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RECIPROcity WITH CANADA

Members of Washington Convention Devoted Last Night's Session to Its Discussion.

BOSTON DELEGATE ADVOCATES IT.

Mr. John Charlton Urges a Canadian View—Lumber Interests Wish It on Condition.

Washington, Nov. 20.—At the forenoon session of the National Reciprocity convention to-day, A. B. Valentine of Bennington, Vt., president of the National Association of Kait Goods Manufacturers, offered the following resolution as representing the views of that association: "Resolved, that in the opinion of this convention the treaty known as the French reciprocity convention should not be ratified."

Trade With Canada. The session tonight was devoted mainly to the question of reciprocal trade relations with Canada. Several papers were read, after which some routine business was disposed of, and the convention finally adjourned.

Mr. Charlton's Opinion. Mr. John Charlton, a member of the Canadian parliament, spoke earnestly in favor of some reasonable concessions in trade relations to meet the liberal trade sentiment of the United States by Canada.

Committee on Resolutions. The committee on resolutions of the Philadelphia conference, which had reported favorably on the reciprocity convention, was called upon to report.
