue to do so at reasonable prices, its carriage not being subject to very heavy freight rates. The coal and coke supplies for the Kootenay, until now derived from this source also, have, however, necessarily been subject to excessive carriage charges, consequent on a long up-grade haul and one or more inconvenient transfers. Hereafter coal from the Crow's Nost Pass can be delivered into the heart of the mining districts of East and West Kootenay without breaking bulk, delivered in cars loaded at the mine and hauled down an easy grade to all points of consumption. The ideal situation and mode of occurrence of the Crow's Nest coal further admits of its being mined and delivered on the cars at a minimum of cost.

These considerations seem to guarantee to the mines and smelters of these districts a steady supply of first-class fuel at a price very materially lower than has before been possible. Combined cheaper transportation and cheaper fuel will have the effect of so reducing the cost of treatment of ores that it will, to a large extent, necessitate a reconsideration of many of the mining propositions which have had to be temporarily abandoned on account of the present cost of treatment. In like manner direct rail communication with the eastern metal markets will enable products to be marketed at a considerably increased figure.

While much may be expected from these increased facilities, they will not do every-

to be marketed at a considerably increased figure.

While much may be expected from these increased facilities, they will not do everything seemingly expected of them; they will not make a mine where none existed; they will only lower the line dividing loss from profit, and enable many of our low-grade propositions to step over this line and become profitable producers.





Howard City, Mich., May 12.—Joseph Harvey, murderer of his grandmother, uncle and wife, who also fatally wounded his father-in-law and tried to commit suicide, was taken to the county jail at Stanton to-day, after being arraigned before a justice of the peace. He waived examination and was held for trial. The young man expressed no emotion over his atrocious crimes. He has given no evidence whatever of insanity, saying only that Pearson, his uncle, abused him and quartelled with him because he had been driving Pearson's horse in the rain. He still insist that his dead uncle killed his grandnother, and that he killed his uncle out of revenge. He says he is sorry he-killed is wife, but did it because he intended o kill himself and did not want her to twe after he was gone. Aside from having a flery temper, Harvey was not known o have any vicious traits.
