

SHORTAGE OF LABOR IN MUNITION PLANTS

Report Submitted to Meeting of Resources Committee Yesterday.

CO-OPERATION NEEDED

Understanding Desired Between Employers and Military Authorities.

A detailed report of labor conditions in Toronto munition plants was submitted at the meeting of the organization of resources committee at the parliament buildings yesterday, when there were present the lieutenant-governor, Sir John Hendrie, the premier, Hon. J. W. McGarry, C. M. Bowman, M.L.A., and Severin Ducharme, M.L.A. The report was based upon an investigation of a number of the larger plants made by the secretary and assistant secretary of the committee, Dr. A. H. Abbott and B. J. Roberts, respectively.


en and by definite attempts to secure labor from outside points. Every man who offers himself and who is at all competent to help in these plants is being taken on.

With regard to the employment of women, it was found that in the plants visited, approximately 300 are at present at work and that this number will be more than doubled within the very near future. Women cannot be used on the heavier shells, nor does it seem wise at present to attempt to use them in the operation of machines where there is considerable danger of accident. In some plants women are not being employed because of the comparatively large cost of transforming and reorganizing the plant to use them to good effect. Of the women who are at present employed it is found that very few come from other factories. A large percentage are wives of soldiers and the remainder, women who have worked as domestics or in stores or who have not been previously engaged in factory work.

Get Same Pay as Men. "Manufacturers state their willingness to pay women the same wages as the men if they measure up in efficiency and general satisfaction. The great demand for workers is the best safeguard that women have that they will be paid according to their producing power.

"In considering the question of employing women, the cost of training inexperienced workmen is to be considered. This obviously is higher in the case of women who have never had training in doing systematic work and who have not previously worked under factory conditions.



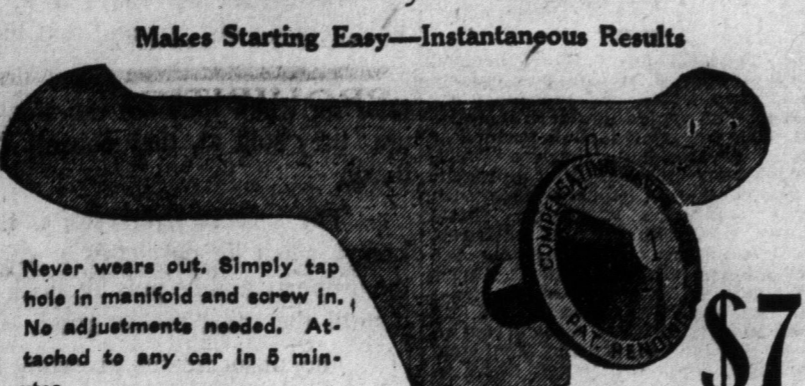

TORONTO MARKET HAD IRREGULAR TREND

Some Firm Stocks, But Many Issues Showed Tendency to Weaken.

Trading at the Toronto Stock Exchange was very restricted and no great demand for stocks was in evidence.

The feature of the market was the strength in a number of issues. A jump of 1 1/2c in sympathy with wheat is unusual, and there was no exceptionally good buying.

There was a big broad trade in all markets during the morning session, making a new low record for the new stock at 5 1/2-2. Later it recovered to 5 1/2-2.

WHEAT FORCED UP ON RUST REPORTS

Gloomy Stories of Damaged Crop Given Credence at Chicago.

RISE IN NORTHWEST MINNEAPOLIS MARKETS GAINED OVER TWO CENTS ON SPECULATION.

CHICAGO, July 12.—Further reports of black rust in the northwest, indicating the approach of a serious condition, advanced wheat prices today, the pest inroads being reinforced by word that hot, muggy weather made rust spread highly probable.

The close was steady, within 1-16 to 3-16 of the top prices, being from 1 3-16 to 1 7-16 to 20 higher, with July at \$1.09 1-2 and Sept. at 1 1-4. Corn finished steady, 3-8c to 3-9 1-2 not lower, and oats, 1-14 to 1-14 1-2 in provisions, the final figures were 5c to 25c higher.

Dealers who took profits on the northwestern wheat were received, telling of black rust found on every stalk of wheat handled in some fields and its presence noted in every field visited. Other reports minimizing the rust danger were unable to crowd the market down and good buying developed on every weak spot.

There was little evidence of selling pressure thru the day, but the country offerings were not large. Local cash sales aggregated 15,000 bushels of wheat, with word from the local elevators that 40,000 bushels of wheat had been sold for export, including 500,000 bushels of new American winter wheat.

Cris which was inclined to drag at the outset, was braced by the strength of wheat, but the advance was checked by an abundance of offerings and prices made little headway. Word of dry, hot weather in the southwest with moisture needed was offset by reports of welcome rains in the seaboard.

Crises were in good demand, stimulated by continued reports of hot and dry weather. Local cash sales totaled 250,000 bushels, with offerings of provisions and buying based on expectation of another large purchase for Belgian rail.
